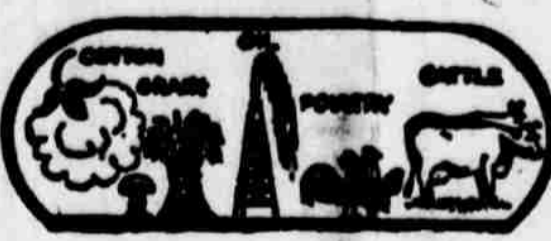

Truck and Bus Drivers Support Safety Campaign

Truck and bus drivers for the
more than 900 motor carrier
firms of Texas Motor Trans-
portation Association will be do-
ing their part over the long hol-
iday season to support the Tex-
as "Drive Friendly" program
and to reduce highway fatali-
ties and injuries.

The Association's Board of
Directors voted unanimously at
a meeting on December 13 to
ask each TMTA member compa-
ny to encourage its drivers to
run with their lights on
throughout the holiday season.
From December 20 through
January 2, therefore, most
trucks and buses on Texas
highways will be shining their
lights around the clock in sup-
port of the Texas "Drive
Friendly" campaign.

In announcing the truck and
bus industry's commitment to
a safer holiday season, E. O.
Gaylord, TMTA president and
president of Robertson Distri-
bution Systems, Inc., in Hous-
ton, reminded Texas motorists
that safety is everyone's busi-
ness.

"We in the truck and bus in-
dustry make it our concern to
drive safely every day — it is
essential in our business. But
safety on our highways should
be the first concern of every
motorist, because there's much
more to be lost in any accident
than just profit in a business
enterprise.

"I hope that each Texan will
join with us to make this holi-
day season the safest in the
history of Texas highways."

Members of the truck and
bus industry have notified Gov.
Preston Smith of their program
to support his "Drive Friend-
ly" campaign and to reduce
highway accidents during the
holidays.

Texas Motor Transportation
Association, which represents
more than 900 truck and bus op-
erators and their allied indus-
try suppliers, works through
its Texas Council of Safety Su-
pervisors to promote highway
safety throughout the year.
With offices located at 406 East
11th Street in Austin, the Asso-
ciation is under the leadership
of Executive Director Terry
Townsend.

Industry Forecast -- Good

Members of the board of di-
rectors of the Haskell Industrial
Foundation met December 26
in the law office of Adkins and

Chapman.
Royce Adkins, J. E. Gipson,
Abe Turner, Bob Herren and
Belton Duncan will meet with
Herman Marcus officials in
Dallas today, December 28, to
discuss final plans in locating
the garment plant in Haskell.

Herman Marcus officials have
not obligated themselves to lo-
cating a plant in Haskell. Prelim-
inary indications all point
to the fact that if an agreement
can be made on several details
the plant will be located here.

H-M pays their employees on
a per piece rate and have re-
quested a subsidy during a
training period. The subsidy
would amount to the difference
between what H-M pays per
piece and minimum wage.

They have also asked for the
use of a building during the
training period and requested
that the Industrial Foundation
pay for wiring the building and
general upkeep on the building
during the training period. The
estimated cost for these items
is about \$40,000 to \$50,000.

The Industrial Foundation
will also have to build a 12,000
square foot building which H-M
will pay for on a lease or lease-
purchase agreement. The ap-
proximate cost of the building
would be between \$80,000.00 and
\$90,000.00.

H-M officials have said that if
the plant is located in Haskell
there would be about 75 em-
ployees at the end of the first
year and between 150 and 200
at the end of the second year.

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Bond Sales Reach 40%

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds for the 11-month period totaled \$25,928 in Haskell County. Of this amount, \$10,030 were purchased during the month of November, according to R. W. Herren, Chairman of the Haskell County Savings Bonds Committee.

During November, Texans purchased \$17,169,531 in Savings Bonds. The year-to-date sales amounted to \$194,211,487 for 98 percent of the state's goal of \$197.5 mil. National sales during the month totaled \$345 million, a 19.2 percent increase over 1971 sales of \$457 million. Jan. Nov. rates were \$5.7 billion for 109 percent of the national sales goal of \$5.3 billion. Exchanges of Series E and Savings Notes for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$308 million were reported for the first eleven months of 1972, 33 percent above the \$231 million exchanged in 1971.

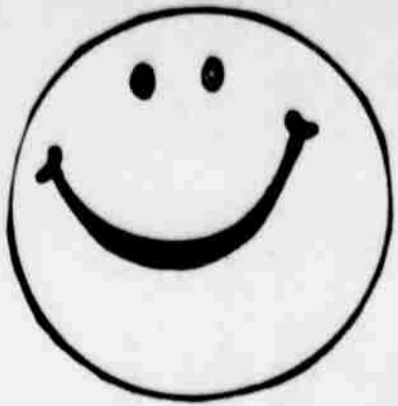

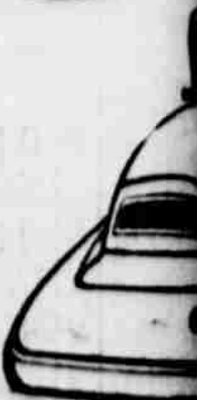

Cotton Classing

ABILENE
The cotton harvest is again in full swing, reports B. B. Manly, Jr., in charge of the Abilene Classing Office. The U. S. Dept. of Agriculture Office classified 41,000 samples last week, bringing the season total to 218,000 samples classed this season. At the same time last season 35,000 had been classed. Prices fluctuated, but remained about the same to 50 points lower. A 4231, premium mike, sold for 22.45 to 23.50 cents per pound. A 4131, premium mike, sold for 23.25 to 24.50.

The quality of cotton classed was a little lower in grade and micronaire. Some of the decline may be late planted cotton. Thirty-two percent was white, 66 percent light spotted, and 3 percent spotted. Percentages for the prior week were 40, 46, and 4 respectively. Twenty percent was barkey compared with 23 percent the prior week. The predominate staple continued to be 31 with 56 percent, followed by 32 with 27 percent. Only 71 percent was premium micronaire, with 27 percent below premium.

MUNDAY

Sample receipts increased sharply as favorable weather allowed harvesting to reach its peak in the area serviced by the Munday Cotton Classing Office, reports Sidney Ferrell, Officer-In-Charge. According to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, gathering operations are approximately 51 percent complete.

Quality statistics for the week ending Dec. 22, 1972, remained about the same as the previous week. Sixteen percent was classed as Strict Low Middling (41), compared to 20 percent the previous week. Fifteen percent was Low Middling (51), and 41 percent was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42). Twenty percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade due to bark or grass, compared to 22 percent the previous week. The staple length showed 11 percent staple 30, 44 percent staple 31, and 38 percent staple 32.

The micronaire readings continue to be reasonably good with 86 percent reading in the desirable range of 3.5-4.9. Thirteen percent read 5.0 and above.

The Pressley fiber strength tests conducted by the USDA's fiber laboratory at College Station, shows that the average strength was 78,000 pounds per square inch, unchanged from the previous week.

Cotton markets continue to be fairly active with farmers offering moderately. Eighteen to 25.50 cents per pound was paid for most grades offered with staple lengths of staple 30 through staple 33.

The Munday Office classed 9,805 samples this week, bringing the season's total to 51,294.

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Texas Farm Products Prices Up Slightly . . . Weather Factor in Harvest . . . Broiler Numbers Up . . . Turkey Hatch Increases . . .

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reports that the "All Farm Products Index Prices Received by Texas Farmers" was up slightly November 15 compared to a year ago. The increase was only a small percentage above prices in October but were 14 percent above a year ago.

The price index on livestock and livestock products weren't among those increasing. It was slightly below the previous month but 16 percent above 1971 prices at the same time. Hogs, sheep and lambs were up in prices but beef cattle and calves were down compared to October. Poultry was down and eggs were up in comparison to October prices, but both were up from a year ago. Milk prices were up in comparison to both times.

Cold, icy weather, which pushed deep into Texas, continued to delay harvest of Texas crops — a continuation of the same story a week earlier. Cotton harvest is reported about 49 percent complete, slightly ahead of the 1971 harvest; but cold, moist weather kept cotton harvest at a standstill on the low and high plains. Cotton has been ready for harvest in those areas since mid-November. The same story held true for grain sorghum farmers on the

Plains, but this harvest is about 98 percent complete. Peanut harvest is almost over. Tomato and pepper picking goes on in the Rio Grande Valley as the weather allows, but the cold is hampering activities there. A few cabbage have been marketed. The citrus harvest is reported at a slow pace because of adverse weather.

The freeze is reported to have killed many tender vegetables in the Winter Garden area, but carrots and cabbage were moving to market when the freezing weather hit.

Broiler chicks placed in Texas during the week ending December 2 totaled 3,341,000 which was three percent above the same week last year and one percent above the previous week. Arkansas shipped 63,000 broilers, and Texas shipped 171,000 broilers into Arkansas and Louisiana. Total hatch for the week ending Dec. 2 was also up to 3,449,000, which was three percent above a year ago and four percent above the previous week. Texas hatcheries set 4,125,000 eggs which was also slightly above a year ago but which was down slightly from the previous week.

Heavy breed turkey poult hatched in Texas for the same period was 96,000, which was 17 percent above the same week in 1971; but eggs set for the heavy breed poult was 122,000, down 25 percent from a year ago. There were 8,000 light breed poult hatched the week

ending Dec. 2 and 6,000 the same week in 1971. There were no light breed eggs set compared to 11,000 a year ago.

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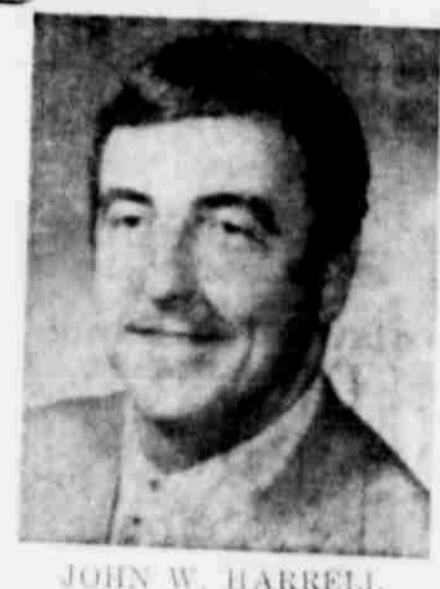
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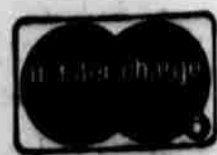
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
