a per piece rate and have requested a subsidy during a training period. The subsidy would amount to the difference between what H-M pays per piece and minimum wage.

They have also asked for the use of a building during the training period and requested that the Industrial Foundation pay for wiring the building and general upkeep on the building during the training period. The estimated cost for these items is about \$49,000 to \$50,000.

The Industrial Foundation will also have to build a 12,000 square foot building which H-M will pay for on a lease or leasepur hase agreement. The approximate cost of the building would be between \$80,000.00 and 890,000.09

H-M officials have said that if the plant is located in Haskell there would be about 75 employees at the end of the first year and between 150 and 200 at the end of the second year.
