'Lopes Blast Whirlwinds 36-0 In Season Finale

closed out their regular season last Friday night at Floydada, completely annihilating the Whirlwinds, 36-0. It was the first time the Antelopes had beaten the Winds since 1967, and the win this year still gives the Lopes a possible chance at a share of the District 4-AA title....provided the Lock-ney Longhorns beat the Idalou Wildcats this Friday

The Lopes finished the season with a 7-1-2 record, with 3-1 in District 4-AA competition. Idalou is currently 3-0 in conference play, the only team to beat Abernathy this year.

The Lopes continually blasted through Floydada's defense, racking up a total of 592 yards, 448 on the of 592 yards, 448 on the ground and 144 through the air, while the Lopes' stingy defense allowed the Winds a mere 166 total yards.

The leading rusher for the Antelopes was Sylvester Dunn, who carried 18 times for 238 yards and two TDs, while teammate Kenneth Sanders added an even 100 yards on 14 rushes, quarterback Tony Heath accounted for 176 yards, 32 rushing and 144 through the air, as he completed 7 of 19 passes.Others adding yardage for the Lopes included Mike Flores with 52 yards, Tony Cox with 20, and Kennith Moss with 10.Dean McGuire, who had 3 catches for 58 yards and 1 touchdown. carried once but lost 4 vards.





LETTER TO ANTELOPE COACHES

There are several things that I would like to say to you in an attempt to express my feelings at the end of a rather important football season in my own life -- the one that marks the end of my son's high school football

First, I want to say that there is no doubt in my mind that this year's Abernathy Antelopes are far and away the best team in this district; that they are, in fact, as fine a collection of athletic talent in one place at one time as any

school could ever hope to muster. We are terribly. achingly, proud of the way that they have represented our community on the playing field this year.

1 may not be your typ-

ical football fan; 1 expect that Vince Lombardi would have had little use for me. But, as much as I love winning,I do not believe it to be the only criteria in evaluating a football team, a coaching staff, or a football season, Don't misunderstand me; I've gloried in this year's victories. I've boasted about our successes to everyone who'd listen. But there are other things that I'll remember just as long as I'll remember the win-loss the sight of an record: Antelope helping a player from the opposing team up off the field -- after the Antelope has just knocked him down; the sight of the Antelopes in a critical moment standing together holding hands and drawing strength from each other as they prepared for the next play the encouragement the team members showed to one of their own after he had made a good (or maybe not-so-good) play; the absolute tenacity with which the Antelopes played until the final buzzer -- not infrequently pulling some endof-the-game stunts that dazzled the fans and won the game; the sight of an injured player on crutches,

flying up and down the sidelines, shouting encouragement and advice to his teammates on the field; the

Antelopes on the field after the game, shaking the hands of their opponents. These memories and many others embody the courage, sportsmanship, and spirit that will stand these young men in good stead all the days of their lives. And these are the concepts that you, as coaches, are largely responsible for having instilled in

them.

Since in my lifetime! have seen coaches of quite another type. I have been aware all along of just how grateful! I should be for the fact that my explain had the fact that my son has had the fact that my son has had the privilege of playing football under the direction of men of character and integrity. I want you to know that appreciate the fact that with you, the boys' welfare came first; you were not willing to sacrifice your players in a win-at-any-cost philosophy. Thank you for teaching them that good sportsman-ship is one mark of a real man. Thank you for building their confidence, so that when the chips were really down, they believed that they could do great things-and they often did. And thank you for helping to make playing football so much fun for them. Why


