HOPE-A return to usual traffic patterns along the highway so you can go the same way you always have and get to the place you expect every time-NOT YET but the situation is better than this time last HOPE-To see the high-

way finished-NOPE. HOPE-To see someone put in a restaurant right downtown-GRANTED. Johnny Jennings opened his restaurant on Ave.D. Then Donald Robison remodeled a building and installed a steak-

HOPE-To see every business in town close for one day and clean up their alleys and make the outsides of their buildings neat and lot owners clean off weeds and junk on their property-SORT OF. No special day was set aside but the city council passed and enforced a building code which got

rid of a lot of old ruins. HOPE-To see all the city streets paved, the dog ordinance enforced, more stop signs put up-SOME GRANTED. The city council promoted a paving program but got few takers.

A few of the more troublesome ones were paved, however, like the street by the funeral home. First State Bank and adjacent property owners even paved their alley which made the downtown area much nicer to travel and look at. As for the dog ordinance and stop it depends on your point of view.

HOPE-To see property owners do a better job of keeping up their property and take pride in the app-earance of our town-NOT MUCH DIFFERENCE.

HOPE-A lot of good things would happen and not so many bad-DEPENDS on your point of view. HOPE-(an often expres-

sed one)-A Pizza Hut for Abernathy-NOPE.Sorry, kids. HOPE-Safe year Abernathians through all the highway construction work-We did RATHER WELL.

HOPE-To see some community recreation facilities, including a swim-ming pool-NOPE. A move was on to plan a recreation facility in connection with school system but it didn't pan out. Nobody but mothers and kids thinks a swimming pool for school or community is a good idea.

HOPE-To get the highway fixed so people can get from one side to the other-GRANTED.

#### LOOKING BACK TO 1959

(By Jacquelyn Smyers) Americans held prisoner in Iran, a homeless Shah, terrorists doing what they please wherever they please, government blunders -- it's hard to be optimistic about the new year. No matter what dangers the world faces though. everyday life for most people stays the same.

We checked back issues of The Weekly Review to see what happened in Abernathy when other years were just beginning. Here's a summary of the news for January 1, 1959.....

On Christmas Eve. Three shots were fired at an be the LORD, who daily loadeth unnamed local man who went to the post office to get his mail about 8 PM. The man fell to the floor to dodge bullets which all missed.

The lucky citizen was one of two who discovered evidences of burglary at the post office that evening.One stayed while the other went for Deputy Sheriff Jay Daniel. A hidden burglar or burglars then made their get-away, firing at the man who stayed. Daniel was at Bridges Mobile Station getting his car serviced but the burglar got away by the time he could get to the post

Acting postmaster Herbert T. Hardin determined that the only post office property missing was two Colt. 45 revolvers and about 100 rounds of ammunition, 1917 issue. The burglar took \$4 to \$6 of American Legion funds Hardin kept in a box at the post office, opened about 11 Christmas packages

The Weekly Review commissioned artist Billy C. Brown of Lubbock to design a medallion for its exclusive use during Abernathy's Golden Anniversary Year, 1959.

His art work depicted a pioneer scene of a covered wagon being drawn by a yoke of oxen across the Plains country. The town's slogan "In the Palm of the Plains" was included in the

design.
Brown was a commercial artist on the staff of the Craig& Webster Advertising Agency in Lubbock.



#### Pioneer Hi-Bred Announces Major Poll On Transportation Issues

PLAINVIEW--JANUARY 2, 1980 -- Texas farmers will have a unique opportunity to be heard on grain transportation issues through a poll announced today by Pioneer Hi-Bred Internat-

ional, Inc. James W. Lindsey president of Pioneer's Southwestern Division, today outlined details of the "Pioneer Poll on Grain Transportation' to be conducted in 16 major agricultural states to gather farmers' opinions on the current crisis in grain transportation.

The purpose," Lindsey said, "is to find out exactly how serious our current transportation problems are, how they affect farmers in various regions and what farmers think should be done.

Subject areas include rural roads and bridges, railroads, barge lines as well as rates and regulations affecting grain carriers.

Every questionnaire will be electronically scanned to provide the total result. Findings of this poll should provide the most complete picture yet of the current relationship of transportation and the American farmer, according to Lindsey

# Gasohol In Texas Still In Question

While other states are proceeding with the large-scale production of alcohol to be used as "fuel extenders", such as "gasohol", attempts to develop a Texas alcohol fuels industry is still encountering political problems.

Questions of interpretation concern ing recently-passed Texas law and the role of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission continue to re-appear. State Senator Raul Longoria (D. Edinburg) as chairman of the Special Commmittee on Gasohol in the Texas Senate, has requested an Attorney General's opinion regarding portions of the new law as well as an opinion on existing laws, their interpretation and enforcement by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. Prompting Senator Longoria's request for the Attorney General's opinion was the Alchoholic Beverage Commission's (ABC) interpretation of the law last summer. Gasohol legislation had earlier been stalled in the Liquor Regulation Committee of the Texas House of Representatives until a compromise was agreed upon by the pro-gasohol proponents, the liquor lobby and the ABC's representatives to the Legislature.

Senator Longoria's request for an Attorney General's opinion centers around several questions, including

ownership, leasing arrangements, and the holding of dual permits by the same person or company.

The ABC interpretation restricts gasohol production to Texas residents only, forbidding out-of-state companies from locating new facilities in Texas as well as prohibiting the production of alcohol for cosmetics, pharmaceuticals, medicines and for food additives. Currently, alcohol production as a beverage is not allowed in Texas although liquors can be produced in Texas with imported, non-Texas alcohol

The ABC's interpretation of the new Texas law has been criticized by State Senators lately in light of Texas being
