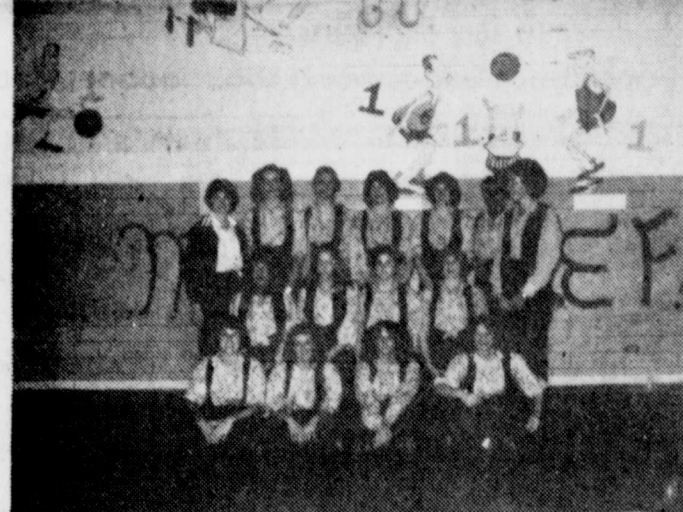
AHS Antelopes Defeat Tulia Hornets For District Title

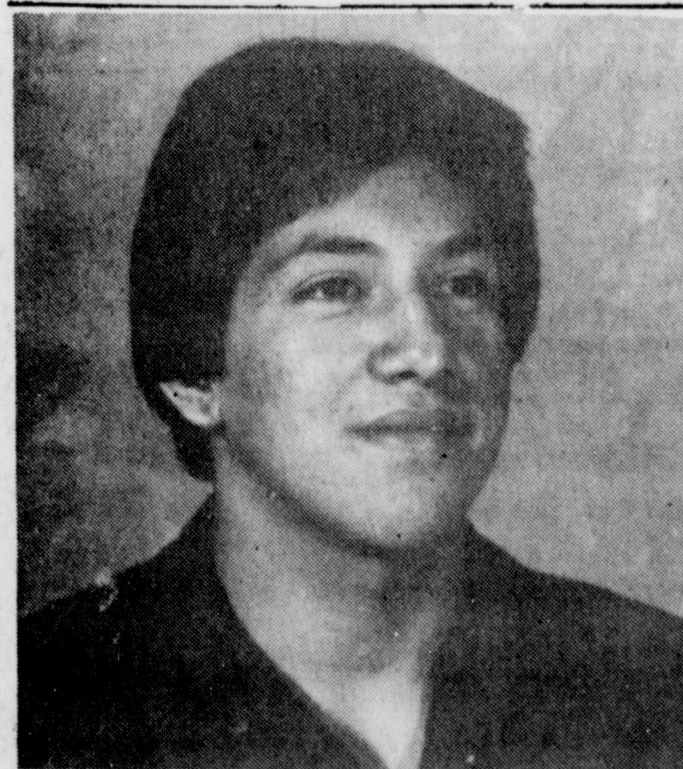


The Lady Lopes', Coach Diana Lewis and assistant coach Betty Cagle.

Texas Assessment

All fifth and ninth grade students from the Abernathy Independent School District will participate in the first Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for March, 1980.

The assessment plan, first of its kind in this state, will be scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session.

The Abernathy I.S.D. students will be among 500,000 expected to take the reading writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February 25-March 12 statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

The Abernathy I.S.D. will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to Dr. Delwin Webb, district superintendent. However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents, or guardian, and the school personnel directly involved, Dr. Webb adds.

"This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement," Mr. Charles Bowen, director, points out. "For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective."

Third grade students will be added to the annual sequence during the 1980-81 school year, according to plans announced by the Texas Education Agency. The three tests will make up

TEXAS ASSESSMENT OF BASIC SKILLS February 25-March 12 FACT SHEET

The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills is a series of three subject area tests to be taken by students in three different grades: 3rd, 5th, and 9th. The subjects are: reading, writing (composition), and mathematics. The testing program, mandated under Senate Bill 350 (School Finance Law) passed by the 66th Texas Legislature in 1979, will be implemented by the Texas Education Agency. Details of the test plan, purpose, and reports are presented below.

TEST PLAN
 The first Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test series will be administered to all 5th and 9th grade students between February 25 and March 12, 1980. Third grade students will be added to the annual sequence beginning with the 1980-81 school year.

Number of Students To Be Tested--Approximately 500,000 in 1980, increasing to 750,000 when third grade is added in 1980-81.

Exemptions--All students with physical or mental impairment or who have a learning disability which prevents mastery of the skills will be exempted. However, other students who are absent the day the tests are given will be asked to take them at another time.

TEST PURPOSE
 The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills is designed to provide solid data on the learning achievement of selected groups of students (3rd, 5th, 9th grades) in reading, writing (composition), and mathematics. The aggregate and individual results will pinpoint specific areas for improvement in both curriculum and instruction. The Texas Education Agency and the school districts will use these results--and the accompanying data analysis--to design immediate improvements.

Of Basic Skills

an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services, states Mr. Bowen.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

Westinghouse DataScore Systems of Iowa City, Ia., will both help administer the 1980 test program and develop and field test new items for the 1980-81 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The Iowa firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

Each test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular grade.

"We use the term 'criterion-referenced' simply because it is a short way of saying the answer to each question must lead back to a specific objective," Bowen explains.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. However, they will not be required to take it more than once. Later attempts to improve their scores and evaluate any remedial programs will be voluntary.

The annual test program will be administered by specially-trained personnel in each school district under the guidelines and supervision of the Texas Education Agency.

Franklin Dunn Seeks Post Of Pct 3 Commissioner In Lubbock County

Franklin Dunn, New Deal area farmer is a Democratic candidate for Lubbock County Commissioner, Precinct 3.

One of his chief interests is seeing that county roads are properly maintained.

In the last 3 years we have seen an increase of 300% in county tax on rural property. For this increase we in Precinct 3 have not gained one foot of paved road except for the Tech farm road and only 8 miles caliche.

Lubbock County is one of the richest agriculture counties in the state yet there are some people in the northeast part of the county, Precinct 3, with the same dirt roads that they had when the roads were first built and in many cases these have large washes across them and are generally poorly maintained. Many are several miles to the nearest hard surface road.

Our hospital tax almost equals our county tax, yet we have a debt of approximately 7 million dollars at the hospital.

During the last 3 years, Commissioners Court has approved the building of a \$4.5 million jail facility which they say will be "as modern and up to date facility as any jail in the country." The sheriff asked the court recently for 7 people to man the jail so it could be staffed with the needed personnel--they approved 4 and okayed buying televisions for the prisoners entertainment.

The Commissioners voted themselves a 23.4% increase in salary, the rest of the county employees 8%, and will not allocate funds for more deputies for the rural area or for added fire protection.

The Commissioners tell us the county has \$9 million in reserve, drawing \$840,000 interest. If this money was needed to run the county business--perhaps we have been over taxed.

Mr. Dunn is a lifelong resident of Precinct 3, a director of Plains Cotton Growers, chairman of the Administrative Board of Idalou United Methodist Church and active in the American Agriculture movement. He has served on the New Deal School Board and has served as president and a director of the Lubbock County Farm Bureau.

Mr. Dunn plans to be a full time commissioner, if elected. He does not feel it is right for a person to hold this job while employed at another full time job. He needs your support!

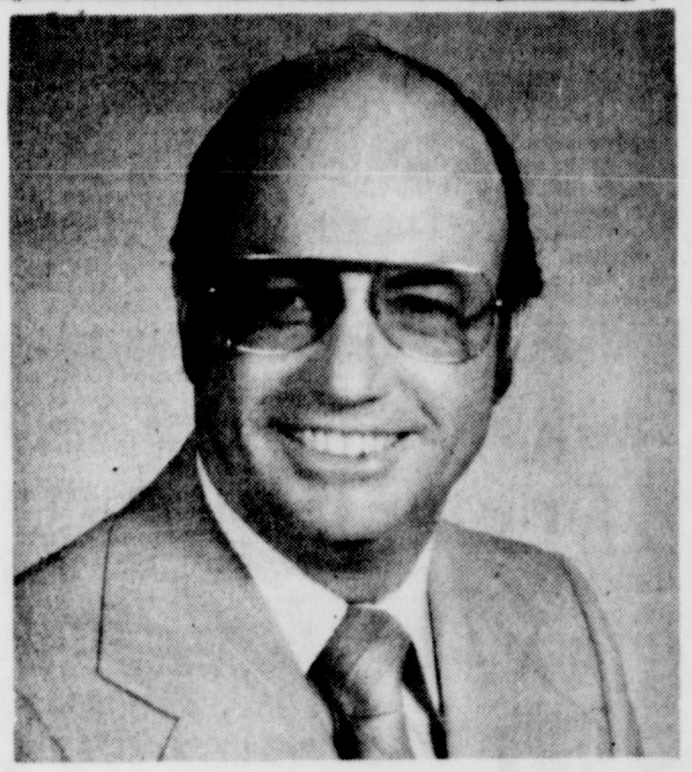
Dunn is self-employed, and can give full-time to the office of Precinct 3 Commissioner in Lubbock County.

Artie Nivens Candidate For Office of Sheriff

Artie Nivens of Hale Center, a resident of Hale County nearly all his life, has announced his candidacy for sheriff of Hale County, subject to the Democratic Primary, May 3.

A native of Wise County, he has resided in the Hale Center area for many years. He was reared near the old Saigland Ranch between Hale Center and Abernathy and attended school at Iowa Avenue, Abernathy and Hale Center.

Because of past experience in law enforcement, Nivens feels he is fully qualified to perform the duties of the office of sheriff in a responsible manner. He has completed approximately seven years of law enforcement, including three years as a Hale County deputy under the late Sheriff Ted Andrews and four years with the Plainview Police Department.

"I had the privilege of serving as a deputy under one of Hale County's most highly respected peace officers, the late Ted Andrews for years," he explained. "He was a strong advocate of law and order who was trusted by everyone, but he also was concerned about the welfare of his fellowman, good or bad, and was compassionate and reasonable. I gained valuable experience from working under him and from observing his philosophy in law and order," Nivens said.

Nivens stated that he believes the duties of the sheriff's office should be broad enough to include a special concern for teenage life in connection with law and order. "The sheriff's office should be well informed at all times on what's going on in activities of the young generation, including children, and should be prepared to follow a responsible course of action in case of problems," he continued. "It is especially important for the sheriff's department to use its resources to communicate with parents in efforts to prevent senseless situations such as the one involving teenagers in a neighboring county that led to violence."

Nivens added that he believes in strong and effective law enforcement programs, but said he feels that conservative spending also is essential in maintaining the services of the sheriff's office. The sheriff's office should be responsible for preserving practical and business-like spending practices," he said.

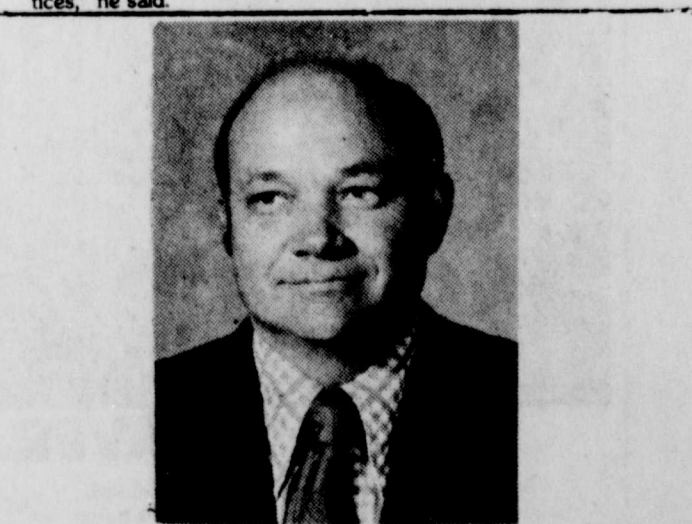
TV Crew To Film Waits' Weed Operation

City Sales Tax Receipts Up 36%

Abemathy's city sales tax receipts for the two-month period ending Jan. 31, 1980, amounted to \$4,682.35, compared with the \$3,371.33 check for the period ending Jan. 31, 1979, showing an increase of 36% for 1980. Both show totals for December and January. Abemathy city sales tax for January, 1980, amounted to \$2,935.62, compared with \$1,913.29 for January, 1979. Sales tax receipts for December, 1979 were \$1,746.76, compared with \$1,458.04 for December, 1978.

CITY COUNCIL REPORT FROM FEBRUARY 11 MEETING

The Council set a fee of \$10.00 for the city on the Dog Control Ordinance. Other items on the agenda were tabled or no action taken at the present time.

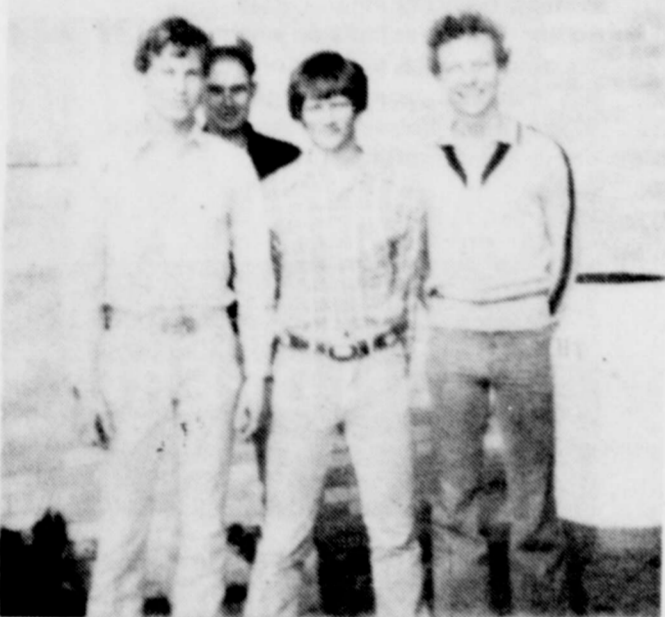

Texas Assessment Of Basic Skills (cont from page 1)

TEST DESIGN
New testing instruments, each measuring material believed essential for all Texas public school students in the grades to be tested, have been developed. The reading and mathematics tests are based on specific objectives developed for Texas students in 1973. The writing composition tests were developed specially for the Texas Assessment Project by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J., in cooperation with the Texas Education Agency, based on objectives developed for Texas students.

Type of Test----The reading and mathematics tests are criterion-referenced or objective-based. That is, each question is keyed back to a specific objective already built into the curriculum. Thus, each student competes against the test itself, not against other students. (In the more widely-used norm-referenced tests) the student's score is compared with those made by other students.) Although the TABS test instruments will focus on specific Texas objectives for students, they will follow a standardized test format which can be graded by computer.

Writing (Composition): Something Special--Students will take both multiple choice and essay tests in writing. In the first instance, each student will be asked to respond to objective questions on a piece of writing included on the test. These answers will help determine his or her understanding of the mechanics of writing. The essay answer, on the other hand, will demonstrate the student's ability to express ideas or paper.

In the second instance, each student will be asked to write a single simple letter or paragraph on a specific subject. These short pieces of writing will help determine each student's ability to present ideas on paper in a well-organized manner. These writings examples will be each be scored by two specially trained graders, with a third reading if necessary to reach a final verdict.

Key Test Points---The following key points will be covered by the 5th and 9th grade tests in 1980.

Writing (both grades): Spelling, handwriting, punctuation, capitalization, standard word usage, sentence structure, organization of ideas, appropriateness.

Reading (5th grade): Identification of main idea; recall of specific facts; sequence of events; ability to draw logical conclusions; use of context to determine word meanings; and use of an index, maps, chart, graphs.

Mathematics (5th grade): geometric terms; place value; whole numbers; word problems; units of measurement; factors; additions, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers.

Reading (9th grade): evaluation of information, difference between fact and non-fact, inferences and logical conclusions, following written directions, sources of information.

Mathematics (9th grade): personal records, use of ratios and percents, word problems, simple measurement problems, addition, subtraction, multiplication, division.

Exit Level/9th Grade--The exit level tests will be administered to students in the 9th grade. They focus on the essential basic skills a student should master before leaving however, may re-take it each year through the 12th grade. While this re-testing is not required by the Texas Education Agency, it may be used voluntarily by the student and/or the school district as a means of developing and then evaluating remedial programs.

Field Testing----The complete series of tests was field-tested with more than 4,000 students throughout the state in October, 1979. As a result, a number of test questions were sharpened or replaced.

Future Tests--A number of new questions will be inserted into each test during the coming years, both to make sure the information is as current as possible and to help maintain test security. As these questions will retain the same level of difficulty, they will not change the overall purpose of the tests.

Test Time--While the tests will vary in difficulty according to grade, each is expected to require a maximum time of 40 to 60 minutes to complete. The writing (composition) test, for example, will require no more than 40 minutes while the 5th grade mathematics test will run for a maximum of 60 minutes.

Senate Bill 350 requires school district boards of trustees to report their

aggregate scores--by district and by campus--at an open meeting to the citizens of the community. The Texas Education Agency will make these results available to the schools in time to allow planning of remedial and other programs for the following school year. Under its contract with the State Board of Education, Westinghouse DataScore Systems, Inc., is required to report scores to the school districts by May 1, 1980.

However, statewide and regional aggregate scores are not expected to be available to the Texas Education Agency until June, 1980. Also, public reports may be delayed by additional time needed for a thorough analysis of the "raw" data. A district may, in other words, need more time to determine precisely what the scores mean to each school and the students it serves. However, it is expected that all district boards of trustees will report their local results by June 30, 1980. Statewide and regional results will be reported to the State Board of Education at its June 14, 1980, meeting in Austin.

Aggregate Scores--Total or aggregate scores will be reported by school district and by individual campus. These aggregate results will include percentage breakdowns by specific student category including: ethnicity, sex, migrant education, Title I support, and any special education category, such as physical or emotional handicap, learning disability, speech handicap, or other handicap which would still allow regular classroom participation.

Individual Scores--Each student's individual scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian, and educators directly concerned. The results will be used to design remedial programs or other special work, if necessary.

TEXAS ASSESSMENT OF BASIC SKILLS QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
(Note: You will get questions, questions, questions from parents, staff members, interested taxpayers, and news media reporters. Naturally, they will expect instant and accurate answers. Here are a few pump primers...)

#What is the purpose of TABS?

To assess the basic skills achievement of specific groups of students in reading, writing, and mathematics for two primary reasons: (1) Determine the learning needs of 5th and 9th grade students, and (2) Gather and analyze the data necessary to help schools develop more effective programs to meet the needs of certain individuals and groups.

#Who will take the test?

All 5th and 9th grade students this year. Third graders will be added to the annual testing sequence in 1980-81. Only students with physical or mental impairments or learning disabilities which prevent mastery of the skills will be exempt.

#Is TABS a single test?

No. Different test instruments will be used for each subject and grade level. A number of items will be replaced with new, field-tested questions each year in order to maintain security and insert current material.

#Why do 9th grade students take an "exit level" test?

The "exit level" test includes the minimum learning objectives each Texas student should achieve before leaving school. If a student does not score well on these objectives in the 9th grade, special/ remedial programs may be designed for both individuals and groups. The student may then continue to re-take the test during the remaining three public school years. Although districts will be required to

offer the remedial programs, student will not--under Texas Education Agency guidelines--be required to re-take the test.

#What is a criterion-referenced test?

Test questions are tied directly to specific objectives or skills each student is expected to achieve in reading, writing, and mathematics.

#Can scores from criterion-referenced tests be used to predict a student's performance on a nationally normed test?

Yes. This can be done mathematically. While the result is not exact, it can give schools a reasonably accurate reading on comparative groups of students.

#Will TEA provide this kind of criterion-to-norm-referenced translation of TABS?

Yes. We expect this information to be available to the schools about May 1, along with other student performance data.

#Can a student "cram" for the TABS tests?

No. The exams cover material the student has learned all through his or her years in school.

#Who will administer the test?

Westinghouse DataScore Systems, under its contract with the State Board of Education, is responsible for maintaining total test security. Each test booklet will be numbered, listed on computer tape, collected after the test is given, and returned to Westinghouse. A detailed computerized inventory will keep track of every booklet.

#How long are the tests?

Maximum time allotted ranges from 40 minutes to 60 minutes per test. However, many students are expected to complete them well before this maximum is reached.

#If my child scores well, can I assume he or she is bright?

The TABS tests are not designed to measure intelli-

gence. Rather, they are designed to measure specific learning objectives in specific subjects. The results may provide reasonable indicators, but they will not give "intelligence quotient" reports.

#Will the TABS results be made public?

Yes. Senate Bill 350, passed during the 1979 session of the Texas Legislature, mandates the whole program. The law also requires that school district and campus aggregate scores be released to the public and press at a meeting of the board of trustees. Individual student scores, however, will be given only to the student, parents, and school staff directly involved.

#Will the Texas Education Agency release any test scores?

Statewide aggregate and regional aggregate scores will be released by the Texas Education Agency during the summer. Other scores will be sent direct to the school districts from the scoring center in Iowa City, Ia.

#How will school districts use the TABS results?

School districts will analyze the results to determine the strong and weak points in their instructional programs. Then, during the summer, the district and school faculty will plan both remedial programs and other new approaches to meet student needs.

#What are some of the objectives to be tested?

Fifth and ninth grade students will be tested on similar areas in writing. These include: spelling, handwriting, punctuation, capitalization, standard word usage, sentence structure, organization of ideas, and a propriateness of response to the purpose and the audience.

The fifth grade reading test will focus on identification of the main idea, recall of specific facts,

sequence of events, drawing logical conclusions, use of context to determine word meanings, use of an index, maps, charts, and graphs.

The ninth grade reading test will include evaluation of information, discrimination between fact and non-fact, making inferences and drawing logical conclusions, following written directions, and use of sources to locate information.

The fifth grade math test will include identifying geometric terms, interpreting place value, writing whole numbers, solving word problems, units of measurement, identifying factors, etc.

Ninth grade math questions will contain problems in personal records, use of ratios and percents, word problems, measurement problems, additions, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

For the fifth grade test, sixth grade teachers will give the test. For the ninth grade test, teachers that have not taught the students before will give the test, no teacher can test a student that they have taught previously.

February 20th there will be a practice test to familiarize students with this two day test, but this has nothing to do with the exam to be given on the third and fourth of March. The seal on the Basic Skills has not been broken and cannot be broken until the day of the test, and it can only be broken by the students.
