JOHN TOWER SPEAKS LIBRARY NEWS

WASHINGTON---U.S. Sen. John Tower (R-Texas) today called on the Senate to repudiate some provisions

on the Model State Adoption Act, which he said are in unwarranted federal intrusion into state affairs, and, if enacted would set up barriers to adoption. The model act was

written by a panel set up under a 1978 law with the purpose of finding ways to eliminate barriers to adoption, particularly of children with "special needs.

But, Tower charged that the panel went far beyond its congressional mandate. For instance, one provision of the model act would allow any biological father, including rapists, incestrous family members. sperm doners and 'hit and run lovers," veto power over a proposed adoption. Tower The senior senator from

Texas also objected to provisions which would set looser standards for individuals arranging adoptions than for licensed agencies: allow parents to retract adoption releases within a specified time after they are given, open records to adult adopees, and make it easier for biological parents to intrude into adult adoptees' lives.

Tower said he is not necessarily opposed to opening adoption records, but rather believes that states should decide if and how it should be done. "I am aware that the

panel's work is only the draft of the model state act. Nevertheless, it is the first time, that the federal government has intervened to such extend in this area," Tower asserted.

Tower introduced a Sense of the Senate resolution which would express the Senate's concern that these provisions if enacted would make adoption more difficult -- in direct opposition intent--and congressional exceed the authority granted
