**CPR Students Need Review**

COLLEGE STATION--- Follow-up cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training is essential to keep in practice, advises Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist.

It may take more than a four-hour crash course to save a life, she points out.

Dr. Shirer is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

More than seven million Americans have received training in CPR which, promptly applied, can save the life of a heart attack victim.

But, CPR students quickly forget what they learned in the basis four-hour course without some follow-up review, the specialist explains.

If CPR certification is more than a year old, take a refresher course to practice the technique again. This is necessary to maintain an adequate performance level.

Also, the CPR students should spend as much time as possible practicing on mannikins, Dr. Shirer adds.

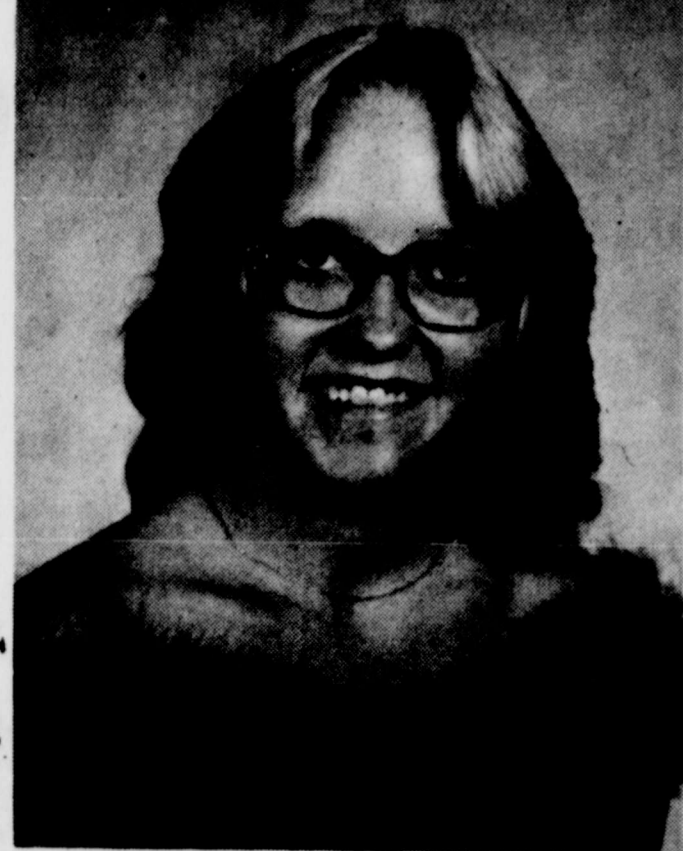

#### RECIPES:

#### WHACKIE CAKE

1 1/2 cups flour  
1 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons cocoa  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt

Sift all together into mixing bowl. Make 3 holes, 1 teaspoon vanilla in to first hole, 1 tablespoon vinegar in to second hole, 6 tablespoons melted shortening in to 3rd hole.

Pour 1 cup water into mixture, mix well. Bake in 9x13 inch pan at 350 degrees for 25-20 minutes.

Want to take along a tossed salad: Freeze small butter dishes, half filled with water. Attach lids, bury into salad which is placed in large bowl. Wrap whole thing into heavy towels.

Smelly thermos bottles or jugs, no problem. Soak over night in a solution of 4 tablespoons baking soda to filled jug of warm water. Next morning swish and shake well. Rinse in clear water.

#### SOUR KRAUT SALAD

2 cups or #1 can kraut clipped with scissors to short lengths  
1/2 cup sugar mix into kraut, let stand 1/2 hour  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup shredded carrots  
1/2 cup bell pepper (red or green)

Mix into kraut, chill 12 hours before serving.

Hints: To prevent shrinkage in hamburger patties when grilling dip each patty into cold water before cooking. For extra flavor, aroma, and zip to a cook out toss onion peels onto coals.

### Immunization Requirements

For several years, state laws have required all students to be immunized against certain diseases before entering school. Beginning with the 1980-81 school term, this will be strictly enforced.

Students entering school next fall must have on file, or bring to school, medical certification certifying that they have received the required immunizations. Students will not be allowed to enroll without this certification.

The following are the legal requirements for students entering school next fall.

Section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required immunizations:

(a) Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs:

Three doses of oral polio.

Three doses of DTP vaccines.

One dose each of measles, rubella and mumps vaccine.

(b) Children enrolled in kindergarten through grade five:

At least three doses of oral polio vaccine with the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4.

At least three doses of DTP but one dose must have been received after age 4.

All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness.

Mumps vaccine is required for all students through seven years of age.

(c) Students in grade six through twelve:

All students must have received at least three doses of oral polio vaccine provided one or more doses has been received after age 4.

All students must have received at least three doses of DTP with at least one dose having been received after age 4.

Effective September 1, 1979, students twelve years of age and all students enrolled in the sixth grade, will be required to have received measles vaccine or after their first birthday or provide a history of measles illness. On September 1 of each year thereafter, students one year older or one grade higher must meet these requirements.

Rubella vaccine is required for students through age 11. (Not after the 12th birthday)

Tetanus-diphtheria (TD) boosters are required every 10 years.

In addition to these required immunizations, a new law requires that each student must have on file, or furnish, an official birth certificate from the Health Department, baptismal records or birth registration cards (Blue cards) will no longer be acceptable.

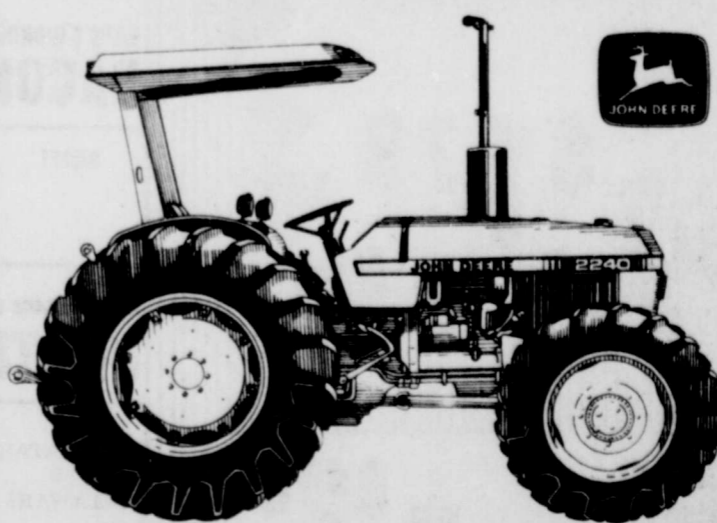
