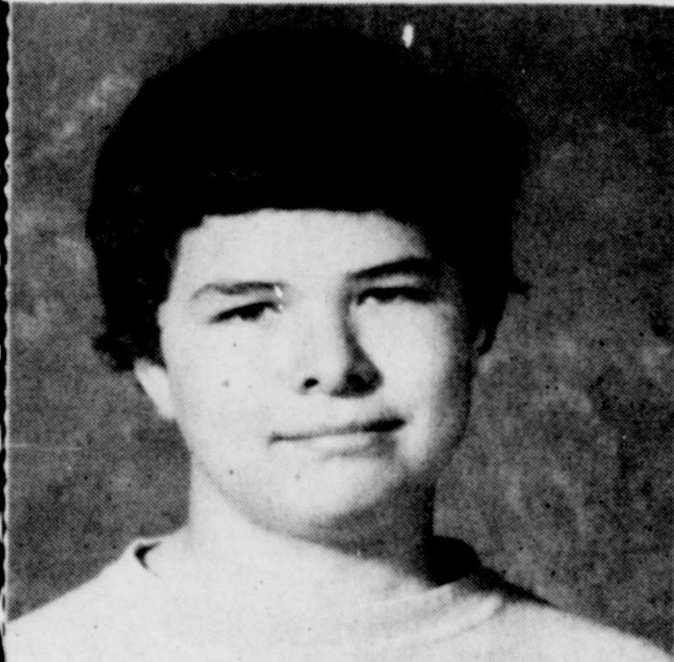

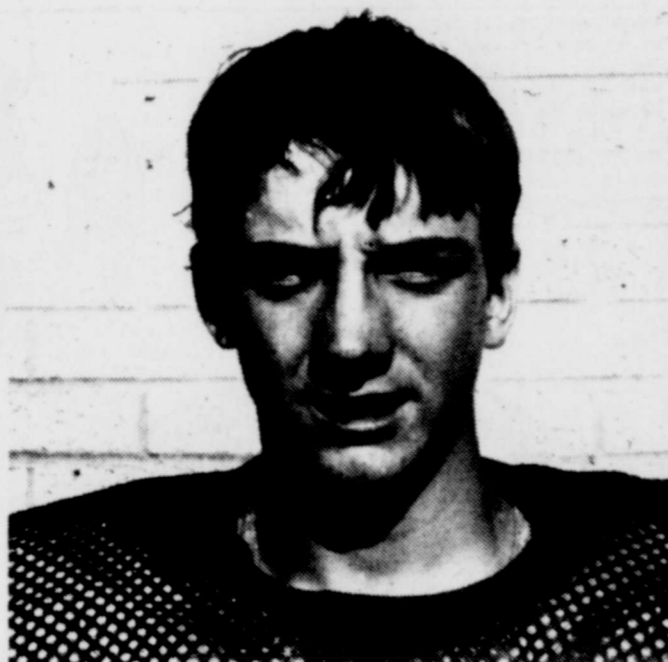

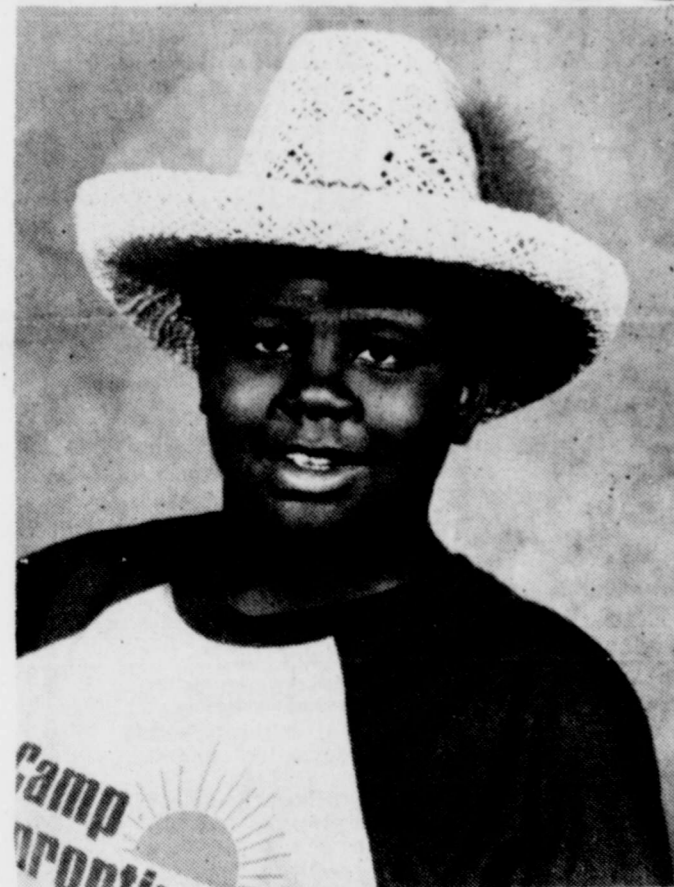

School Board Has Meeting October 6

The board of education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session Monday, October 6th in the conference room of the high school. The invocation was given by Mr. Jerry Oswalt.

A presentation by Mr. Sharp highlighted the other-wise routine meeting. Mr. Sharp made a visual presentation of the TABS (Texas Assessment of Basic Skills) results. These tests were given to 5th and 9th graders last spring. The results of Abernathy students show they were well above the state averages in many areas of reading, writing, and arithmetic. The same type of tests will be administered in February to the 3rd, 5th and 9th graders.

Formal action items on the agenda included the approval of various fund raising activities by clubs and classes of the local schools. Approved were:

- A. Band Magazine and record sales
- B. FFA fruit and popcorn; scrap metal at gigs
- C. FHA stock show concession
- D. HERO-one meal and manufactured items
- E. JUNIOR CLASS-Play
- F. SENIOR CLASS-Play and bake sale

Approval was granted to FFA students to attend stock shows in Dallas, San Antonio, and Houston. The board directed the administrators to prepare guidelines for other overnight student trips and to present them at a later date.

Two additional transfer students were accepted in accordance with Texas Education Agency guidelines. Dr. Webb was authorized to seek bids from local agents for boiler insurance and for a floater policy on band uniforms and instruments. He was also directed

to accept the low bid on these policies.

An official tax roll of \$252,025,190 was along with taxes receivable of \$2,142,396.92. Delinquent taxes collectable and receivable totaled \$65,578.32.

An oral report of a Texas Education Agency bilingual audit was presented. Mrs. Gutierrez of the Texas Education Agency was very complimentary of the local schools and found no discrepancy on violations to state mandated guidelines.

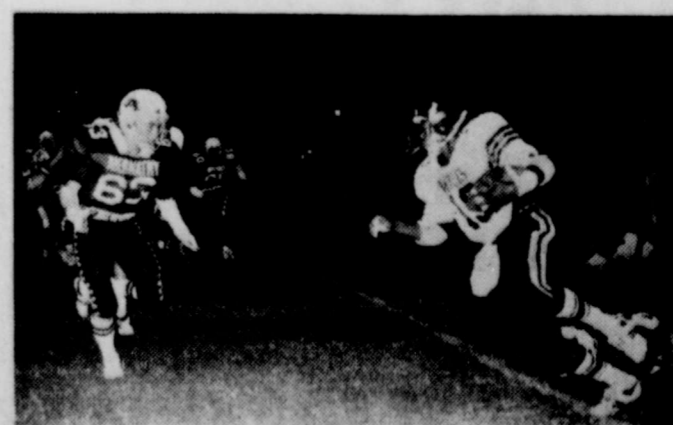
Other items on the agenda included correspondence from the University Interscholastic League which was discussed without any action being taken.

Enrollment reports showing that the elementary schools is 501, junior high-222, and high school-306. The total is still shy of the same time in 1979 but above the previous week.

The dress code and residential policies were discussed to see if they had presented any problems. None were reported by the administrators at this time.

The school nurse reported that 16 students had been referred for further vision examinations, 8 for further dental examinations, and 3 for further hearing examinations.

Capital Murder Indictment In Officer Shooting

A Lubbock County Grand Jury last week indicated a Lorenzo man in the shooting death of a Texas D.P.S. Trooper Sunday night, Oct. 5, near Slaton. Captured in Liberal, Kan., Tuesday evening, Oct. 7, was Billy Wayne Alexander, Jr., of Lorenzo, who is accused of shooting to death D.P.S. Trooper Jerry Don Davis, a former City of Abernathy Policeman.

Trooper Davis had stopped the Alexander car for a speeding violation near Slaton. After DPS headquarters in Lubbock lost radio contact with Trooper Davis, they called upon the Slaton police to investigate. They found the Trooper's body slumped over the steering wheel of his patrol car on US 84 Highway just south of Slaton. Davis suffered a bullet wound through the cheek and was still clutching a driver's license in his hand.

Reports indicated that Alexander's capital murder trial may take place in Lubbock in about three months. If a jury finds him guilty of murdering D.P.S. Trooper Davis, the jury will be obligated to assess the punishment of a life prison sentence or a death sentence for Billy Wayne Alexander, Jr., 21, of Lorenzo.

Jerry Don Davis, 25, served as night police patrolman in Abernathy from June to August in 1976.

Thanksgiving was celebrated in 1621 by our Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth. They had just passed through a year of famine, of sickness, and of death, and wanted to thank God for their many blessings and especially for providing food so generously in the Fall Harvest.

David, the Psalmist, who wrote the 23rd Psalm used so widely at funerals wrote the following priceless Psalm 100, which is one of Thanksgiving:

1. Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands.
2. Serve the Lord with gladness: come before His presence with singing.
3. Knew ye that the Lord He is God: it is He that hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are His people, and the sheep of His pasture.

4. Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise; be thankful unto Him, and bless His Name.
5. For the Lord is good: His mercy is everlasting; and His truth endureth to all generations.

Thank God for just being alive; for being able to walk, for being able to talk, for being able to hear, for being able to sit in a wheelchair, and for being able to pray.

It is easy to thank God for good health, but in pain and suffering we are also supposed to thank God and to praise God. This is showing trust in God's word which says, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose." (Rom. 8:28) And so we know that whatever comes to us in this life, God will bring good out of it, and thanking Him and praising Him drives out the devil and sin and causes God's spirit to greater indwell the believer.

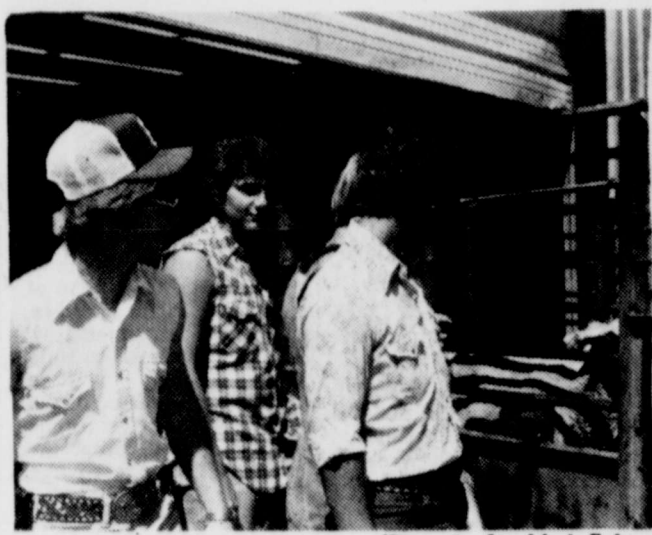

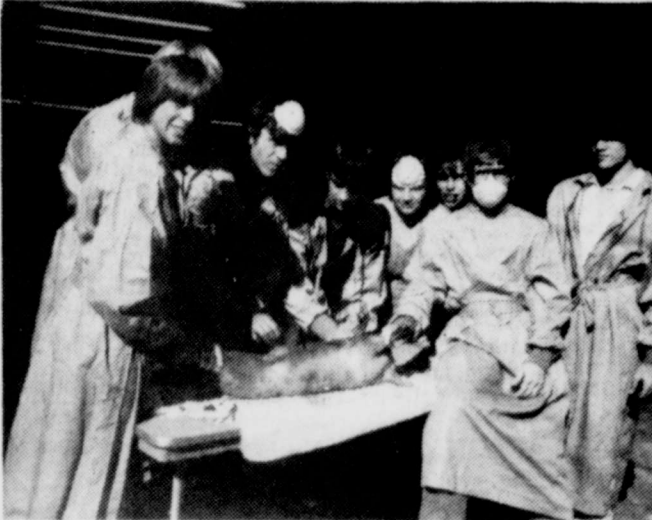
