



Captured in Liberal, Kans., Tuesday evening, Oct. 7, was Billy Wayne Alexander, Jr., of Lorenzo, who is accused of shooting to death D.P.S. Trooper Jerry Don Davis, a former City of Abernathy

Policeman. Trooper Davis had stop-ped the Alexander car for a speeding violation near After DPS head-Slaton. quarters in Lubbock lost radio contact with Trooper Davis, they called upon the Slaton police to investigate. They found the Trooper's body slumped over the steering wheel of his patrol car on US 84 Highway just south of Slaton. Davis suffered a bullet wound through the cheekand was still clutching
