Antelopes Lose Final Game

The AHS Antelopes of Coach Aldridge finished out the 1980 football season, last Friday night with a 20-7 loss to the undefeated Childress Bobcats. With the loss, the Lopes finished the season with a 5-5 record, winding up 2-3 in loop play.

The Lopes put up a good fight here Friday night, and the score could have been much closer than it was. After allowing two TDs in the first quarter, the Lopes held the Bobcats scoreless during the second period, then on their first possession of the second half, the Lopes drove 51 yards with quarterback Max Riley going the final 14 yards on an option for an apparent touchdown only to have it called back because of a clipping infraction against the Lopes.

This took something out of the Lopes, and four plays later they turned the ball over to the Cats on the Childress 11 yard line. From there, the Cats drove 89 yards for their final TD, climaxing the drive early in the fourth period with a 9 yard pass from quarterback Barry Johnson to David Tucker. The Lopes took the ensuing kickoff and marched 71 yards for their only score, with a pass from Riley to end Rodney Cannon covering the final 15 yards for the TD and Victor Dees kicked the extra point.

Representing District 3-AAA, Childress will play District 4-AAA champion Slaton at 8 p. m. Friday in Kimbrough Stadium in Canyon for their bi-

district match-up.

The Lopes won the toss last Friday night and elected to receive, with Bobby Sansom returning the kickoff from the 14 to the 27. Riley kept for a yard, Russell Windham hit the middle of the line for 5 more, then Sylvester Dunn took a pitchout around right end for 6 more yards and a first down. Windham again hit the middle, this time for 8 yards, then Riley kept on an option around right end for more and another first down at the Childress 45. Then things began to go wrong. The ball slipped out of Riley's grasp, but he was able to recover it after a 5 yard loss, then on the next play, a pitchout to Dunn, the ball was slightly behind Dunn and went away and this time Eddie Taylor recovered for the Bobcats on the Abernathy 47. From there the Cats drove their first score, but it was a battle all the way as Cody Connell, David Davis, Tony Cox, Rick Houston, Russell Windham, Victor Dees, Stacey Mills and David Myatt were in on most of the tackles. Speedy back Donald "Donkey" Sims carried the final 3 yards for the TD and Ray Sharp kicked the extra point.

John Ruiz took the ensuing kickoff on the 6 and blasted out the 26. Two running plays and an incomplete pass brought up 4th down and 16

The Abernathy Antelope Band will leave for the State Marching Band Contest Monday morning at 6:00 a. m. in charter buses. 4-H Club Work Is More Than Cooking And Livestock

4-H is more than just "cooking and cows." 4-H is a group of boys and girls from the ages of 9 to 19 who want to learn from a variety of projects offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. 4-H is not just for rural youth. Members may be found in urban and sub-urban as well as rural areas.

4-H offers over 70 projects to choose from. Here is a sample of those available: Automotive Care and Safety, Beef Cattle, Bicycle, Clothing, Dog Care and Training, Entomology, Child Development, Food and Nutrition, Photography, Swine, Wildlife Management and Woodworking. There is no membership fee for 4-H. Members are usually responsible for financing his or her own projects.

With the wide variety of projects available, 4-H can get the entire family involved in the fun and the work. Members select and conduct their projects with the approval and support of parents. Parents provide encouragement and much of the resources needed by the 4-H 34 for project work. The understanding parent is often the force that helps 4-H members through their beginning years of 4-H and sets the stage for a fulfilling and enriching experience as a senior 4-H member.

on the 20 and Dunn prepared to punt. However, the snap was off the mark, and Dunn picked up the ball, saw daylight and ran 17 yards for a first down at the 37. Windham picked up 2 yards, then Riley hit Windham in the left flat for 6 more yards. Dunn swept left end for 13 yards but the Lopes were accused of holding and penalized back to their own 30. On the next play Windham blasted 10 yards up the middle but then lost the ball and Bobcat defensive standout Randy De-an pounced on the loose ball.

From that point it took the Cats 9 plays to cover the 40 yards, scoring again with 17 seconds left in the first period. The final 13 yards were covered by a pass over the middle to end Clifton Cornish. The extra point try failed.

After Ruiz returned the kickoff from the 2 to the 21, the Lopes managed only 3 yards on as many plays and Dunn got off a 29 yard punt to the Childress 47. On their first play, fullback Quentin Klepper was hit hard and fumbled and Windham and Davis fell on the ball. Dunn picked up 14 yards on 2 carries, then Riley hit Cannon with a 17 yard pass with Cannon making a good catch with Sims all over him. The next 2 plays lost 14 yards and a pass intended for sophomore end Allen Lester was tipped by a defender and Dunn punted 25 yards to the Childress 7.

From there the Cats moved to their own 47 against stout resistance. With a first and 10 at the point, Johnson attempted a pass which Cannon almost intercepted and Klepper picked up 6 yards, then Johnson was stopped by Mills, Davis and Myatt after a 3 yard gain. On 4th down, Klepper was hit hard by Windham and stopped short of a first down and the Lopes took over at their own 44.

With only 57 seconds left before halftime, Riley hit Bobby Ross for a 12 yard completion and a first down in Childress territory. But Riley lost 8 yards on the next play on a pass attempt, then got 4 of that back on a pass to Dunn on the next play. On the next play Riley tossed to Cannon who then lateraled back to Dunn, but the ball bounced out of Dunn's hands and right into the arms of defender David Tucker as the half ended.

The Lopes hit the field fired up after halftime and held the Cats on their first series of downs, forcing them to punt. Taking possession on the Cats 49, the Lopes went right to work. Riley hit Lester for a 9 yard completion, then Ruiz got 9 more yards on a drive up the middle. Dunn lost a yard as a pass fell incomplete, then Riley picked up 10 yards on a keeper. Dunn carried again, this time for 7 yards and a first down at the Cats 14. It was from that point that Riley made a good fake to Windham, then slipped past the defenders to the goal line only to have the play called back and assessed a 15 yard penalty. Four plays later the visitors took over on their own 12 yard line and from that point put together an 88 yard TD march for their final score.

Sanson returned the ensuing kickoff from the 10 to the 29, and from there it took the Lopes only 6 plays to cover the distance for their only TD of the night. Riley passed 6 yards to Cannon, another pass fell incomplete, then behind

good blocking Dunn picked up 6 more, then Riley passed the ball then made sure a grab for the TD. Dees kicked the extra point to end the scoring.

With 7:59 left to play, the Cats and Lopes exchanged punts, then the Cats began another drive from their own 24. Kenneth Moss, Darrick Stallings, James Pace and Don Barron collaborated with their teammates in collaring the Cats, finally stopping them on the Lopes 15 yard line. But at that time there were only 20 seconds left to play. A pass fell incomplete, then Dunn raced around right end for 19 yards. With 3 seconds left, a final desperation pass was intercepted.

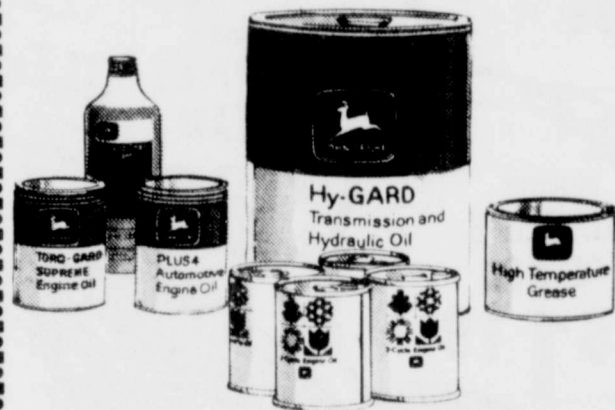

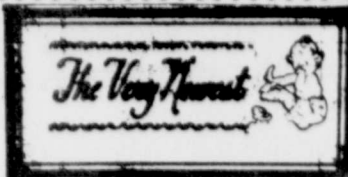
