The Abernathy Antelopes are taking dress. Here are the present class 3-A the steps necessary to go to state again and are proving to be the strongest contenders in district 3-A play. The real test will be Tuesday night when they play the Tulia Hornets, the only team to marr a perfect record to 6-1 in district. Tulia is ranked 5th with an overall

The Antelopes were ranked in the AP poll last week as 9th in the state in 3-A basketball competition. This was mainly boosted by the fact that the Antelopes defeated previously 5th-ranked Chil-

standings: 1. Perryton; 2. Prairieland; 3. Dimmitt: 4. Coleman: 5. Tulia: 6. Bowie; 7. Huffman; 8. Linden-Kildare; 9. Abernathy; and 10. Childress.

Leading the Antelopes in the scoring department are Joey Garcia and Roger Pinson. They are both listed on the Class 3-A leading scorer top 10 list. Joey Garcia has made over 600 points this year with an average of 20 points per game. Roger Pinson has scored over 500 points this year averaging 16.2 points a game.

Police Chief Jimmy Williams made a proposal to the council to purchase two DPS executive cars. Williams also made two alternate proposals along the same lines. He stated that there was a need for three prime condition police. cars, one for each Abernathy officer. The city council discussed the need

for another police vehicle to replace the blue Ford that is in poor condition. It was decided that bids would be taken for the purchase of a new car. The Abernathy Police Department

will remain a two-car system rather than the proposed fleet system, one in which all police officers have their own

Other business discussed by the council was to appoint the municipal election judges for the April 4th election. Mrs. Zelma Hale will be the election judge and Teresa Marez the alternate judge.

City equipment use charges were increased in some areas because the present fees had not been updated with inflation increases. The backhoe rental fee was upped to \$50 in order to give local backhoe merchants the upper

The city has been charging \$7.50 per load to haul dirt. This fee was upped to \$20 a load because there were doubts the city was breaking even on this service. The mowing fee will be \$15.

The council authorized Rod Ellis, city manager, to apply for a state grant for airport improvements. It would be an 80-20 grant with the state paying the 80% and the city 20%

The policy on water taps was then discussed. It was decided that a double minimum will have to be paid by people in apartment areas that have their reading on a joint water meter. There was a discrepency because most apartment units have a single meter reading and the total is divided by the occupants each month even though some rooms are empty and others are occupied at different times. It was decided it would be too difficult for the city to give apartment people a single reading for each unit when they're all on the same

The proposal was passed to extend coverage insurance on city property Insurance was increased for many city owned buildings. The initial total coverage increase will be approximately \$200,000.

Special Dependency Rules Apply to Divorced Parents Separated and divorced parents should be aware of special dependency require-

ments when claiming children as dependents on federal tax returns. A dependency exemption for a child may be claimed only on the tax return of one of the parents. Generally, the parent having custody of the child for the greater part of the year is allowed the dependency deduction, according to the

Frequently, however, the terms of the divorce or custody decree or other written agreement define which parent may claim the dependent child. Also, if the parent without custody of the child contributes most of the child's support, that parent may generally claim the deduction.

The IRS has two free publications which explain in more detail the guidelines for claiming dependents. Publication 50 4, "Tax Information for Divorced and Separated Individuals," and Publication 501, "Exemptions," are available by mail using the order form in the tax package, or by calling the IRS Tax Forms/Information number listed in the


