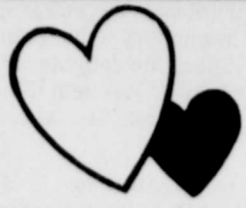

Indeceny Heads Police Report

A local 18-year-old white male was formally charged with committing the criminal offense of "indecency with a child" the January Abernathy police report reveals.

Other was the indecency with a child arrest. Others arrested were transferred to the Hale County Jail and one was held in Abernathy.

A series of incidents involving the white male and two Abernathy High School girls, one 14 and one 15, led to his arrest after extensive investigation of this case, said police chief Jimmy Williams.

Criminal offenses numbered 30. There were 4 thefts over \$20 but under \$200, 1 theft over \$200, 1 auto theft (the truck taken from Abernathy Oil), 5 unsolved burglaries, 1 assault, 4 public intoxications, 4 gambling, 1 resisting arrest, 1 disorderly conduct, 1 failure to identify to officer, 3 criminal mischief, 1 malicious mischief and 1 act of vandalism in which two houses were egged.

Other events taking place this past month were two traffic accidents with no injuries occurring.

There was one criminal offense of deadly assault on a peace officer. Police officer Frank Harper was cut by an unknown black assailant with a knife. This case is presently under investigation.

There was a total of 147 citations issued for the month. 132 were for speeding, 1 excessive motor noise, 4 expired driver's licenses, 5 citations for no driver's license, 2 defective tail lights and 3 defective headlights.

Since October 1980, approximately \$6,000 is being taken in by the police department every month compared to \$3,000 prior to October. The increase is due to more citations being given by police officers. Most of them occur on highway 87 through Abernathy.

Ten arrests were made, of the 5 that were taken to the Lubbock County Jail, 4 were arrested for gambling and the

other was the indecency with a child arrest. Others arrested were transferred to the Hale County Jail and one was held in Abernathy.

Ranked 9th In State

The Abernathy Antelopes are taking the steps necessary to go to state again and are proving to be the strongest contenders in district 3-A play. The real test will be Tuesday night when they play the Tulia Hornets, the only team to marr a perfect record to 6-1 in district.

Lately, the Antelopes have defeated Floydada 87-55, Lockney 70-47 and Idalon 61-39. The two toughest opponents the Antelopes will have to face are Tulia, Tuesday night, and Childress, Friday. A win over Tulia would put the Lopes in a tie with Childress for first place in the second round.

The Antelopes were ranked in the AP poll last week as 9th in the state in 3-A basketball competition. This was mainly boosted by the fact that the Antelopes defeated previously 5th-ranked Childress.

Leading the Antelopes in the scoring department are Joey Garcia and Roger Pinson. They are both listed on the Class 3-A leading scorer top 10 list. Joey Garcia has made over 600 points this year with an average of 20 points per game. Roger Pinson has scored over 300 points this year averaging 16.2 points a game.

The defending state champion Antelopes have an overall 19-12 record, but district is what counts. A record of 6-1 speaks for itself. A repeat of last year's triumph has a good chance to become reality this year.

Separated and divorced parents should be aware of special dependency requirements when claiming children as dependents on federal tax returns. A dependency exemption for a child may be claimed only on the tax return of one of the parents. Generally, the parent having custody of the child for the greater part of the year is allowed the dependency deduction, according to the IRS.

Frequently, however, the terms of the divorce or custody decree or other written agreement define which parent may claim the dependent child. Also, if the parent without custody of the child contributes most of the child's support, that parent may generally claim the deduction.

The IRS has two free publications which explain in more detail the guidelines for claiming dependents. Publication 504, "Tax Information for Divorced and Separated Individuals," and Publication 501, "Exemptions," are available by mail using the order form in the tax package, or by calling the IRS Tax Forms/Information number listed in the local telephone directory.
