Short Hoe Handle Outlawed!

There is legislation presently being proposed relating to Texas agricultural laborers' use of hoes that have short handles. If enacted by the legislature of the State of Texas, use of certain hoes will be prohibited.

Section I of this proposal states that an employer of agricultural laborers may not (1) provide an employee with a hoe that has a handle less than five feet in length in performing agricultural labor; or (2) require an employee to use a hoe that has a handle less than five feet in length in performing agricultural labor.

Section II of this proposed act states that an employee who is injured as a result of an employer's action in violation of Section I of this act may sue the employer for damages or for temporary or permanent injunctive relief

And under Section III, an employer who violates Section I of this act commits an offense of a Class C misdemeanor.

Surely an act of this nature will not be passed by the Texas legislature. How many cotton choppers do you know that can keep their hoe handles at regulation size for any period of time? Farmers will either go broke buying new hoes or by being sued for damages.

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance has scheduled a public Town Hall Meeting in Plainview for 7:00p.m. at the Edgemere Elementary School Cafeteria.

The Congressman will discuss many of the issues confronting Congress and the people before opening up the meeting for questions from the public. "I have found that these Town Hall meetings are one of my best sources for finding out the feelings of the people of the 19th Congressional District", said Hance. "Also, it has given the people the opportunity to relate their problems and concerns to someone who has access to the facilities to aid them." "I also have discovered that some of

the answers to legislative problems have come in some fashion or another, through the opinions and suggestions of people who attend these meetings."

This will mark the second consecutive session of Congress that Congressman Hance has scheduled Town Hall meetings across his West Texas District. During the last session of Congress, Hance held at least two open meetings in each of the 17 counties in his District in an attempt to stay in close contact with the grass roots of his constituency.

The public is invited and encouraged to attend and participate.

object, Williams said.

Others arrested were Larry Gurrero, a 21 year old Mexican American male, charged with evading arrest, disorderly conduct, and terroristic threats, and Fernando Barrera, a 26 year old Mexican alien, has been charged with felony re-entry. A felony re-entry is when an alien has been deported as an undesirable but re-enters America. This is a federal charge, Williams said. It all started last Monday night when police officer Frank Harper was informed that a kid was being cut up bad.

Deputy Sheriff of Hale County Dayton Marr, arrived at the scene and observed a juvenile who had been cut with an unknown object, Williams said. He had been cut on the forearms, the nose and there was a large cut on the left side of his head, Williams said. Deputy Tommy Thompson and Lupe Canales, of Hale County, and D.P.S. Officer Jim Warren arrived at the scene to help in the arrests.

Officers heard the back door slam before entering the house. Williams, Marr and Harper surrounded the house to find Larry Gurrero hiding behind a car. Gurrero tried to evade them but was taken into custody at gun point. Williams said.

Four people were found inside the house, an 18 year old female and three males. Fernando Barrera and Porfilio Gurrero Jr. were found inside the house. Porfilio was found last lying behind a couch. Williams said.

A Mexican American boy and girl, also found in the house, were taken into custody and released after questioning. Williams said.

According to chief Williams there had been a fight in the living room between Porfilio and the juvenile. The room was in total disorder and a window had been broken out. Directly inside the window. a shotgun was found with blood stains on it, Williams said.

No connection has been made between the shotgun and the incident. The object used to cut the juvenile boy has not been found as of yet, Williams said.

POLICE WARNING TO BIKERS

Parents who have purchased motorbikes for their children should have the bike and their children licensed to drive them, police chief Jimmy Williams said.

Children not licensed to drive on public roads are a hazard to local citizens as well as dangerous to the community, Williams said. There have been numerous complaints about young cyclists, therefore parents will be cited for permitting an unlicensed driver to operate a motor vehicle on public roads.

Williams also added that those who are not licensed should drive in designated areas where they have been given permission to drive, off public roads

The 1981 Abernathy Stock Show Committee officers have been selected for this year's stock show slated March 9th and 10th.

They are as follows: Superintendent Walter W. (Speck) Cox, Assistant Superintendent - Clark Riley, Secretary Treasurer - Joe Oswalt, Swine Superintendent - T.J. Pettit, Sheep Superintendent - Dale Powell, Beef Superintendent - Richard Howard, Barn Superintendent - Jerry Oswalt.

On the Finance Committee are: Jerry Givens, Chairman, Ronnie Hamilton, Bill Waits, Glynn Durrett, Richard DuBose, Lonnie Cannon and Donnie Shaver. The Trophy Chairman will be Leland Phillips and the Publicity Chairmen are Mitch LeMoine and Charles Bowen. Judge for the Lamb and Steer Division is Mr. Randy Upshaw, the Extension Agent for Lubbock County. The judge for the Swine Division is Dr. Jerry D. Stockton, Chairman of Agriculture Education Department, Texas Tech University.

The Abernathy Project show rules are as follows:

Ownership - All swine and beef cattle breeding stock shall be owned prior to January 1st of each year. Exhibitors must be bona fide 4-H or FFA members. All swine and lambs shall be owned prior to January 1st of each year. All steers must be owned prior to September 1st of each year.

Sifting - The Superintendent and

division superintendents shall have the authority to sift any undesirable or questionable animals entered in the show.

Classification - The superintendents of each division shall set up the classes in the manner that they wish, which will be for the betterment of the show. Loss or Injury to Exhibitor or Animals - The Abernathy Project Show shall not be responsible for any injury or loss to exhibitor, his animal/animals, or spectators, while incurred at the show

Weights - Steers - 800-no limit. Barrows - 180-280 lbs. with no tolerance. Lambs - 70-140 lbs. with no tolerance. Gilts - 180-280 lbs. with no tolerance.

Ribbons - Ribbons shall be given to the top ten placing individuals in each class

Arrival Time - Weighing shall begin at 2:00p.m. March 9th and all entries shall be in place not later than 6:00 p.m.

Tags - Swine - Barrows and gilts showing in barrow classes shall be ear tagged with white tags in right ear. Gilts shall be ear tagged with yellow tags in right ear. Sheep - Lambs shall be ear tagged.

Showmanship Awards - Showmanship awards shall be given to the outstanding showman in the following

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



Hale County Water Well Depths Measured

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has completed its annual program of measuring depth to water levels in the 27 wells in Hale County. These wells are part of a larger network of more than 900 observation wells scattered throughout the District's 15-county service area.

Dan Seale was able to complete 26 measurements of 'static' water levels in irrigation wells and tag them with the District's red identification sticker for owner information.

"I visited with several irrigators in the field who wanted to know what their water's doing," said Dan. "We have the initial results for the County, but tabulated data on the entire observation network readings is not expected to be complete until mid-year.
