

"The Good News of Jesus Christ"

Text "For I am not ashamed of this good news about Christ. It is God's powerful method of bringing all who believe it to heaven..." Romans 1: 16 (The Living Bible) Amidst all the bad news we hear in the world, the good news from God stands out like a rainbow of hope proclaiming salvation to a world that is despairing and dying without God. The gospel of Jesus Christ is God's good news to all men. There are some great affirmations about the gospel in our text.

The good news is that Christ has done all that needs to be done when he died on the cross for our sins. The good news is that Christ will save all who believe in him.

This is why we need to share the good news of Jesus Christ with all the world. Let's begin with self and spread to others.



He's seen the proliferation of the drug dealing in look-alike drugs around school campuses and side street storefronts.

Youngsters refer to the bogus drugs with terms reminiscent of hard drug traffic - words like legal speed, black mollies, yellow street name for cocaine.

The capsules and pills contain caffeine and deconjecting of young, immature gestants, some of the same people to environments that ingredients you find in overthe-counter drugs. "But." said Burnham, "I'm not sure legal. These youngsters are that any of the products you buy in a store have the same chemicals in the proportion

Colors and shapes of the capsules and pills are designed to resemble drugs. such as amphetamines.

Unfortunately, says Burnham, these look-alike drugs. when used excessively, and for a period of time, can cause headaches, nausea and insomnia. Withdrawal problems can occur after long usage.


Burnham feels that kids , who buy these look-alike drugs would purchase narcotics if they were so easily available. "As it is," he says. "the kids put them in their pockets and go to school jackets. drugs. If dealers go unchallenged, they could very easily move into trafficking in hard drugs, he says. Burnham, in cooperation with law enforcement officers.

says the trail of the lookalike drugs begins with a distributor who purchases them from a pharmaceutical house. "The dealers advertise them by passing out business cards with a description of the products on them. They'll have telephone numbers listed on the cards and sell you the products with no questions asked." They may call the products alertness pills or

stimulant capsules. Burnham says there is more than one middleman in the bogus drug chain, and profit is made throughout the chain - from manufacturer to user. While the dealer may buy the products for \$100 to \$120 a thousand, they'll make their profit by selling them at \$40 to \$50 a hundred. The larger lots are broken down into smaller packets - usually zip-lock plastic bags - with no labeling which may contain as many as six different capsules or tablets and sell for up to fifty cents or more a






This is where the Food and Drug Division comes in. Although the properly-labeled lots of pills and capsules may be legal, once they are broken down into small. unlabeled lots, they come under the "misbranded adulterated provisions of the Texas Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, which is a misdemeanor. Sometimes. in the sale of large quantities, labels are scraped off the original containers.

President Reagan Deregulates

Oil Industry.....

The simultaneous oil and gas leasing system is administered by the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management. On the 1st business day of January, March, May, July, September and November the BLM posts a list of lands within its jurisdiction that are available for leasing. Applications are accepted until the close of business on the 15th working day after the list is posted. If more than one application is received for a given tract, a drawing is held to decide who will get the lease. Three application cards are drawn for each parcel, and the order in which they are drawn fixes their

order of priority. NOTE: No assignment of a lease may be filed before the lease is issued by BLM. No agreement to assign a lease may be made before the lease is issued, or before 60 days after the drawing, whichever is sooner. Any assignment entered into as a result of an agreement which violates these restrictions will be disapproved by BLM. These restrictions are intended to allow all interested parties an equal opportunity to negotiate for the lease and to protect applicants from being unduly influenced to enter into agreements to make transfers not in their best interest.

If you the successful applicant, you are given 30 days to pay the first year's rental after you receive official notice. Upon payment the BLM will issue the lease. Currently the rental rate is \$1.00 per acre per year.

Dear editor: A lot of farmers are looking toward Washington these days wondering what sort of farm program the new administration will have. There may be a better place to look. It's the telephone com-

Here's why. The Bell Telephone company made over six billion dollars profit last year, the highest in history of any American company, even after deducting the 20 cents it lost from me when one of its pay phones malfunctioned. I was calling to see what cotton was selling for.

Why then, you may ask, is the phone company with all that profit always

asking for another rate increase? It's simple. Regardless of the over-all profit, the policy seems to be that every town with a telephone exchange ought to stand on its own feet and show a fair return on the investment there. So if a town isn't talking enough, if its grandparents are failing to call their grandkids long distance, then the phone

company has to raise the rates there. Seems fair enough.

And that's where farmers come in. Every farm of average size always has some land that's not as productive as the rest. So to get a fair return on every acre of his investment, a farmer ought to charge more for what the sorrier land

produces. "I'm sorry," he could tell a buyer when his crop is ready to sell, "but this portion came from marginal land and you'll have to pay me more for it. Me and the telephone company are entitled to a fair return on investment for every acre or telephone.'

It might be argued that where the phone company befuddles us is in not figuring in long distance calls when it calculates its rate of return in any given town. That won't interfere with this new farm proposal. After all, isn't most of the stuff farmers raise shipped a long

I don't see anything wrong with this new plan. After all, food for human beings is near about as important as talking on the telephone.





Pioneer Oil And Gas Reserves

AMARII I O. Texas - Pioneer Corporation (NYSE) announced today that it will tile a Form 10-K with the ecurities and Exchange Commission which includes summary information on the company's oil and gas reserves at the end of 1980.

The report estimates the proved developed and undeveloped gas reserves of Pioneer and its subsidiaries at 198.2 billion cubic feet at the end of 1980, up from 184 billion cubic feet at the end of 1979. Proved developed reserves were 196.5 billion cubic feet for 1980, compared with 183.8 billion cubic feet tor 1979.

Froved developed and undeveloped oil reserves at the end of 1980 were estimated at 4,014,000 barrels, compared with 4,376,000 barrels in 1979. Proved developed oil reserves were 3,980,000 for 1980 and 4,375,000 for 1979.

The present value of estimated future net revenues from all proved oil and gas reserves will be reported as \$347.8 million, compared with \$259.5 million at the end of 1979. As required by the

: E.C. present value amounts were determined by applying a 10 percent discount factor. Future net revenues were computed by applying year-end priced without escalation except for fixed and determinable increases in prices that are permitted under the SEC regulations. although most sales contracts provide for price changes based on economic conditions, governmental regulations and the like. The company is therefore of the opinion that the future revenues are substantially under-

Estimates in the report are based on data prepared by Miller and Lents, 1td., an

independent consulting firm. Pioneer also announced that two of its subsidiaries have gas purchase and gas processing contracts from which 43,400,000 barrels of liquid petroleum gases are projected to be recovered at existing extraction plants during the contract terms. About 2,380,000 barrels of that amount will come from gas included in the reported





I guess about everything that can be said has been said about Iran and the freed hostages, but a couple of remarks by an Iranian leader have stuck in my

Clayton said Rep. Laney would serve in these capacities during the next two years of the 67th Legislature.

To Be Interviewed Approximately 500 rural

older adults living in Hale and Dickens counties will be randomly selected for an interview that will examine the characteristics and needs of elderly people, age 65 and older. Dr. Jean Pearson Scott, Department of Home and Family Life of Texas Tech University, will direct the study

Local persons have been trained to administer the interviews that will be conducted beginning in March. Topics covered in the interview will include food habits. family relationships, consumer practices, and housing characteristics.

Dr. Scott received a research grant from the NRTA-AARP Andrus Foundation and Texas Tech University for the project.

Scott said the diversity of characteristics among older rural adults needs to be given important consideration, especially in planning services and programs.

"Many studies are too outdated to be useful in designing programs or guiding policies for the 80's," said Scott.

The results of the study will provide up-to-date information for use by home economists, area service providers, researchers, and other professionals working with the elderly.

An Austrian scientist has developed a new type of blood pump which performs normal functions of the heart.

After a heart failure, medication often is not able to restart the heart. Professor Navratil's mechanical pump can maintain blood circulation, enabling the heart to rest and heal completely.

So far, the device has been used successfully only in experiments with calves. The laboratory animals have lived for up to eight weeks while the device performed

Choosing Corn Hybrids For Reduced Tillage Farming As the public and farmers

become increasingly concerned about the loss of farmland, the methods of farming are changing. Each year prime agricultural land is lost forever due to new highways, shopping centers, factories and homes. Some state, county and local governments are beginning to react to this disturbing trend by adopting laws to make it much more difficult to convert prime agricultural land to other uses.

In addition to the losses described above, farmers are spending even more time and money to prevent the loss of irreplaceable land due to wind and water erosion. During the past three years, many farmers in the traditional fall plowing regions of the country have switched to various methods of reduced tillage on corn ment for reduced and no-till farming becomes more ophisticated, you will undoubtedly see more reduced tillage in the future. (Iowa presently has 43% of its cropland in some type of reduced tillage system.)

Wayne Fowler Agronomic Education Director, DEKALB AgResearch, Inc.

When selecting hybrids for reduced tillage or no-till systems, there are some points

1. Excellent seedling vigor: especially in continuous corn, heavy crop residues, and heavy or poorly drained soils. Fast emergence reduces the potential of insects, rodents, birds and seedling disease reducing the percent emerged.

2. Disease and insect resistance: the crop residue offers some degree of increased disease and insect problems. Northern and southern corn leaf blight and anthracnose are probably the most important. Soybean producers who have faced problems with lodging of full sized varieties received good news in the release of two new semidwarf varieties by the US Department of Agriculture. Certified seed producers in participating states will begin obtaining released seed from the two new varieties - Sprite and Pixie this year, and supplies will be available to farmers for the 1982 season. In two years of testing in high yield environments, Sprite averaged 6 to 6.5 bushels per acre more than Williams and Elf when planted in 30-inch rows. Pixie yields averaged about the same as Williams and Elf in 30inch rows. In addition to producing a short, lodgingresistant, semidwarf plant, both varieties are very responsive to narrow rows and high seeding rates.

Looking ahead - to 1985 agri-economist John Marten has some interesting predictions on the meat industry. If the current cycle continues, cattle numbers should peak around 1985 or '86, says Marten, to around 125 million head by the mid 80's. He peas the 1985 steer price at \$90 to \$100 by middecade. An excellent five years is predicted for cow-calf operators, but with narrow feeding margins and a continued emphasis on buying and selling skills. By 1985, Marten sees hog prices averaging \$60 to \$70, but cautions that in order to maintain profitable prices, production will have to be kept below the 70-pound per capita level. The combelt will continue as the center of hog production with a slight westward shift by the midsee decreased farm income due to energy cost increases, reminding the nation that farmers have always been in the solar energy business: Crop acres converting solar power into feed, food, fibre,



If the hybrids continue to demonstrate resistance to Biotype E greenbug damage during extensive field tests this summer, they might be available for 1982 planting,' said Dalton. "But Pioneer will release none of the hybrids commercially until they are thoroughly tested and meet our strict performance standards.

Greenbugs first became a roblem for sorghum farners in the late 1960s. The nsects, not much larger than a pin head, suck fluids from plant leaves, then excrete poisonous wastes into the plants. "It's the greenbug toxin, not the but itself, that kills the plant," said

By the mid-1970s, researchers had developed sorghum hybrids resistant to greenbugs. The Biotype C greenbug was, and still is, the main culprit.

The Biotype E was discovered only after researchers found that plants thought to be resistant to Biotype C were nonetheless dying from greenbugs. Even though they were not widespread last year, the new insects pose a potentially-

severe problem for growers. Pioneer had many tests scattered throughout the sorghum belt last summer," said Dalton, "but we were able to confirm Biotype E greenbug damage in only one of these locations. We will not know how widespread the new Biotype is until after the next crop is

The greenhouse discoveries of apparently resistant hybrids involved seed that was developed from an inbred line on which Pioneer began research in the late

'The work we began in the late '60s was designed to broaden the genetic base of Pioneer parent lines," Dalton said. "We used a number exotic lines, collected from all over the world. And the new inbred line carrying this Biotype E resistance is a product of that research

Dalton said farmers "must take a sensible approach in sorghum production, weighing all benefits against all cost. They should select hybrids based on all performance traits and use careful

inspection in their insecti cide application program.'

Jim Lindsey, president of the Southwestern Division of Pioneer, added that the promising discovery "vividly demonstrates" the value of an aggressive, well-funded and comprehensive research program.

'We feel the discovery is a real tribute to our sorghum breeding staff and the project to which they committed themselves over a decade



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
