#### School Board Meetin Appraisal Report

The Abernathy school board met Monday night to discuss several items of business. The meeting was held this Monday due to the showing of the Patrick Lewis movie Monday of last

Billie Harrison gave a report from the Hale County Appraisal District notifying board members of the appraisal presently taking place in Hale County. There is usually an appraisal done every five years. After this appraisal is completed, it will then need to be updated each year.

Abernathy Independent School District mineral rights are appraised at approximately \$308 million. Mineral rights possessed in Hale County amount to \$281 million of the total. There are 18 sections of land in Lubbock County being leased that make up the other \$27 million in mineral assets controlled by

The school district is worth 54 million alone excluding mineral rights. Total assets for the Abernathy School District amount to over \$362 million when mineral assets are added to the base

Playground Bids Taken For \$6,103 negotiated with A.B. Ingley Company ag department to cover travelling of Lubbock for the six foot fence.

#### Pavement Improvements

The city held a public hearing for the proposed use of general revenue sharing funds. None appeared at the hearing to propose what the funds should be used for. Therefore, the city has decided to use the funds to make



## **Public Notice Of Tax** Exemptions Available To Homeowners

The Hale County Appraisal District is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions and open-space land valuation. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the property

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in the Hale County Appraisal District on January of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of their homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled" in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Surviviors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. It application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Owners of farm and ranch land on January 1, 1981 may make application for open-space valuation of their land and upon meeting the required conditions, may have their land valued according to it's productivity instead of it's market value.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the Hale County Appraisal District at 293-4226.


