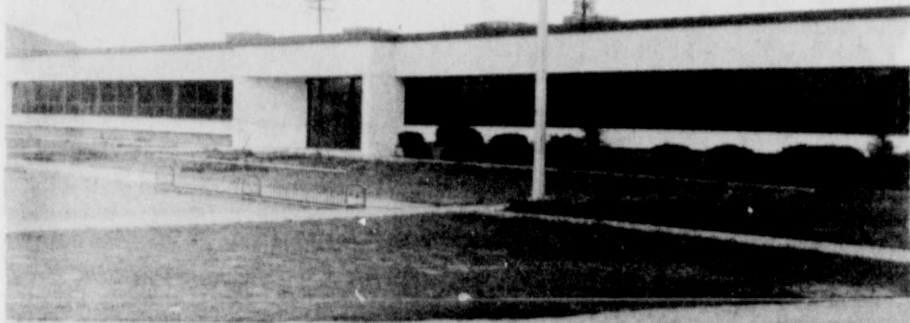


School Administration Building Completed

Improvements Exceed \$1 Million In Past Six Years

A building that could have easily been demolished a year ago, was dramatically changed into a \$331 thousand new administration building.

The new Abernathy Schools Administration Building was completed April 27 and the administrative staff moved from the old administration building to the new one.

The building has been under construction since the school board decided to remodel it in 1979 rather than to completely destroy it.

History of the Building
The building was originally constructed in 1945. The inside and the roof were built of timber and wood product salvaged during WWII which took place at this time.

The foundation was formed with concrete and the outside walls were built of brick. The brick walls and foundation stand today as the base structures of the newly remodeled building.

From 1945 to 1955 the building was used as a high school. Then in 1955 it became junior high school when a new high school was constructed.

In 1961, junior high students were moved to another building, elementary students then occupied the building until 1975. The 4th and 5th grade students mainly occupied the building.

Offices and classrooms for special education students and faculty were moved to the building beginning in 1975. It also served as the meeting place for CVAE (Coordinated Vocational Academic Education) classes, which were transferred to this building from the high school in 1971.

It was not until 1979 that it was decided that the building had too many large holes in the roof that had a great

potential to be dangerous for students. The roof was old and it was collapsing.

Therefore, in May of 1979, the school board was faced with the decision to either totally demolish the building, or to remodel it.

The decision was made to remodel the building because \$15 a square foot could be saved by using the old outside brick walls and the foundation.

The first remodeling bids were accepted in May and work began on a new administration building.

Cost and Construction

Phase I of the remodeling project was handled by Sam Smith Construction of Amarillo. This company strengthened the outside walls and rebuilt the roof for \$125 thousand. The roof and walls were reinforced with steel.

The second phase of construction was done by Monterey Construction of Lubbock. This company completely remodeled the inside costing \$206

thousand. "The inside and outside walls were double insulated, lightweight concrete was poured on the roof to seal it more efficiently, steel beams were installed to support the building and the inside walls were covered with vinyl which is maintenance free," said Dr. Delwin Webb, the school superintendent. "The building is designed to be energy efficient," Webb added.

"The cost of remodeling the standing building amounted to \$25-\$26 a square ft. If the building had been completely constructed, it would have cost \$40-\$45

a square ft.," Webb said.

Offices and Classrooms

The new administration building has an overall floor space of 12,000 ft. composed of 12 offices, 6 classrooms, 1 speech therapy room and nurses quarters.

One of the classrooms is being used now for the Motor Development class. Beginning next fall, five more rooms will be used for special education classes. HONDA and Migrant faculty will hold classes in the new building. A total of 14 administrative and faculty members will use the building next fall.

"The new location of the administration building will provide easy access to this office and help to prevent traffic problems around the main school body," Earl Carter stated.

Other School Improvements
Several other school improvements have been made within the past six years at Abernathy schools.

In the past six years the board has completed, without special state bonds, renovation of the auditorium, new tennis courts, a vocational building, band hall improvements, a new football track, football stadium lights and bleachers, the lights were changed in all school buildings and insulation and storm windows were added also.

"In the planning stages is a new playground to be erected by the fall semester," Webb said.

"Total cost of improvements for the past six years were in excess of \$1 million and in the same period of time, local school taxes have not been increased," Webb said. "By not having to acquire state bonding, we have saved a considerable amount of tax dollars that would have otherwise been used to pay interest on state funds," Webb added.

"The next project in the foreseeable future is landscaping for the school area," Webb ended.

Pinson, Irlbeck State Finalists

Roger Pinson and Cletus Irlbeck capped off a very successful year by becoming the State semifinalists in class 3A tennis.

Earlier this year they were District champs and Regional champs. In the first round at State, Pinson and Irlbeck defeated Ludwig and Mueller of Bellville by the slim score of 4-6, 7-6, 8-6 to put them in the semifinal match.

In the semifinals they confronted last year's State finalists, Humphrey and O'Bannon of Grand Saline and lost to them 3-6, 0-6. The duo from Grand Saline went on to win the State title.

In the past, Roger Pinson and Greg Newton were defeated at regional two years ago. Irlbeck and Sam Dominguez were defeated in the first round at the State tennis meet last year.

Women Receive Nursing Degrees

Two Abernathy women received degrees in nursing from West Texas State University in commencement rites held Saturday afternoon in the Amarillo Civic Center. The campus at Canyon does not have a facility large enough to accommodate such an event.

Mrs. George Riddell (Marie Louise) received the Master of Science in Nursing degree. She completed graduate requirements for this degree December 19, 1980. Mrs. Riddell has been in the nursing profession for a number of years, and currently is the Abernathy school nurse. Her husband is director of Abernathy school buses.

Receiving a Bachelor of Science Nursing degree Saturday was a New Deal High School graduate, Ann Marie Kveton, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Kveton of Route 2, Abernathy.

AHS Students Win State UIL Honors

Four AHS students journeyed to Austin, May 8-9, to compete at the highest level of academic competition after having won in district and regional contests. Three of these students came home with the distinction of having placed in the top five in their individual contests.

Jay Harrison, a sophomore, won a second place ranking in use of the calculator, a new contest this year. This competition, which has replaced the slide rule, involved solving sixty straight computational problems and fourteen stated problems based on algebra I, algebra II, geometry, and trigonometry. It also included six geo-

metric figures to be solved by use of geometry and trigonometry, all this within a 30 minute time period.

Although Jay had not taken a class in algebra II or trigonometry, he made up for it with countless hours of individual study.

"He is a very talented young man and a real joy to work with; he does not have to be motivated," commented his sponsor, Mr. Martin Kennedy.

Roger Howard earned a fourth place spot at Austin in science, having placed first in district and first in regional. Last year he placed eighth in state.

The contest deals with all aspects of science, including biology, chemistry

and physics. The test is written on a college level by three college professors. The two-hour test contains fifty questions.

Roger, a senior, will enroll at Texas Tech as a science major.

Dee Ann Attebury, a junior, placed fifth at the state level in typewriting after placing first in Region I at Lubbock. Dee Ann is the third AHS typing student in the past eleven years to earn a chance to take part in this prestigious event.

Dee Ann is both a fast and accurate typist. She averages 65 to 70 words a minute for five minutes with one or two errors.

"This is very good speed and excellent accuracy," said sponsor Floyd Galloway.

At the state meet the students take two five-minute timed writings and students are graded on both speed and percentage of accuracy.

Brad Bowen, senior, accompanied these students as an alternate in editorial writing, having won fourth place at regional and first in district.

Considering that there are 200 AAA schools in the state, and 600 students begin each contest at the district level, it was quite an accomplishment for these 4 students to finish so near the very top.

"These students have spent hours and hours, before school, after school, and even on weekends preparing for the opportunity to represent their school at the State Meet. We think they have represented Abernathy High School in a first class way," said Mitch LeMoine, the high school principal.

Census Reveals Increased Population, Housing Units

The 1981 census taken for Abernathy revealed a slight population increase since 1970, when the last census was taken.

The population of Abernathy to date is 2,906. In 1970 the population was 2,625. Therefore, between 1970 and 1980 Abernathy has increased by 281, which is a 11% increase since 1970.

Housing units numbered 918 in 1970. The census taken this year depicted Abernathy as having 1,081 housing units. This is at least a 15% increase since 1970.

Vandalism To Be Controlled

Several members of the private sector are offering a reward up to \$500 leading to the conviction and arrests of the persons committing acts of criminal mischief in Abernathy.

Lately, several offenses of vandalism have been reported in different areas throughout Abernathy.

"Some of these incidents involved a car being spray painted, house windows being broken out and phone calls harassing elderly people," according to Raymond Naron, acting police chief. "Several citizens are concerned with the criminal mischief that has been taking place recently," Naron said. "The police department will prosecute these vandals if citizens will file complaints," Naron added.

Persons prosecuted for criminal mischief and found guilty, can be charged with several penalties depending on the amount of personal and material damage they do.

If found guilty, they can be charged with a class C misdemeanor, punishable with a fine up to \$200, a class B misdemeanor, punishable with a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or 180 days in jail, a

compiled of 972 with a Spanish surname, 124 black, and 1808 white.

Other area towns also experienced an increase in population. Lorenzo increased by 15.6%, Ralls by 23.4% and Crosbyton by only 1.7%.

For Texas as a whole, 48 counties lost population between 1970 and 1980, but the population still increased from 11 1/2 million in 1970 to 14 1/2 million in 1980, which is a growth of 26.38%.

Abernathy and Hale County remained on a slow upward trend in population growth.

A 24,000 BTU air conditioner using 3,900 watts would have an EER of 7.3 (24,000 ÷ 3,900 = 7.3). If you could get the same cooling capacity for 2,400 watts the EER would be higher (24,000 BTU ÷ 2,400 watts = 10 EER).
