Locals To Enjoy A Fun-Filled Day Of Events

Abernathy will celebrate July 4th this Saturday with the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce sponsoring a fun-filled day of events for everyone to participate in.

Eastern Star Breakfast
It will all start at 7 a.m. with a breakfast sponsored by the Eastern Star to be held in the Masonic Lodge Hall. The breakfast will continue until 9 a.m. From 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. the Frog, Turtle, and Frisbee Contests will be held in front of the city hall. Hoppy Toler will officiate these events.

Horseshoe Pitching Contest
A Horseshoe Pitching Contest will be offered for area horseshoe pitchers from 9 to 12 noon.

Larry Aldridge and Mitch LeMoine will be in charge of the Horseshoe Pitching Contest that will be part of the July 4th events on the city square south of the police station.

The horseshoe pitching will be played in teams and there will be two people to a team.

Rules for this are as follows: 2 Rings - 1 winner's ring and 1 loser's ring. 1. Only way to get to winner's ring is through loser's ring. 2. Winners stay and play until they lose. 3. Winner for day decided by number of wins at winner's ring only.

Game: 1. 21 points. 2. 5 points ringer, 3 points leaver, 1 point closest. 3. Team in lead always throws first. 4. If team goes out on 1st of 2 horseshoes,

the opponent has his own 2 horseshoes plus the second horseshoe of the team out. 1st place winners (team) will be awarded free lunch tickets.

Parade

A flag raising ceremony to salute our nation's birth will be held at 11:15 a.m. at the city hall.

At this time the local girl scout chapter will raise the flag accompanied by a brief ceremony.

Egg and Water Balloon Toss
Hoppy Toler will officiate the egg and water balloon toss at 11:20 a.m. in front of city hall.

Jaws of Life Demonstration
There will be a Jaws of Life demonstration at 11:20 in front of First State Bank.

The demonstration will be presented

by Hearst Tool Company of New Braunfels and a bucket will be passed for donations.

Lunch
Lunch will be held from 11:30 to 1 p.m. in the City Meeting room. It will be catered by Southern Seas of Lubbock.

The lunch is \$5 per plate, \$1 of which will be donated to the Jaws of Life fund. The Attebury Musicians will play their string instruments during the lunch hours.

Parade Winners
At 1 p.m., winners of the parade float and riding club categories will be announced.

Entertainment
Entertainment will be provided by several musical performances. The musical program will begin at 1:30 and continue to 3:30, or whenever.

Thefts, Accidents Headline Police Report

The police report for the month of June revealed that several accidents and thefts have taken place recently in Abernathy.

For the month of June, 151 citations were given by Abernathy police officers. Eleven arrests were made - 9 for public intoxication and 2 for DWI. One of the public intoxication arrests included charges of disorderly conduct and resisting arrest.

Donald Ray Boykin, the Mexican American picked up in Abernathy earlier this month, has a felony warrant on him for drug smuggling in California. California officials were notified and they chose not to expedite Boykin unless he was arrested in California. He paid his local fine for public intoxication and was released, a police officer said.

Accidental Shooting
Ruddy Sanchez allegedly accidentally shot Eluira Perez with a 22 pistol Sunday night at 7:30 p.m.

Perez was injured when a bullet from the gun struck her in the right abdomen. She was taken to Lubbock General and her condition was not known at press time.

Thefts
A bicycle was taken from the residence of 708 4th Street Thursday at approximately 5:30 p.m.

Bobby Healy is the owner of the bike which has "Spirit of 76" inscribed on it. The bike had not been recovered at press time, but was under investigation by Abernathy police officers.

A car was taken from the driveway of the U.O. Hobgood residence located at 1602 Ave. H. The 1974 Ford Thunderbird was stolen between 11 p.m. June 27 and 8 a.m. June 28.

The car was recovered after Lubbock police officers spotted it at the Canyon Lakes area of Lubbock Sunday afternoon. The Thunderbird had been wrecked.

No one had been arrested or charged for the theft at press time.

A 19-year-old black male was caught June 21 after taking \$9.50 worth of gas from Allsup's without paying for it.

Saturday, June 20, a stereo was stolen from Tommy Campbell. The stereo is valued at \$50.

Jennings' special is the homemade pizza he serves. Four flavors of ice cream have also been added to the menu.

Mrs. Vecchio will assist Jennings as a cook and at the counter.

Board Accepts \$34,423 Roofing Bid, Hires Teachers

The Abernathy School Board met Monday, June 29 for an early July meeting due to business that needed to be discussed before the July 4th weekend. The board approved a \$36 thousand roofing bid and hired four new teachers for the coming school year.

The board accepted a bid of \$34,423 from Lydick Roofing, to re-roof Abernathy High School. Three other bids were submitted by Texas Roofing, Ajax Roofing, and Hamilton Roofing companies, but were not accepted because all were over \$36 thousand.

Teachers Hired
The board went into executive session to discuss personnel recommendations. Four new teachers were hired. They are James Crites, VEH; Vickie Hall, Visually Handicapped; Donna Irons, Diagnostician; and Janis Myatt, Special Education.

Two more teachers resigned this past month. Delbert Dearing resigned from his job as health teacher, drivers education teacher, and boy's assistant coach. Francis Burrus resigned from her job with the Migrant Program.

Bids Accepted To Complete Room
Bids submitted for the unfinished room in the Administration Building were then examined by the board. Lubbock Development submitted a bid of \$26,338 and Monterey Construction entered a bid of \$21,850. The later bid was accepted by the board.

Other Business
The board discussed the fleet policy insurance bids. This year's policy will end September 1. It was decided that the following will be taken up at the August meeting.

School depository contract bids were submitted last month to several area banks. The board heard from three banks and only one of these submitted a bid. The bid was accepted with the First State Bank of Abernathy for pledged securities for next year.

Jerry Oswald was selected to serve as

the Abernathy delegate to the TASB convention held in Dallas. Oswald represented Abernathy last year at this convention.

Student Insurance Coverage was taken into consideration and action on this item will take place at the August meeting.

Several changes in the high school and junior high school handbooks were made as previously outlined by Mitch LeMoine and Frank Bartlett. The board agreed to these changes.

Immunizations Required For Elementary Students

Section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas Elementary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required immunizations:

Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs are required to have three doses of oral polio, three doses of DTP vaccines and one dose each of measles, rubella and mumps vaccine.

Children enrolled in kindergarten through grade five should have at least three doses of oral polio vaccine with

the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4. At least three doses of DTP but one dose must have been received after age 4.

All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness. One dose of Rubella vaccine is required.

Mumps vaccine is required for all students through eight years of age or 3rd grade.

A copy of the student's original birth certificate will also be needed for enrollment this fall.

'A Glance At The Past'

The Column heading which I have used for a number of years, News & Comments, currently is a misnomer. Starting this week, the heading has been changed to "A Glance At The Past" which is more consistent with the column contents. In addition to news from The Review of yesteryears, there will be comments indicated by bold-face type.

This week we're skipping around through the months and years to lead you through The Review memory lane.

From The Review dated February 10, 1938:

The banner head was "Rural Telephones Discussed by C. of C." This drive by the Chamber of Commerce was mainly to get more telephones in farmers' homes. During the meeting, Ray Pinson stated that the town residents also need more telephones. "This place," said E.B. Lindsey, "is the least telephone conscious of any town I ever saw."

Women of the community cooperated in staging a food sale at Struve's. The profit

went into a fund to Beautify the City.

The Antelopes and Lady Lopes were playing for the Hale County Basketball Championship in a tourney at Plainview.

A community singing held in the school auditorium drew a "standing room only" crowd.

Local Boy Scouts joined other Scouts over the world in celebrating the 28th Anniversary of the Boy Scout organization. As part of the observance, Hale County Boy Scouts went to Plainview to fill county offices for a day. From here, Robert DeLaney served as County Superintendent.

Leach Arterburn and Delvis Hallmark served as Sheriff's Deputies.

In building notes: G.W. Tannehill remodeled the interior of the Doc Crow house which was recently purchased by J.C. Hurst and family who will move here from Hale Center. (Hurst was owner of The Abernathy Weekly Review and Hale Center American. The Hursts also owned movie theatres in Abernathy and

Hale Center.) Forty-three years later, in 1981, the interior of the same house is being remodeled by R.C. Patterson, Jr., who bought the property on 5th St. & Ave. E.

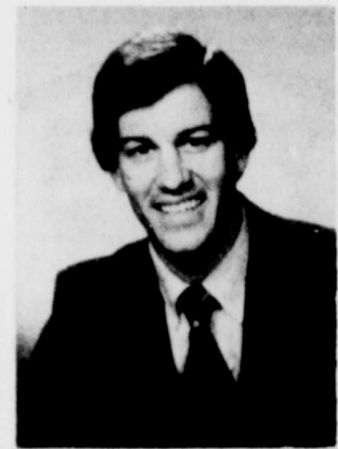
