

Abernathy Controllers Against Strike

A recent interview of Abernathy Air Traffic Controllers by the Abernathy Weekly Review, revealed that local controllers were against the National Air Traffic Controllers Union strike. The three local controllers interviewed were James Pope, Billy Smyers and Don Lloyd.

Team Supervisor of Air Controllers, Previously he has been a controller at Amarillo, Lubbock and Waco before returning to Lubbock, a total of 11 years experience. Smyers did not support the strike. He was against it from the start. Some of the controllers he supervises are in the process of being terminated because they did go on strike and didn't show up for work. Smyers stated that as far as he knew, all controllers that walked out during the strike were members of the Union. "But there are

several Union members still working" Smyers said. "Before the strike, Lubbock had approximately 40 controllers, now there are approximately 21 controllers left," Smyers said. He also stated that Lubbock had a small amount of controllers walk out as compared to most other airports.

James Pope, who has worked as a controller the past 12 and 1/2 years at Lubbock was also against the strike.

"I don't believe in strikes," Pope said. "Most Unions have too much power as it is," Pope did not support the strike at all, but he did hope the FAA and Controllers would work closer together in the future in their negotiations. He also stated that he would like to see a greater number of Controllers receive retirement compensation at 50 years of age. Presently, only 11 percent of all controllers make it to retirement age to receive compensation.

Don Lloyd, has had 11 years controlling experience, 4 in Albuquerque, New Mexico and the past 7 at Lubbock.

Lloyd did not support the strike and stated that it is not right to strike. He was happy with the way things were before the strike. He also said that the heaviest striking was going on in the Northeast and that this area probably had more problems because airports are more congested.

All three controllers have been working longer shifts since the strike. They were working a 40 hour work week before the strike. Now they are working 48 hours to suffice for the controllers who walked out.

All three controllers expressed sympathy for their friends in the union who walked out and no longer have jobs.

The Union was striking for a \$10 thousand across the board raise, retirement benefits, and more favorable work weeks and conditions.

I-27 Open, Accident Not The Cause

I-27, Highway 87, officially opened Tuesday, August 18 after the debris from the overpass wreck through Abernathy had been cleared. According to James King, the District Administrative Engineer and Public Relations Consultant for the Highway Department, the accident which occurred Tuesday morning had nothing to do with I-27 opening immediately through Abernathy. "I-27 had just been completed and was ready to open Tuesday morning," King said.

The interstate will remain open unless portions are temporarily closed to finish technical details such as grooving the pavement, installing signs or painting stripes," King stated.

The Department of Public Safety has been investigating the wreck and has come to suspect that someone or something caused the 18 wheeler to swerve from the west 87 service road, according to King. It is unlikely that the driver fell asleep, because they had

spent the previous night in Amarillo and skid marks show that the driver applied his breaks before hitting the rail," King said. "The driver had to have been going at a high rate of speed though," King said.

"108 people in Texas alone, have died in the past year at highway construction zones." "It is extremely important for motorists to slow down at these areas and obey all warning signs," King added.

Interstate 27 is 99 percent complete for the section through Abernathy. The 9.3 mile section through Abernathy was started December 10, 1979 and it took 375 days to complete it. The construction workers had until September as the deadline for completion. The newly constructed interstate covers a distance of 1.5 miles directly in Abernathy.

Cost of the 9.3 mile section through Abernathy amounted to \$19,905,453.

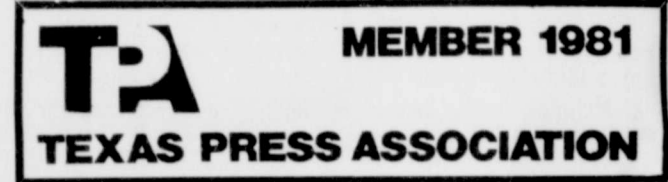

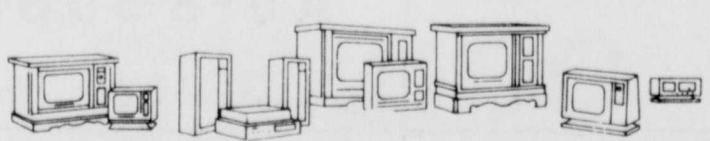

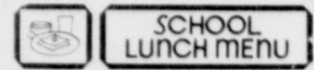

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USDA Studies New Sales Policy For CCC Corn

Southwest sorghum and corn producers have recommended to Agriculture Secretary John Block that corn shipped into the Texas High Plains from the upper Midwest be restricted to export sales only.

Officials of Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) and Texas Corn Growers Association (TCGA) and their legal counsel met with Block and other USDA officials to discuss the effect of sales of the corn by Commodity Credit Corporation.

The CCC purchased more than 200 million bushels of corn last year after President Jimmy Carter announced the embargo of grain to the Soviet Union. More than 45 million bushels

of corn was shipped from the northern corn belt to the Texas High Plains for storage, where it is now being offered for sale on a bid basis.

Noting that very little of the corn has been sold in recent weeks because CCC has refused most bids, GSPA-TCGA spokesman Elbert Harp said, "CCC's self-imposed limits offer farmers little assurance as long as the official policy is to sell the corn for unrestricted use. The threat of sales," Harp observed, "depresses prices just as much as actual sales."

The plan which GSPA-TCGA proposed to USDA was endorsed by 15 state and national farm organizations which represent grain

farmers in the Southwest. Their recommendation was that the corn which CCC shipped to the High Plains from the northern corn belt and has now marked for sale be restricted to the export market. If USDA must sell any of the CCC corn because it is out of condition, it should be replaced with purchases of corn in the area of sales.

The GSPA-TCGA plan was endorsed by the National Association of Wheat Growers and the Texas Wheat Producers Association. The state Grain Sorghum Producers Associations in Nebraska, Kansas and New Mexico, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, South Texas Cotton and Grain Producers Association and the Cotton and Grain Producers of the Lower Rio Grande Valley also were Co-signers of the proposal.

The commodity organizations were joined by general farm organizations of the area: Texas Farmers Union, New Mexico Farmers Union, National Women Involved in Farm Economics, the state W.I.F.E. organizations in Texas and New Mexico, the national American Agriculture Movement and the New Mexico A.A.M.

Harp said USDA made no commitments but agreed to study the proposal and would give the group an answer soon.



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COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Thirteen of fifteen authorized Texas cotton interest organization caucused in Dallas August 18 and selected a total of 21 State cotton producers, 14 of them from the High Plains, to fill positions or serve as alternates in three national cotton industry groups.

The High Plains was represented at the caucus by Gary Ivey of Ralls, current President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Three members and three alternates were named to succeed themselves as directors to Cotton Incorporated (CI), the national cotton producers' fiber company which conducts research and market development programs under the Cotton Research and Promotion Act of 1966.

Renamed to the CI board as directors and alternates, respectively, were Donnell Echols of Lamesa and Don Marble of South Plains; J.D. Smith of Sudan and Gerald Caswell of Brownfield; L.C. Unfred, Tahoka, and Cliff Hoelscher of St. Lawrence.

Four members and four alternates were nominated for two openings on the Cotton Board, the administrative body responsible for collection of producer assessments, refunds, project approval and general oversight of the CI program. The Secretary of Agriculture is required by law to appoint two of the four "pairs" submitted by interest organizations.

Dan Davis and PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, both of Lubbock, were nominated as first choices for member and alternate, respectively, to fill one Cotton Board position. S.M. True of Plainview and Reed Lang of Rio Honda were nominated as second choices for member and alternate in that same position. Mike Burkholder of Pecos and Jack Young of Stamford were nominated as first choices for member and alternate, respectively, and B.H. DeBusk of Anson and Jim Bob Curry of Hale Center were submitted as second

Boys Ranch To Have Rodeo

Record setting crowds are expected when the rodeo is held on September 6 and September 7. Nearly 150 boys will be riding calves, steers, Brahma bulls and bareback broncs. They will be competing for belt buckles and trophies and the titles of "Junior and Senior All-Around Cowboys."

The rodeo is also a homecoming for nearly 4,000 boys who have lived at the Ranch since it was started by Cal Farley in 1939. They are members of the Boys Ranch Alumni Association and some are expected to travel long distances to be on hand for the action.

Plains Pest Management Report

Cotton
 Rains continued to fall over the area this week. Rain reports for Sunday night (August 16) were from 1 1/4" to 4", with most areas receiving around 2 inches. This rain fell on already saturated fields. The rain also delayed aerial applications and field scouting for pests. After these rains cotton aphid populations have decreased and should not be of much concern to growers.

The same is not true for the cotton bollworm! Bollworm egg laying activity appears to be heaviest in the northern corn production areas of Hale County and decrease toward the southern areas. Some fields treated before the rains now have small larvae appearing and

heavy egg lays with which to contend. Fields which had bollworms before the rains and have not been treated, now have the whole gamut of larvae sizes. Bollworm egg and larval counts reported from Edmonson, Kress, Mayfield, Cotton Center and Hale Center areas have ranged from 0-250 eggs per 100 plants and 0-310 worms per 100 plants. Averages were 113 eggs per 100 plants and 86 worms per 100 plants. Damaged fruit counts in untreated fields have averaged 19 percent. Counts converted to numbers per acre range from 0-119,166 eggs per acre and 0-257,000 worms per acre. Averages were 55,700 eggs per acre and 42,500 worms per acre.

Light trap collections of bollworm moths were not

able to be counted except in one trap equip with a rain drain. This trap was located at Edmonson and collected 4,048 moths for the period August 12-18. This is over twice as many as were collected in the same trap a week ago.

Soybeans
 Soybeans podworms (cotton bollworms) are light to moderate in most fields. The economic threshold from pod formation to bean maturity is when 30 larvae per 30 feet of row are found. Carbaryl (Servin R), methomyl (Lannate R or Nudrin R), methyl parathion or parathion are suggested for control.

Sorghum
 Sorghum headworms continue to be found in light to moderate levels. Producers of seed production fields should use an average of 1 per head as an economic threshold and commercial grain producers should use a threshold of an average of 2 per head.

Sorghum midge should be watched for in blooming fields. Scouts continue to report light infestations.

Greenbug infestations remain light after initial treatments but growers should watch out for build backs.

Corn
 Most corn has reached physiological maturity and growers are waiting for grain to dry to the correct moisture for harvest. Rains and high humidity have greatly slowed the drying.

Hale Crops Tour September 4

The 1981 Hale County Agricultural Extension Service Crops Tour will be conducted September 4, 1981, in the Hale Center area. The tour will start at 9:00 a.m. from the south side of the Fire Station, according to Billy Warrick, County Extension Agent-Agriculture.

Topics of interest to be covered include new cotton varieties and production, corn production and varieties, insect control, soybean inoculation, weed control through chemical and cultural practices, and wheat

varieties and production. The tour is co-sponsored by the Hale County Extension Service Feed Grain and Other Crops Committee, The Hale County Extension Service Cotton Committee, Hale Center Young Farmers, and the Hale Center Chamber of Commerce Agricultural Committee.

The meeting is open to all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin. We encourage all farmers and businessmen to attend this highly informative meeting.
