

Antelopes Down Owls In Old Rivalry Game 24-0

The Abernathy Antelopes made winning look easy Friday night by passing for 205 yards and rushing for 131 more. Four touchdown passes from quarterback Max Riley to receiver Rodney Cannon highlighted Friday nights

It all started in the Lopes first possession of the game, when Malcolm Dunn took a pitch and ran 27 yards down the field. Five plays later Riley connected with Cannon on a 15 yard pass play for the first touchdown with 9: 29 left in the first quarter. The PAT attempt was no good and the Lopes led

The Lopes then kicked to the Owls. There was a fumble on the kick and Ronnie Taylor recovered the ball on the Owl 20 yard line. The Owls got tough and stopped the Lopes after four offensive plays.

City Budget **Hearing Sept. 28**

The City of Abernathy will hold a public hearing September 28 at 7 p.m. in the City Hall meeting room for all persons interested in the City's operating budget for the 1981-82 fiscal year.

The hearing will include the expenditure of General Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the City. It is estimated that the City will be allotted \$19 thousand in General Revenue Sharing Funds which have been budgeted

Four plays later, Riley connected with Cannon who went in for 6 points and his fourth touchdown of the game. The 16 yard touchdown pass made the score 240.


The Owls would show to have some offensive ability their next two possessions, containing the ball for the time remaining in the third quarter.

Coaches Comments Antelope head coach Larry Aldridge stated that he was especially pleased with the Lope defense, who has only allowed 6 points in the last three games. "The defense is far from reaching it's peak and the players continue to improve every week," Aldridge said. Aldridge also praised the offense for scoring 70 points in the last three

"The game against Roosevelt next week is going to be a tough game,' Adlridge stated. "Roosevelt has bigger defensive and offensive linemen and three swift backs who represent the Roosevelt sprint relay team," Aldridge added. Aldridge did express optimism about the outcome of the game stating that the Lopes can and will win if they play a decent game.

A career in telephore installation and repairing that began October 15, 1945. in Weslaco, Texas, will end in Abernathy at the close of the work-day September 30, 1981. Wayne R. Arthur will begin life as a retired person

Arthur worked for Southwestern Association Telephone Company in Weslaco before being transferred to Lubbock in December, 1948. Southwestern Associated Telephone Company, a forerunner of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, served Reese Air Force Base, (formerly Lubbock Army Air Field), and several small towns around Lubbock, including Abernathy.

The telephone company assigned Arthur to Abernathy February 1, 1950. The telephone company has been in three different locations: in a wood building where Southwestern Public Service Co. currently is located, and at 406 10th Street, the present location of Angie's Beauty Salon, and now at 711 10th Street. The first two locations housed equipment that required telephone operators. When Abernathy was converted to the dial system Dec. 6, 1959, it was housed in a new brick building at its current location on the corner of 10th Street and Avenue H.

Arthur has been a part of the telephone company's healthy growth in Abernathy from the 325 telephones when he first started serving the local exchange to the estimated 2,100 telephones in 1981.

Arthur has developed knee trouble that hampers his climbing up and down telephone poles. He could have stayed with the comany for another three years, but it would require a transfer to another town and working inside. He didn't want to move to another town, and he did not want a job that required him to stay in-doors.

Wayne R. Arthur was born August 20, 1919, in Lamar, Oklahoma to Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Arthur. He attended schools in Lamar, Okla., and in Clarendon, Texas. The family moved back to





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

Plains Pest Management Report

A devastating hail storm moved through an area on Sunday night from southwest to southeast of Plainview. The storm stripped leaves from sorghum, soybeans and cotton. Overall corn and sorghum received the least amount of damage. In several instances cotton and soybeans had an excessive amount of leaves and pods or bolls knocked from the plants.

Scattered showers have also slowed corn harvesting.

Cotton Bollworm activity remains low in most fields. A few fields still have egg lays up to 120,000 eggs per acre and 38,000 worms per acre. At this time of year it is extremely difficult to justify pesticide application for bollworm control, since most fields now have 80 to 90% mature or tough bolls. As

squares and small boils are shed from the plant the susceptible fruit density drops and bollworm populations often collapse. Beneficial insect and spider populations are also helping to check remaining bollworm populations

Corn

Southwestern corn borer girdling remains at approximately the same levels as last week. Corn yields reported so far have been in the 6,500-10,500 pound per acre range. Again, we would like to mention that area wide stubble destruction will greatly reduce overwintering southwestern corn borer populations. If stubble is to be left for grazing of cattle or prevention of soil errosion, efforts should be made to destroy stalks before mid-

Sovbeans Many soybeans fields are now beginning to turn yellow. A few of the early maturity varieties have lost most of their leaves.

> Sorghum Spider mite populations re-

main stable. Sorghum rust continues to be found in many fields. The severe leaf reactions are most common-

ly found in seed production fields. No lodging due to leaf loss by this disease has been observed at this time.



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Efficient Gas Energy for West Texas

From the Abernathy Weekly Review dated September 11, 1941:

In addition to motor vehicles from the Big Three, GM, Ford and Chrysler, other automobiles were being produces in 1941: the Studebaker, Hudson, Nash, Packard, Wyllis and Cros-

The Federal government ordered all car makers to reduce the number of cars produced in the last four months of 1941. Then began the customer lists at auto dealerships, You had your name placed on lists and you had to wait until dealers received the cars. Most signees had to wait a long time as the nation's car factories changed from car to war production. (I was caught with a 1937 Plymouth which I drove until receiving a new 1946 Plymouth from a dealer in Quitaque, who delivered the car to me in Abernathy and drove the 1937 Plymouth back home.

I developed a great fondness for the 1937 Plymouth. It was on that car's radio that I heard about the bombing of Pearl Harbor; heard the United States declare war, and the ending of the war August 14, 1945.)
