#### FOR ALL SCHOOL CHILDREN

Immunizations Mandatory The recent Senate Bill 27, amending section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code is now in effect and requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools or institutions of higher education must have been immunized against six diseases: diptheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella and smallpox. The law states that "the State Department of Health shall provide the required immunization to children in areas where no local provision exists to provide these services.

All students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the summer and fall 1971 terms, with the provision that their immunization against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972, and all completed as soon as medically feasible.

According to Mrs. Elizabeth Acree, Haskell County School nurse, students in Haskell County will be required to have records for each child and to complete these records by January 1, 1972.

An immunization clinic is provided at the Community Action building in Haskell the first Saturday in each month from 2 until 4 p. m. where all these required immunizations may be received free from the State these first Saturday clinics for Health Department. These recorded immunization records will be sent to your respective schools. Mrs. Acree, school nurse, highly recommends that each family take advantage of these free immunizations.

Children in Kindergarten and and Grade 1 through 5: Polio -At least three doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more

Diptheria, Tetanus-minimum of three doses with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday. (Usually given as DPT for children under six years of age, and TD for children six years of age and older.)

Measles: One dose of vaccine or history of measles illness. Rubella: One dose of vaccine, not required past age 12 years. Smallpox: One vaccination within the past 10 years.

Children and others in grade 6 through 12-Polio: At least 3 doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday. (Polio vaccine is not required for persons 19 years of age or older.)

Diptheria, Tetanus: Minimum of 3 doses with last dose within 10 years. Booster dose only after initial series.

Measles: The majority of children in this group will have been previously immunized or obtained natural immunity through infection. Recommended but not required on an individual basis is history

of vaccine or illness is thought to be negative.

Rubella: Not required past age 12 years.

Smallpox: One vaccination within the past 10 years.

that precipitation for the month of July was 2.18 inches, while normal rainfall for the month is 2.38 inches.

Normal rainfall to date is 14.31 inches; however, only 8.63 inches has fallen in Haskell through July, according to 'Mr. Sam's" records This is how the rains came during July: July 2, .41; July 4. .01; July 20, .01; July 21, .11; July 23, .18; July 24, .19; July 27, .08; July 30, 1.19. Total, 2.18. The clouds cleared away Saturday, but moved back-in, Sunday, and slow, soil-soaking rains began falling again early Sunday morning, with Haskell receiving another .53 of an inch; Rule, .50; Weinert, .40; Rochester, .20; Paint Creek, 1.00.Several communities in the county gauged "good rains" during July, but was still spotted A low of .59 degrees was registered on July 31. Highest reading of the month was on July 5th, when the temperature climbed to 103. From last Thursday's, Friday's and Sunday's rainfall, Haskell received a total of 1.72; Rule, 1.60; Weinert, 1:30; Rochester, .70.





The original Cattleman's Round-Up for crippled children which benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Abilene, will kick-off its twelfth annual Round-Up this month, according to James Powell of Haskell, area chairman.

The Round - Up operates in many different phases. The next three phases will be the Cattle Sale on Sept. 27, at the Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction in Abilene; the Horse Sale on October 2, at Abilene Livestock Auction; and the Sheep and Goat Sale on October 11 at the Coleman Livestock Auction.

The Center's 1971 operating budget is \$426,000. Operation of the Round-Up is the result of ranchers and stockmen picking out a calf or a pen of calves or some other livestock and pledging them to the Round-Up.

Powell said that area chairmen will contact the ranchers and farmers and make arrangements for transportation to the sale. Each animal is sold under the donor's name. The results not only help many handicapped people, but it is also good public relations for the donor. Animals expected will be from top bulls from the Southwest's leading ranches to baby calves and lambs.

Dr. Barton stated, "Farmers Union is concerned that its membership and rural people generally are able to receive magazines newspapers, and other printed sources of information through the mail at reasonable costs to them. There is a distinct possibility that many weekly newspapers serving primarily rural areas will be forced out of business if the full rate increases are implemented as proposed." Jay Naman, president of the Texas Farmers Union, said in Waco that the rural people of Texas have an important stake in maintaining a strong rural press. He said, "We see blocking this effort to increase second class postal rates as an essential aspect of our effort in behalf of rural development."
