Delegates also approved the 1983 TASB Legislative Program which calls for increased support for the Foundation School Program by at least \$2 billion, with one-half of the new monies to go to salaries. The program also calls for simplification of the truth-in-taxation computation, opposes collective bargaining and arbitration rights for public school employees state-mandated financial disclosure requirements for local school board






