Orland Gilbert, A representative of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss, Certified Public Accountants, explained the 1982-83 school financial audit statement to the board members. Following the presentation, the board approved the audit.

The textbook committee for the 1982-83 school year was appointed.

Two juveniles were caught following the burglary of a coin operated machine at the Exxon Service Station. Caught taking \$19.50 in quarters from the machine were two juveniles, a 14 year old Mexican-American male and a 15 year old Mexican-American male, according to the Abernathy P.D.

deaconess in the Nazarene Church for 38 years. She has also served the church for almost 60 years.

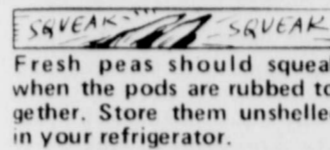
Mrs. Brewer has two sons, Murry Brewer of Midland and Audy Brewer of Kingland.


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Veterans Day Is Today

Jerry Lewis (R-Calif.) addressed the National Cotton Council's Pink Bollworm Action Committee this week at a meeting in California, updating the status of agricultural appropriations bills pending in Washington. 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

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7th Lopes Finish Season On Winning Note

The 7th Lopes finished their 1982 football season on a winning note by defeating the Dimmitt 7th grade team 12-8 last Thursday night at Antelope Field.

The 7th Lopes scored early in the first quarter when Irvin Dunn broke through the Dimmitt defensive line and scampered 55 yards for a touchdown. The

PAT attempt failed and the Lopes led 6-0.

The second score came in the second quarter on another big play. This time Ricky May broke loose and never looked back. He ran 62 yards to put the 7th Lopes ahead 12-0. The conversion attempt again failed.

Dimmitt came right back

in the second quarter with their first big play of the evening. They scored on a 54 yard pass play. The extra point attempt failed and the score was 12-6 at halftime.

The tough Lope defense prevailed in the third and fourth quarters and did not allow Dimmitt to catch up. They did allow Dimmitt 2 more points when the Lopes intentionally ran into their own end zone for a touchdown. This was to avoid giving Dimmitt good field position. This gave Dimmitt 2 more points, but the Lopes held them on their final drive and the game ended 12-8.

The 7th Lopes gained an impressive 250 yards rushing. Irvin Dunn and Ricky May gained most of these yards.

Coach Rodriguez praised the running of Dunn and May along with the great blocking of Randy Konstantakos. Kelly Vandyriff,

James Pearson and Flint Bigham.

On defense, Rodriguez praised the performance of Pete Garcia, Rob Givens, Ricky May, Irvin Dunn, Cody Wages and Randy Konstantakos for making the big plays.

"This was their best game of the year offensively and defensively," Rodriguez said. He added that "it has been a successful year because the team has learned something with each game and have improved with each game." The 7th Lopes ended their season with a record of 3-4-1.

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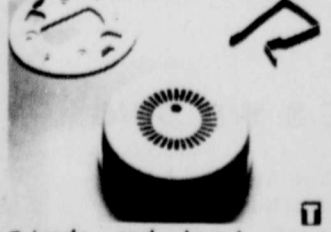

Lions Second In District, On To The Playoffs

The New Deal Lions suffered their first loss of the 1982 season last Friday night to Shallowater. For the third year in a row, the Mustangs got more of the breaks in the 21-14 victory over the mighty Lions. The Lions fought the Mustangs all game long but could not overcome the many costly mistakes that eventually lead to their defeat.

A very large crowd gathered to witness one of the most physical football games seen in a long time, but that can always be expected when New Deal and Shallowater do battle. In the first quarter, New Deal's trouble began after the opening kickoff. Shallowater had the ball on their own 34 yard line, and on the first play from scrimmage, tailback Kelvin Taylor broke loose around the left end and raced virtually untouched for 66 yards and the games first points. Pruitt Garland then added the PAT and the Mustangs were on top 7-0.

If the Lions were stunned at all, they didn't show it as they took the ball, after the kickoff from their own 30 yard line, and drove 70 yards in 15 plays with Robert Lee Villegas crashing over from 1 yard out to score. The Lions 2 point conversion attempt failed and the Lions trailed 7-6 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the two teams battled each other for field position and a lucky break. Late in the quarter, however, the Mustangs had mounted a drive into Lion territory and were faced with a 4th and 1 situation. On the 4th down try, one of the Lion defenders anticipated the count a little early, and was called off sides. The Mustangs had new life, and scored just before halftime as Kelvin Taylor plunged across the goal line for the score. This time, Garland's PAT attempt was wide right and not good. As time ran out in the first half, the Mustangs were ahead 13-6.

In the third quarter, things got even worse for the Lions. New Deal moved the ball consistently throughout the quarter, but turnovers killed all but one drive. That coming after Craig Harrington had intercepted a Mustang pass deep in Mustang territory. With 3:06 left in the third quarter and the ball on the Shallowater 25 yard line, the Lions scored in 5 plays and 2 minutes as QB Craig Harrington passed 11 yards to brother Mark Harrington brothers connected one again and they enjoyed their only lead of the night 14-13 as the quarter ended.

The Lions got the ball again after the Mustangs were held and were forced

to punt. The Lions, however, turned the ball over on their first down with 8:19 left in the game on an interception by Mustang John Silvas on their own 30 yard line. Shallowater wasted little time in regaining the lead as they moved 70 yards in only 6 plays to score. They key play of the drive was a 36 yard scramble by Taylor to the Lions 16 yard line. Taylor then drove up the middle from the 4 yard line to score his third and decisive touchdown. The Mustangs went for 2

and were successful as QB Rod Burgett passed to end Stuart Smith and the score was, Shallowater - 21, New Deal - 14.

The Lions tried in desperation to pull the game out in the closing seconds, but fell a little short. The loss was a heartbreaking experience for the Lions as they entered the game fully confident they could win, but this was one game where turnovers were the villain and the deciding factor in the outcome of the game.

Also, a point needs to be brought fourth in commending the effort by the Mustang linemen. It's not hard to understand why they are a good bunch of kids, since they are coached by an ex-New Deal Lion in James Tarter.

The Lions next opponent will be the champion of District 5-2A, the Farwell Steers. This game is the Bi-district contest and will be held in Hereford at 8 p.m. November 11th.

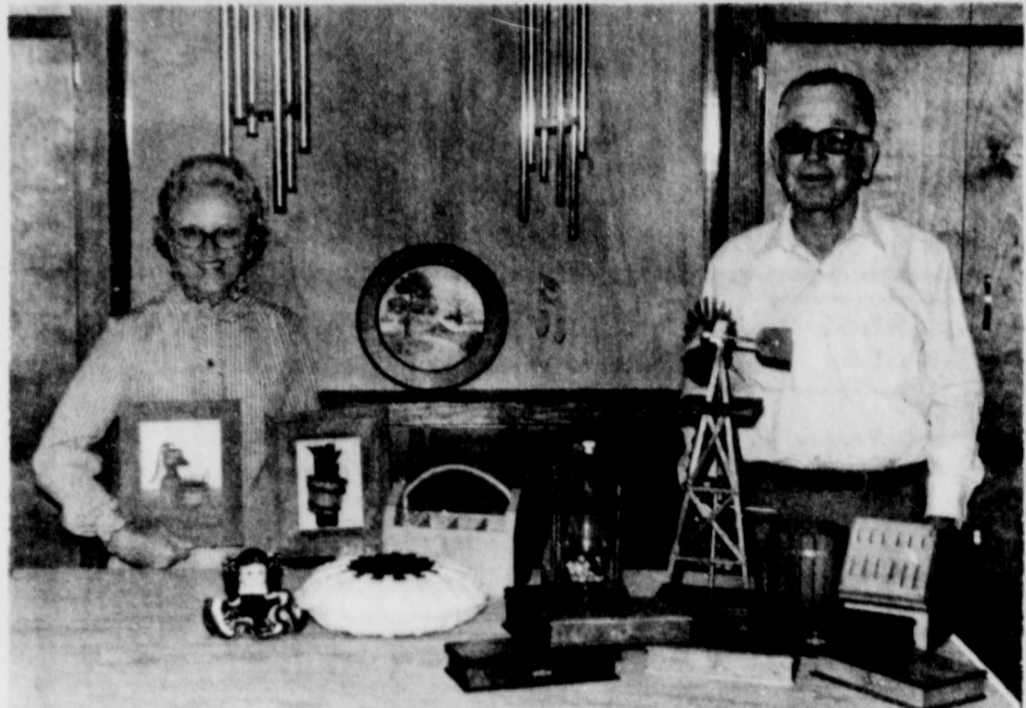
