





suffered their first loss of the 1982 season last Friday night to Shallowater. For the third year in a row, the Mustangs got more of the breaks in the 21-14 victory over the mighty Lions. The Lions fought the Mustangs all game long but could not overcome the many costly mistakes that eventually lead to their defeat.
