## Abernathy Weekly Review Turned 62 Years Old This Week

The Abernathy Weekly Review had its 62nd Birthday Wednesday, November 17 as it was started approximately November 17, 1921.

For the past 62 years, the Abernathy Weekly Review has been utilized as a local tool for expressing freedom of speech. The newspaper has strived to inform readers of the events taking place in Abernathy on a weekly basis, for the past 62 years.

This is the 3,173rd edition of the Review since it was first started in 1921. As far as we know, a week has not gone by in the past 62 years that a Review has not been published in Abernathy.

The first newspaper in Abernathy was called the "Abernathy Two-County News". There was no editor listed in the paper at this time, but Webster and Hardin were shown as the managers. The subscription rate at this time was \$1 per year. The paper was established March 29, 1912 and was published by the Abernathy Publishing Company.

It was not known what happened to the Abernathy Two-County News, but it passed on and another paper replaced it.

The next newspaper was published and edited by Rob E. Downey and was called the "Abernathy Breeze". Records indicated that it was established April 19, 1917. A long-time local, Arno

Struve, stated that he remembers that the newspaper office was located in the building that stood where the present Del Mar Hotel stands. This building has undergone several major changes since that time.

The first micro-film copy of an Abernathy Weekly Review, that has been kept by Arno Struve, is the Volume 1, number 16 edition and its printing date was March 2, 1922. This would make the first issue of the Review November 17, 1921. S.J. Redman was listed as the publisher and editor. The subscription rate was \$1 per year.

While Redman had the paper, Arno Struve's aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. W.A. Richter, were involved in much of the actual work of writing for the paper.

Stockton Henry purchased the paper from Redman and owned it for a short period.

Jack Hurst purchased the Review from Stockton Henry and was the publisher in the twenties. It was not recorded as to when Hurst took over. This was back when small town journalists used a linotype machine to run the papers off. The newspaper press was hand fed and if you missed putting in a sheet, the back-up cover would be printed and become spoiled with ink so that the next clean sheet would be smeared on the wrong

side, according to Arno Struve, who worked at the paper as a lad.

The first copy of the Abernathy Weekly Review that is available on micro-film, when the Hurst owned it, was dated December 3, 1931. The Editor was listed as Charles Hurst, who was Jack's father. Later that same month, a copy shows that the editorship was taken over by Vic Lamb on or before December 31, 1931.

Hurst continued to publish the paper while Lamb was running it. The Hursts were English. Jack had served in the British Navy in World War I. Both Jack and Charles were interesting to be around, Arno Struve recalls. Charles Hurst was an engineer and was largely responsible for getting the data together that caused the TUCO plant to be located at Abernathy.

While Jack Hurst published the Review, he took over the ownership and operation of the Hale Center American. Some time along the way, he acquired the moving picture houses in both Abernathy and Hale Center. The Hursts eventually disposed of their holdings in this area and the last years of their lives were spent in San Francisco.

Vic Lamb was one of the most colorful Editors of the Review, former Editor Buford Davenport remembers. Lamb was the editor of the Review from 1932-1935. Davenport worked

under Lamb during this period. Lamb presently lives in Sedona, Arizona.

Following Vic Lamb, Buford Davenport became the editor of the Review in 1935. Davenport is the long-time Editor of the Review as he faithfully kept it going strongly for the next 39 years until 1974. Davenport kept the paper going, during the good times as well as the bad, during those 39 long years always being of service to Abernathy's public during those growing years.

Richard and Vicki Havens became editors of the Review in 1975 and continued to edit and publish it until 1981.

January 1, 1981, Keith Tooley became the editor and is presently the editor. Mr. and Mrs. Brad Tooley, of Slaton, and Keith Tooley purchased the paper January 1, 1981 and have published the paper as partners since then.

## Chamber Discusses Octoberfest, Bazaar And Crime Stoppers

The Abernathy Chamber of Commerce met Thursday morning, November 4 to discuss several important projects.

Approximately 20 members enjoyed breakfast cooked by Mrs. Charles Bowen, Mrs. Richard Boyles and Mrs. Y.F. Snodgrass.

It was decided that the community survey, which was inserted into the community brochures, will be revised with current figures and accurate information pertaining to Abernathy and the area. Some of the figures, which were printed in the community surveys earlier, are not accurate. Therefore, the Chamber will research these figures and have the surveys re-printed before being inserted into the brochures. 1,000 brochures were printed.

Struve, Dan Ward and others volunteered to help. Others will be needed to help and should contact Diana Phillips and volunteer.

It was stated that the Christmas decorations and lights will be put up soon. Bill Scott, and his crew at Southwestern Public Service, will once again install them.

Mike Savage, a Detective Sergeant for the Slaton Police Department, was present at the meeting to give a talk on the "Crime Stopper" program. He informed Chamber members that since the Crime Stoppers program was started in Slaton in January of 1981, the program has contributed to 18 felony arrests, cleared 12 felony offenses, \$2,750 worth of stolen goods have been confiscated, and an incredible amount of drugs have been confiscated.

Savage told Chamber members all about the program and how it was started and administered in Slaton. There was some interest in the program, but no action was taken for or against it. Savage was there to present the program and the Chamber will decide if it wants to sponsor a local Crime Stoppers program at the next Chamber meeting in December.

## Girls Cross Country Team Wins Third At State Meet

The Abernathy Girls Cross Country team has once again proved to the State of Texas that Abernathy is one of the superior teams in the state in 3-A, 2-A and 1-A girls cross country competition as they won third place at the State Cross Country meet Saturday on the Southwestern University campus at Georgetown.

The Lady Lopes came in third behind Frisco, first with 70 points, and Prairieview, second with 90 points. The Lady Lopes won third place with 103 points. Goliad was fourth.

There were 140 runners at the State meet and the Lady Lopes competed against 11 teams from all over the state. The state is divided into four regions and three teams from each region qualified for the state meet.

Abernathy competed against 3-A, 2-A and 1-A teams as they are all placed in one division.

## Council Discusses Several Important Business Items

The Abernathy City Council met Monday night, November 8 to discuss items on a short agenda. The meeting began at 7:30 p.m. and was held at the City Hall meeting room.

The minutes of the October 11 meeting were discussed and approved. A hearing for visitors present was then held. There were no visitors.

City Manager Rod Ellis stated that approximately \$10 to \$15 thousand will not be used on the airport improvements that are presently going on. The City will have this much left over from the project. Ellis suggested that the \$10 to \$15 thousand be used to put a fence around the runway in order to prevent unnecessary wear on the runway, surface and to prevent vehicles from getting in the way of landing planes. The idea was discussed, but the Council will not take action until they see how much will be left from the airport project.

The Council discussed the City's group health insurance plan for City employees. Health insurance is going up state-wide soon. Therefore, Blue Cross upped their prices on health insurance to Abernathy City employees. Abernathy has 11 employees who are covered under this Blue Cross group policy.

The Council has until December 1 to renew the policy with Blue Cross, but it was suggested that Rod Ellis shop around and take bids from other insurance companies in hopes of finding a lower bid for health insurance for City employees.

Blue Cross is going up 60% because health insurance claims paid by them have totalled \$14,067 since the 8-1-79, compared to only \$8,327 in premiums that they have received. Over the past three years, Blue Cross has taken a loss every year.

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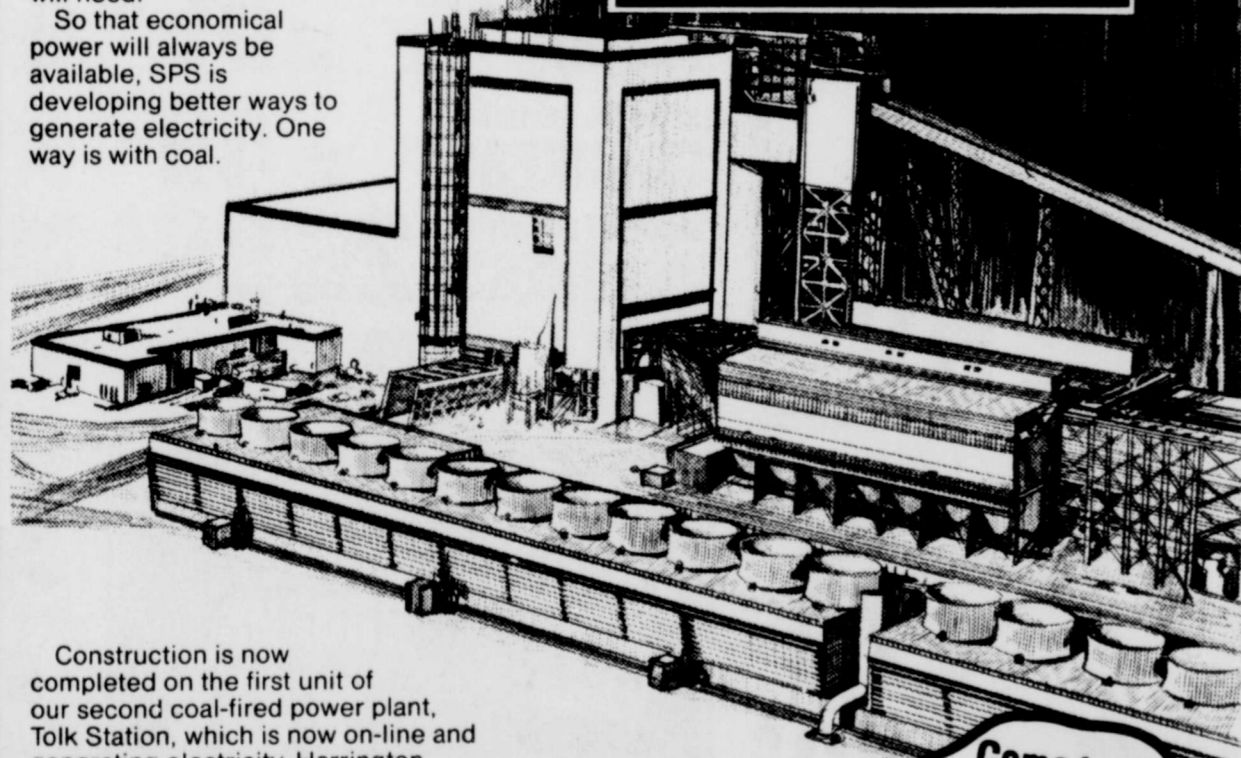
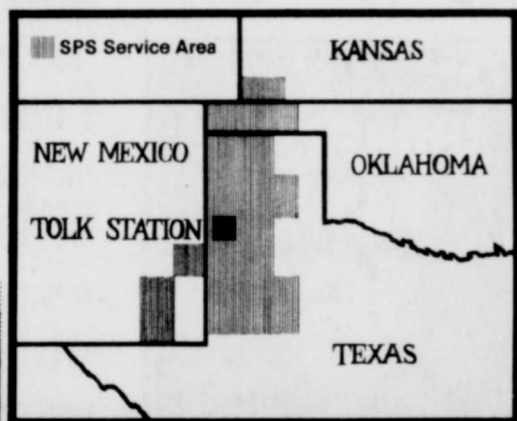

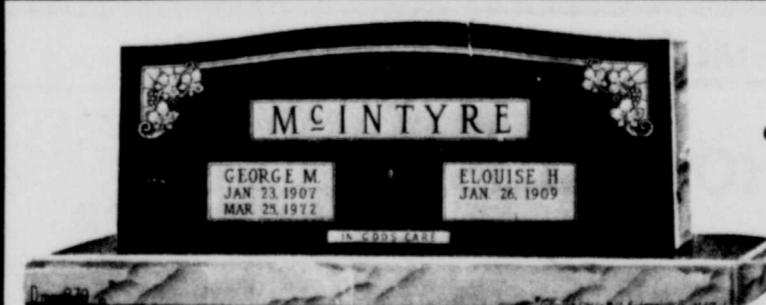


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
