She made it so very interesting the serious times and the fun times in their lives. Edith has a way of really pleasing our group of ladies by giving a little more than equal time to the wives of these great men.

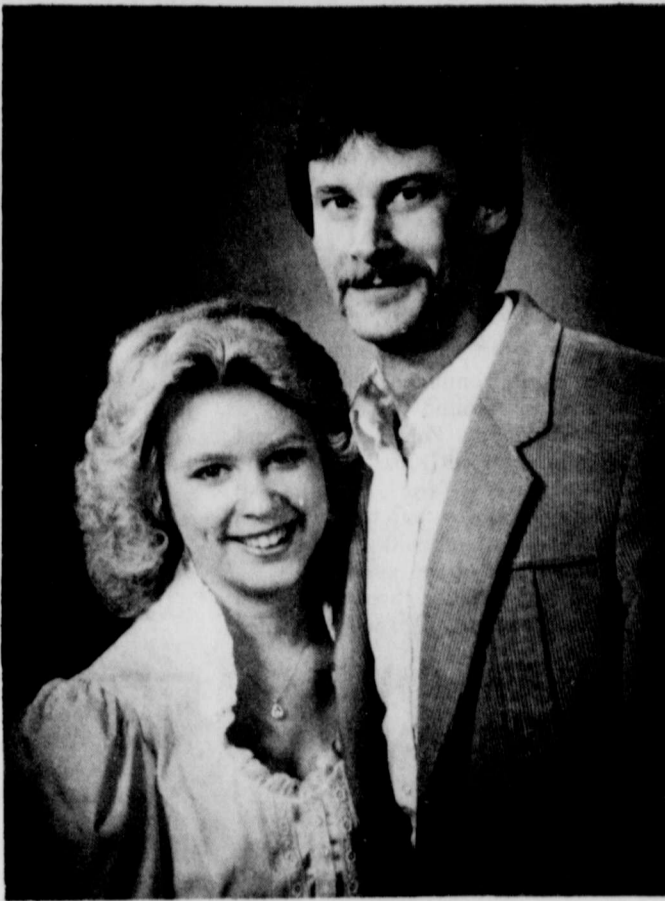

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# FARM PAGE

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**ANNUALS FOR THE LANDSCAPE**--A bed of flowering annuals is a versatile means of providing color and accents in home landscapes, says a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Use annuals as borders along fences, at the side of houses or around patios. Plant them in raised beds that aid drainage. Add peat moss or other organic matter to tight clay soils before planting, and broadcast a fertilizer such as 12-12-12 at the rate of 2-3 pounds per 100 square feet. Add a high nitrogen fertilizer every three or four weeks. Mulch around the plants with shredded pine bark or other material to conserve water, prevent crusting and reduce weeds.



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## COTTON TODAY

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

**COTTON USE IMPROVES:** Cotton use by U.S. mills increased in February as the seasonally adjusted annual rate rose to 5.5 million 480-pound bale-equivalents, according to the National Cotton Council. This was 1.8 percent higher than the January figure and 9.5 percent ahead of the 5-million-bale recorded a year ago.

The February total marked the highest rate of consumption since last April. Cotton's share of total fiber use settled at 25.8 percent, compared with 25.9 percent the previous month and 25.5 percent a year earlier.

Use of all fibers by domestic mills advanced to 21.3 million bale-equivalents, 2.6 percent above the January level and 8.4 percent higher than February last year, the Council reported.

**COTTON SALES TEAM WILL VISIT EUROPE:** A trade team will visit Europe May 14-28 to call on present and potential customers of U.S. cotton, according to Cotton Council International. The visit will include stops in Yugoslavia, Hungary, Spain, and either Italy or France.

Team members will be

Walton Scott, Sr., Spartanburg, S.C., and John Ellis, Memphis, representing the American Cotton Shippers Association; Larry La Touf, Bakersfield, Calif., AMCOT; Glen R. Stevens, Fresno, Calif., National Cotton Council Producer Steering Committee; Geron E. Rathell, Washington, D.C., Foreign Agricultural Service; and Paul S. Lewis and Peter Scott, Brussels, CCL.

**MAID TALKS COTTON:** Maid of Cotton Janie Taylor is on a 54-day trip to promote advantages of U.S. cotton with textile and government officials and the consuming public in seven countries -- Japan, Taiwan, Korea, England, Norway, Sweden, and Canada, according to the National Cotton Council.

During the trip the Maid will participate in special fashion shows, a cotton designer contest, retail promotions featuring products made from U.S. cotton, an interviews with representatives of print and electronic media.

Cotton Council International and the Foreign Agricultural Service are sponsors of the trip in cooperation with firms and organizations in each country.

## TFU Pleased With PIK Sign Up

The President of Texas Farmers Union announced today that he was extremely encouraged by the response of Texas farmers to the Payment-in-Kind (PIK) Farm Program, and issued a call for all farm organizations to work together for a long-term program to provide continuous supply management of agricultural commodities.

TFU head Mike Moeller, who farms in Hays and Guadalupe Counties, expressed optimism with regard to participation by Texas farmers as well as farmers throughout the United States in the 1983 crop land diversion program. Moeller emphasized that of the 82 million acres of crop land that will be taken out of production in 1983, nearly ten million acres, or

approximately 12% of the total, is Texas crop land. He said he was both surprised and pleased that Texas wheat farmers had actually exceeded the national average under the Set Aside Program. While some 35% of the total wheat acreage in the United States will be held out of production under the PIK proposal, Texas wheat farmers plan to set

aside 41% of their base wheat acreage in 1983. In addition, Moeller said Texas rice farmers would divert 46% of their base acreage compared to a 43% national average. He went on to say that Texas cotton farmers would divert some 3.5 million acres in 1983, which is more than half of the total cotton acreage diverted under the PIK program for

the entire United States. Only Texas feed grain producers fell somewhat below the national average in terms of projected acreage diversion. Nationwide, feed grain farmers will divert some 39% of their base acreage, while in Texas some 2.4 million feed grain acres will be idled, which represents about 35% of the base for the state.

"This high rate of participation by Texas farmers and those from other states," Moeller said, "demonstrates quite clearly that farmers want, and will support, a system of supply management that provides reasonable incentives to take land out of production."

Moeller, however, tempered his optimism with a note of caution. "All the good accomplished by the 1983 PIK program will be for naught if Congress and the Administration don't act quickly to provide a continuing supply management program for 1984 and subsequent years," Moeller

added that he was encouraged by remarks that U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block made at the recent National Farmers Union Convention, where Block pledged to support a program similar to PIK for 1984. Moeller said that he would be meeting soon with the heads of other agriculture-related organizations to help develop such an on-going program of supply management, and he expressed hope that if a consensus program can be developed, Congress and the Administration would act quickly to ratify it.

"Farmers need to be assured that there will be a long-term program to keep supply and demand for agricultural commodities in balance. Without such a program we will fall right back into the over-production, low price trap that we've been in for the past several years. I think the high rate of sign up in the PIK program shows that American farmers don't want that to happen," Moeller concluded.

## Emergency Operations Simulation April 14

An emergency operations simulation will be conducted April 14, 1983, in Disaster District 5A. The exercise will focus on severe winter storm preparedness.

District 5A consists of Lubbock, Hockley, Lynn, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Bailey, Cochran, Yoakum, Terry, Graza, Kent, Stone, Baylor, Knox, King and Dickens, Counties. Headquarters for the exercise

will be the Department of Public Safety's Emergency Operating Center (EOC) at 1302 Sixth Street in Lubbock. Each of the county EOCs is requested to "activate" and communicate with the Lubbock EOC.

Training consultant Jerry Daniel will conduct the exercise, which will involve various problems caused by a severe ice storm: closed roads, the interruption of electrical power, and obtaining food, shelter and medical services for stranded persons.

Planning for the simulation will begin April 5, with the actual exercise taking place from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on the 14th. The simulation will be critiqued at the DPD EOC in Lubbock following the exercise.

Agencies involved include the Departments of Public Safety, Water Resources, Highways and Public Transportation, Health, Parks and Wildlife, Human Resources, the Adjutant General's Department, Attorney General's Department, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Aeronautics Commission, Railroad Commission and the Red Cross.

The state of Texas Division of Emergency Management schedules a number of training events annually to help state and local governments exercise their disaster plans and train personnel.
