As spring-like weather approaches, we are again reminded that tornado season is just around the corner.

The Abernathy Police Department and Volunteer Fire Department would like to review the citizens of Abernathy on a few safety tips which should be remembered during this dreaded season of the year.

When a tornado threatens, your immediate action can save your life.

TIPS TO REMEMBER

1. TORNADO WATCH-tornadoes and severe thunderstorms are possible.

2. TORNADO WARINING-tornado detected; take shelter immediately.

3. In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or to an interior part on the lowest level-closets, bathrooms, or interior halls. Get under something sturdy.

4. In schools, nursing homes, hospitals, factories, and shopping centers, go to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on the lowest floor are usually best.

5. In high-rise buildings, go to interior small rooms or hallways. 6. In mobile homes or vehicles,

leave them and go to a substantial structure. If there is no shelter nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine, or culvert with your hands shielding your

7. Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls. 8. Listen to radio, television, or detected or that a report will not get through to the National Weather

LOCAL EMERGENCY SYSTEM

The Abernathy Police Department and Fire Department will have trained spotters observing the approach of threatening weather, should a watch for our area be issued by the National Weather Service.

In the event of possible danger to lives or property from tornadoes, the sirens will be sounded.

The community warning network cannot be completely effective, despite all efforts to improve its coverage and response time. There is always the chance that a tornado will not be

used all are siren equipped - this gives the city 9 additional sirens to be used. The downtown sirens will not cover

conditions, but will be used along with the city vehicles. If you hear sirens during a tornado warning, take immediate cover - this

could be the only warning you have. The spotters will be covering from the South-Southwest-West-Northwest of Abernathy.

When the spotters confirm a wallcloud with rotation, a funnel near the ground, or a tornado on the ground approaching Abernathy, this report will go to E.O.C. The Fire Department personnel will make the decision of whether or not to sound the warning

system. This depends on spotter information and National Weather Service reports, which the Fire Department has direct contact with.

If the warning is to be given, the sirens downtown will be used along with city trucks still in town or close by. The Fire Department trucks or police cars will probably have only enough time to make one pass down the streets, this depends on the distance from town in which the spotters have confirmed the tornado, its speed and direction of travel.

The Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department and Police Department would like to have the full cooporation of all citizens of Abernathy.

In order for this warning system to be effective, everyone should follow these do's and do not's:

Listen to NOAA Weather Radio reports.

Listen to your T.V.

Follow the previously mentioned safety tips when a warning is issued. Make your plans early.

Do not panic.

Do not get in your vehicle and go to the fire station or downtown.

Clip out the above information, and keep for future use.



COTTON USE IMP-ROVES: Cotton use by U.S. mills increased in February as the seasonally adjusted annual rate rose to 5.5 million 480-pound bale-equivalents, according to the National Cotton Council. This was 1.8 percent higher than the January figure and 9.5 percent ahead of the 5-million-bale recorded a

The February total marked the highest rate of consumption since last April. Cotton's share of total fiber use settled at 25.8 percent, compared with 25.9 percent the previous cotton with textile and month and 25.5 percent a vear earlier.

Use of all fibers by domestic mills advanced to 21.3 million bale-equivalents, 2.6 percent above the January level and 8.4 percent higher than February last year, the Council re-

An emergency operations simulation will be conducted April 14, 1983, in Disaster District 5A. The exercise will focus on severe winter storm preparedness.

District 5A consists of Lubbock, Hockley, Lynn, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Bailey, Cochran, Yoakum, Terry, Graza, Kent, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Young, Baylor, Knox, King and Dickens, Counties. Headquarters for the exercise will be the Department of Public Safety's Emergency Operating Center (EOC) at 1302 Sixth Street in Lubbock. Each of the county EOCs is requested to "activate" and communicate with the Lubbock EOC.

Training consultant Jerry Daniel will conduct the exercise, which will involve various problems caused by a severe ice storm: closed roads, the interruption of electrical power, and obtaining food, shelter and medical services for stranded

Planning for the simulation will begin April 5, with the actual exercise taking place from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on the 14th. The simulation will be critiqued at the DPD EOC in Lubbock following the exercise.

the entire United States. Only Texas feed grain producers fell somewhat below the national average in terms of projected acreage diversion. Nationwide, feed grain farmers will divert some 39% of their base acreage, while in Texas some 2.4 million feed grain acres will be idled, which represents about 35% of the base for the state.

"This high rate of participation by Texas farmers and those from other states," Moeller said, "demonstrates quite clearly that farmers want, and will support, a system of supply management that provides reasonable incentives to take land out of product-

Moeller, however, tempered his optimism with a note of caution, "All the good accomplished by the 1983 PIK program will be for naught if Congress and the Administration don't act quickly to provide a continuing supply management program for 1984 and subsequent years." Moeller

added that he was encour aged by remarks that U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block made at the recent National Farmers Union Convention, where Block pledged to support a program similar to PIK for 1984. Moeller said that he would be meeting soon with the heads of other agriculture-related organizations to help develop such an ongoing program of supply management, and he expressed hope that if a consensus program can be developed, Congress and the Administration would act quickly to ratify it.

"Farmers need to be assured that there will be a long-term program to keep supply and demand for agricultural commodities in balance. Without such a program we will fall right back into the over-production, low price trap that we've been in for the past several years. I think the high rate of sign up in the PIK program shows that American farmers don't want that to happen," Moeller concluded.







Fact: The automated equipment that will be used to process ZIP + 4 is currently used in foreign postal systems. It's also used in this country to process bank checks and credit card accounts. It's a proven. reliable technology that is being applied by the Postal Service to process mail more quickly, efficiently and at less cost.

Fiction: A recent study said the average person can't easily remember more than six or seven numbers in a series. This bodes ill for a system that depends upon a high rate of volunt-

ary compliance for success. Fact: Since you don't have to use ZIP + 4, you don't have to worry about memorizing the numbers, as I said earlier. However, if you did want to memorize them, you would only have to remember the four adno one would expect you to ditional digits, as most remember all the ZIP Codes people already know their own five-digit ZIP Codes. The four new digits, sepa-
