



## Lake Bids Open Today In Munday

The long-awaited, much-worked-for, and climactic bid opening for North Central Municipal Water Authority's Miller Creek Lake will get underway promptly at 2 p.m. today (June 15) in Munday, in a 'Texas size' ceremony.

The bids will be received, as is required, in the offices of NCTMWA. The public bid opening will then take place in the Munday High School Auditorium, where over 200 people are expected to attend. Officials, representatives and dignitaries from the engineering firm, from the Water Rights Commission, from HUD, from the Water Development Board, and many others, will be on hand to see the culmination of many, many years work on this lake project.

In speaking of the letting of bids during a recent meeting of the water authority board, Jim Nichols of the engineering firm of Freese, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth, said, "This will be the biggest thing that's happened in Munday in a long time. We are expecting 300 people or more to be involved in the bid opening on June 15, plus a number of dignitaries."

Also special guests for the bid

opening will be the Mayors of the cooperating towns of Haskell, Munday, Knox City and Goree.

The project is being funded by a \$1.5 million grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development; 1.5 million in state funds; and \$3.4 million in tax and revenue bonds.

Pete Beecher, in a telephone conversation Monday, said all the plans for the opening were

finalized and they were looking forward to 2 p.m. today.

The \$6 million project is designed to provide the four member cities with enough water to "put them through a seven-year drought." The water authority has a permit to impound

25,520 acre feet of water in Miller Creek Reservoir, located in Throckmorton and Baylor counties, and none of the water is to be used for irrigation. Purpose of the project is to obtain an adequate, state-approved water supply for the four towns

which currently have underground water supplies.

After the bid opening, the engineers and bond attorney will host a dinner for the state and federal agency representatives, the water authority board and the member city Mayors.

Attorney Royce Adkins, Chairman of the College Committee for Haskell, said, "The Haskell delegation was very well satisfied with the reception they had from the Coordinating Board of Texas College University Systems. the normal procedure for all requests presented to the board. And, this action would have been taken, whether or not there had been any protest. The coordinating board is made up of outstanding individuals from all over the state of Texas who are not subject to political pressures, but will base their decision objectively upon the needs and the best methods of fulfilling the needs."

The Vernon Junior College, not yet in operation 100 miles from Haskell, impressed those attending that they did not want an extension campus of their college in Haskell, and did not want any other college to have one here.

The Austin meeting, before the Coordinating Board of Texas College and University Sys-

tem, also heard a protest by letter from Cisco Junior College, against the Haskell extension.

The Haskell delegation, led by Adkins, included 3 other advisory board members—R. C. Couch Jr., member of the board of Haskell National Bank, and Bill Comedy, publisher of the Haskell Free Press, Royce Williams, vice president of the bank—along with Jack McAdoo, president of Haskell School Board of Trustees; H. T. Wilkinson, Superintendent of Schools, Abe Turner, president of Haskell National Bank and vice president of the school board; Dr. Robert Clinton, president of Western Texas College at Snyder; Dr. Ben Brock, it's Dean; and Rev. H. O. Abbott, who flew part of the men to Austin.

Adkins, as spokesman, stressed the need for an extension

here, with special emphasis on vocational-technical training; and told of the past ten year's hard work by Haskell to gain such an extension. He cited the feasibility of operating it through present high school facilities. The fact that the Snyder college is already in operation, and the ease with which its' extension can be made to Haskell were brought out by Adkins, along with the similarities in the economy of the two areas. Throckmorton, Haskell, Stonewall and Kent County's interest in the extension were also told.

To begin the extension, \$200,000.00 in startup funds would be required from the Legislature, but the school would then operate through community support, he told the board.

If accepted, the Haskell proposal would create an extension of the Western Texas College of Snyder and would hold evening classes at Haskell High School, teaching basic transfer courses, including English, mathematics, and history courses, some music and art, and a sorely-needed vocational-technical program with nursing, auto mechanics and related courses offered.

Dr. Clinton, in reporting to the board, told of Haskell's efforts along these lines, and of the college's making of a study on the proposed campus. He said Western Texas College at Snyder is willing to have the extension in Haskell, if the Coordinating Board approves.

The Coordinating Board, after hearing Haskell's request, and the protests of Vernon Regional Junior College and Cisco Junior College, referred the matter to the junior college sub-committee of its program committee for review and evaluation.

Bevington Reed, Commissioner of Higher Education, said that the junior college sub-committee is to evaluate all junior college operations, including items such as extension campuses, between now and July,

The 500 selected high school science students and teachers who attended the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy. Currently, the Foundation and General Dynamics Corporation are jointly sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power. Fusion is the energy process of the sun and the stars.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of nuclear science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of nuclear energy presents.

WTU paid all expenses for the 22 students and teachers attending from schools in the area served by the company. Lecturers at the Symposium were chosen from top men in their field. They are from various colleges and universities throughout the country, as well as Office of Science and Technology, Washington, D. C., Palo Alto Medical Clinic, Palo Alto, California, McDonald Observatory, and Texas Electric Service Company, Fort Worth.

The Nuclear Science Symposium and field trips through the various laboratories of the University of Texas was designed to broaden the mind, encourage the study of nuclear science for peaceful purpose, and to give qualified students their first taste of university life. There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas. Rule can be justly proud of its high school for having been chosen by the University of Texas as one of the 150 high schools in the state invited to send a student and teacher to the Symposium.

**Watermelons in good supply and good quality. To shrink or not to shrink. Pecan Hearing set. Egg Production shows increase . . .**

Harvesting of watermelons is moving to the Cotulla, Pearsall and Pleasanton areas. Watermelons now are in ample supply and the quality is good, also. Market prices reported relatively firm.

Which of these is the best deal? An offer of \$24.50 for your 400-pound steer calves without shrinkage allowance, or \$25 with a 4% shrink?

You can get the answer to this plus a lot of other valuable information on livestock marketing in a handy, compact booklet available from the Texas Department of Agriculture, Box 12847, Austin Texas 78711. Ask for Livestock Marketing Handbook.

In the question above, the

first offer will net you \$98; the second offer nets \$96.

Information in the handbook consists of three basic types: 1. conversion of live animals into dressed costs; 2. break-even cost charts for cattle feeding; 3. shrinkage section.

Also included are pointers to look for in selling your cattle as well as U. S. federal meat grades, average and range in dressing percentages of various kinds of livestock by grades, and motor freight rates for livestock in Texas.

Average yield of carcasses into retail cuts is also included. The booklet contains tables showing the dressed costs at varying yields, shrinkage tables, and break even cost charts.

A hearing involving the Texas Pecan Growers Association seeking certification to hold a referendum under the Texas commodity referendum law will be held June 15 at 10 a. m. in room 503-G in the Sam Houston office building in Austin.

The Texas Pecan Growers Association proposed to hold this election in all 254 counties in Texas. Main purpose of the hearing is to ascertain if the Texas Pecan Growers Association is representative of Texas pecan growers and if the referendum proposed is in conformity with the law.

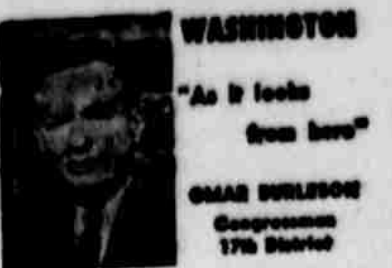
Texas pecan production in 1971 was estimated at 23,000,000 pounds. Leading counties in production of pecans in Texas during 1971 included Gonzales, first, with 1,596,000 lbs.; Guadalupe, 2nd, 1,445,000 lbs.; Hood, 3rd, 1,189,000 lbs.; Maverick, 4th, 959,000 lbs.; Colorado, 5th, 880,000 lbs.; Bowie, 6th, 876,000 lbs.; El Paso, 7th, 784,000 lbs.; Mills, 8th, 730,000 lbs.; Comanche, 9th, 708,000 lbs.; San Saba, 10th, 700,000 lbs.

More than half the counties in Texas have pecan production. Improved varieties normally account for about one-fifth

of the state's production with four-fifths of the production coming from seedling varieties.

Egg production in Texas continued to increase during April. Texas egg production totaled 238,000,000 during the month; this is up 9% from a year ago. Texas layers totaled 12.6 million during April, 3% above a year earlier.

Nationwide, total eggs produced numbered slightly more than six billion, up slightly from last year. The number of layers in the nation was down 2% below a year ago at 314,000,000.

Washington, D. C.—At the end of last week's release, reference was made to "affirmative orders" issued by a court. Essentially this is an injunction against an individual who is found to be pursuing a course of conduct which is legally wrong and is harmful to another.

Courts possess the power in appropriate cases to grant relief by issuing an order prohibiting such actions in the future. "Affirmative orders," however, may go one step further. Not only is future conduct proscribed, but the court requires affirmative action designed to undo the wrong previously committed.

This is well and good. But, when the wrongdoer is a government agency, the requirement that it take a specific course of action, transfers decision-making from the legislative to the judicial branch.

As an example, this technique has been employed extensively in school desegregation cases. Schools are not only being ordered to stop acts and policies which tend to discriminate against racial minorities but also are being affirmatively directed with regard to a wide range of future school policies such as the location of district boundaries, the sites of specific schools, the racial composition of teachers and students within each school, the busing of students by racial quotas to a particular school, the propriety of text books and materials, testing methods, etc.

The Congress has enacted numerous laws against discrimination by reason of race, creed, sex and previous origin. It has also declared that public funds shall not be used to bus students simply to achieve balance in schools. The Supreme Court has either ignored the acts of Congress or held them unconstitutional, presumably because the majority of the Justices thought the law should be otherwise.

Regardless of whether it should or should not, it is not the prerogative of the courts to decide how tax money should be channeled.

Space does not permit a full discussion of the separation of powers of all three branches — the Executive, Legislative and Judicial. Since almost the beginning there has been controversy and argument on what the separation should be and the extent of over-lapping authority. For instance there is now the issue of the President withholding certain funds appropriated by the Congress for specific purposes. The Congress provides the funds—the Executive spends. No more money can be spent than is appropriated but the President and Presidents in the past contend that all funds provided need not be spent.

As mentioned in the first of these three articles, the U. S. Senate wants a bigger voice in foreign policy and the final approval of important Executive Agreements not considered by the Executive Department to be treaties.

In recent days, amendments to bills in the House of Representatives proposed that funds be withheld from Executive Agencies whose representative refuses to testify before Congressional Committees under executive immunity.

After all, every part of government certainly should be dedicated to work for the good of the Nation, and they do, but our system is based on the "checks and balances" previously mentioned. Each branch must be tempered by restraint and discretion, the foundation upon which national respect for Governmental authority largely depends.

## Acteen Camp Set At Lueders

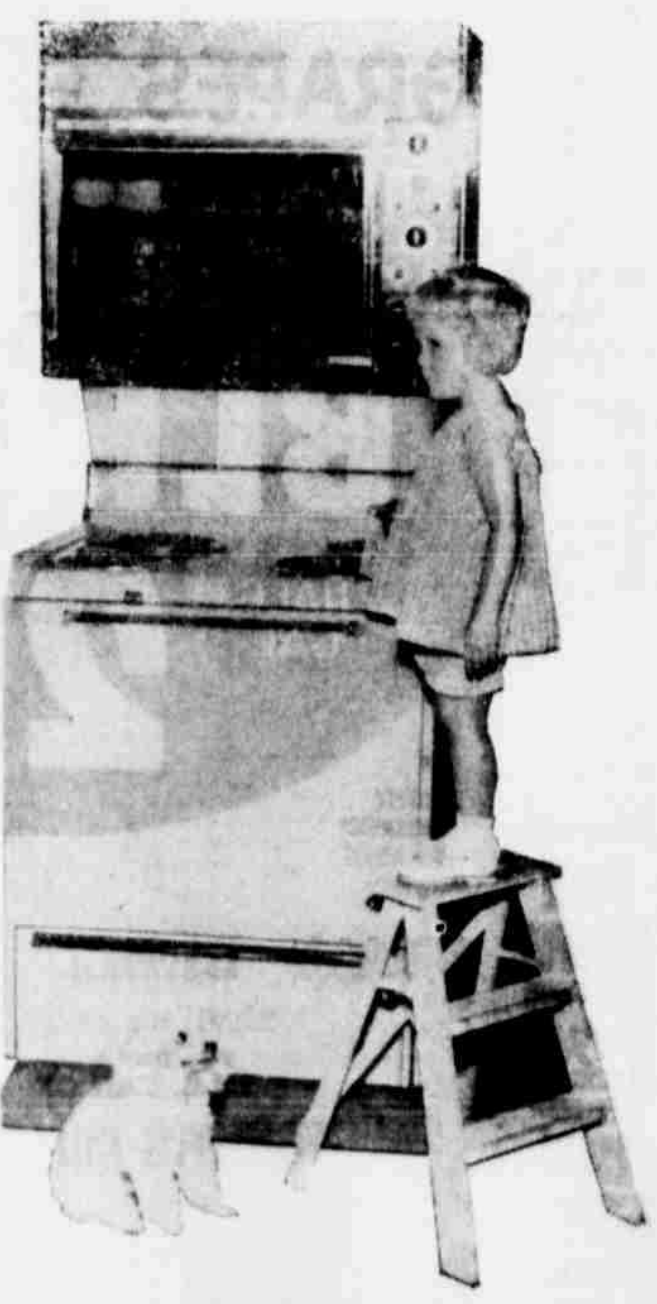
