


Harp Attends Ag Conference At Washington, D.C.

Elbert Harp, Grain Sorghum Producers Association executive director, attended three ag conferences in Washington, D.C., July 11 through 14.

Monday, July 11, Harp met with agricultural economists and other farm organization representatives to testify before the Subcommittee on Government Information, Justice, and Agriculture.

The Subcommittee, chaired by Congressman Glenn English (D-Ok.),



reviewed the efficiency and economy of commodity program decisions made by the Department of Agriculture during the period from 1980-83. After testimony was given by the agricultural economists and farm organization representatives, such as Harp, it was concluded that mismanagement by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in early 1982 is responsible for much of) the eonomic difficulty being faced by farmers and taxpavers today.

The testimony Harp gave, as the National Farm Coalition Vice Chairman, pointed to the lack of action by USDA as being the cause of present problems. "I hate to say I told you (USDA) so, but we did. We believe that a major part of these costs could have been avoided through more prudent utilization of acreage controls and other authorities available to the Secretary of Agriculture," Harp said. "We stress the importance of acreage cutbacks when inventory buildup occurs. Such programs were not applied. It was this neglect in administering an effective supply management program which necessitated the PIK program."

Agricultural Summit

Harp attended the Agricultural Summit next, which was held July 12 and 13 at the Shoreham Hotel in Washington, D. C. Harp was one of

the Texas delegates to this summit. Leaders from farm organizations, commodity groups, agribusiness and consumer groups met at this summit. Harp had the opportunity to hear Secretary Block, Economist Herb Stein, Secretary of State George Shultz and Vice President Bush. He also participated in three workshops that focused on domestic issues, international issues and the private sector role.

The summit provided an opportunity to begin dialogue on long-term issues facing the agricultural industry. While the summit was not designed to reach conclusions, everyone agreed the country needs a long-range farm policy.

About this summit meeting, Harp said, "Any time you get such diverse groups together, you will certainly have just as much diversity of opinions. That was true of this conference. I believe it is always good for people of differing opinions to sit down together and discuss their mutual problems. Nothing was resolved by this meeting, but that wasn't the purpose of the conference. I will work with anyone who is making a sincere effort to help farmers."

Third Conference

Harp attended a third conference July 14, which was with the overseas staff of U.S. Feed Grains Council to

The U.S. Feed Grains Council is the body through which GSPA grain sorghum is marketed and exported throughout the world.

On the trip Harp also visited sorghum belt congressmen seeking their support against target and loan price freezes. He talked to Congressmen English, Stenholm, and Hance, and Senators Tower and Bentsen. Harp returned to Abernathy Friday, July 15.

A garage sale had been going on at the building. The occupants locked the building and left for a short period of time. When they returned, they discovered the fire. The cause of this fire is still under investigation.



Pest Management Report

Southwestern corn borer (SWCB) development has progressed rapidly with the hot temperatures of the past several weeks. SWCB larvae and pupae were collected from several fields on 7/14/83. This information was used in a computer model developed by Kansas State University to predict the emergence of SWCB moths. The following table is a composite of the distribution of the larval instars (growth stages) and pupae.

To check the model, we will be making periodic collections of larvae and pupae to determine the emergence pattern. We believe that the above predictions could vary as much as a week for individual fields.

At this time we feel that one should not use this information for making pesticide applications, but should be used to know when to intensify scouting of fields. The prediction is useful because it gives dates for various percents of emergence and it estimates how long emergence will last.

Remember that egg laying will not start until 24 to 48 hours after the female moths emerge and will continue to lav eggs for 3 to 4 days.

A field may become economically infested early in the emergence period, late in the emergence period or not at all. Decisions to treat a field should be based on the percent of plants infested with eggs or small larvae. This would be when 20 to 25 percent of the plants are infested. Insecticide applications should be timed for egg hatch or soon after, for most effective control.

Fall armyworms have been found in several fields feeding behind leaf collars and on secondary ears.

Corn earnworm egg lays have increased greatly in corn. with more eggs being found on leaves than silks. Moth Z-V predictions indicate a peak in egg lays between 7/20 and 7/23 for the Edmonson area and 7/23 to 7/25 for the Hale



Center area.

Spider mites continue to be found on lower leaves in several fields. Colonies remain small and very little leaf damage has been noted.

Cottor

A few fields are blooming and many should be by the end of this week. Cotton fleahopper numbers are about the same as last week and square sets are good. Remember, if square sets drop below 75 percent and fleahopper numbers are approximately 25 per 100 terminals, then control may be needed.

Cotton should be scouted for cotton bollworm larvae during the next week, since all of the egg laying may not occur in corn.

Beet armyworms have been reported in isolated incidences. Larvae have mostly confined themselves to leaf feeding, with little or no damage to the fruit.

Sorghum

Greenbug numbers are on the increase and some leaf reddening is occurring. The parasitic wasp mummies have been found in several sorghum fields this past week, but their numbers are low (less than 1 percent).

Fall armyworms feeding in whorl were seen in a field south of Petersburg. Often damage from the fall armyworm can appear to be dramatic, but control is seldom justified.
