4th Annual Abernathy Arts And Crafts Festival Saturday

The 4th annual Abernathy Arts and Crafts Festival will be held this Saturday, November 19 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Community Center Complex in Abernathy.

The Abernathy Arts Festival has been extremely successful in previous years, as it has attracted and continued to attract some of the best artists and craftsmen in the area.

The festival is as popular as ever

with 35 booths, which will spread from the Community Center to the Fire Hall. Artists and craftsmen from Plainview, Idalou, Canyon, New Deal, Lubbock, Hale Center, Lockney, Broadview, New Mexico, and Abernathy will be participating in the festival this year. Abernathians will occupy approximately 20 of the 35 booths at the festival.

Everyone is urged to make plans to

go to the festival and shop early for Christmas. Everything imaginable, from paintings to ceramics, will be offered at the many booths. Even food will be sold at some of the booths, such as fruit, turkeys and baked goods.

Entertainment will be provided from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. starting with the Abernathy Music Club at 11 a.m., followed by Ruth Fulton's 5th grade

music students. Dovie Barron's music group at 1 p.m., the Methodist Choir at 2 p.m. and the Baptist Choir at 3 p.m. Then, at 4 p.m., Santa Claus will stop by to see all the kids and get their Christmas orders early.

Another special event of the festival will be the drawing of the winning ticket for the beautiful handmade quilt at 5 p.m.

School Board Approves Financial Audit

The Abernathy School Board met Monday, November 7 at 7:30 p.m. for the November meeting and to go over the school financial statement for the 1982-83 school year.

Abernathy I.S.D. auditors, Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss of Lubbock, were present to discuss the school's financial status for the school year ending August 31, 1983.

Going through the report, it was mentioned that the Abernathy I.S.D.

has available assets of \$5,485,071. Of this amount, \$4,154,646 is invested in fixed assets. The other assets are in various funds, such as the general fund - \$878,065, invested reserves, such as retirement for funded indebtedness - \$101,403, and authorized construction - \$119,030. The authorized construction is for capital improvements only. These are improvements, such as renovation of existing buildings, additions to existing buildings, or new buildings.

Total liabilities amounted to \$231,927, total fund equity \$5,253,144, and total liabilities and fund equity \$5,485,071.

An interesting point was brought out about the fund equity amount. The fund equity increased \$89,000 this past year due to the school not expending all that was budgeted for the 1982-83 school year. This equity increase puts the school in good shape financially going into the new school year.

Another interesting point, which was mentioned during the audit, was that the Abernathy I.S.D. will be complete-

ly debt free after the 1983-84 school year. The last bond issue was passed in 1975 for an amount of \$750,000 to build the Junior High School and academic center. The principal on this bond presently amounts to \$115,000. This should be paid off this year, leaving the school virtually debt free.

Other Business

The school board appointed the following school staff members to the textbook committee: Gid Adkisson, Frank Bartlett, Emily Ratcliff, Rita Kelley, Alma Ruth Patterson, Lezie Thompson, Jan Hill, Ann Harrison, Marilyn Ater, Bettie Hardin, Larry Aldridge, and Scotty Windham and all the principals were appointed ex-officio members.

Bids on the school boiler and floater policies were opened. The only bid submitted was by Hubbard Insurance of Abernathy. Hubbard submitted a bid of \$544 for the boiler policy and a bid of \$477 for the floater policy. The board accepted these two bids.

The board gave Charles Bowen permission to serve on the Employee Relations Committee of T.A.S.A. and the TEA Taskforce on Compensatory Education. Bowen had been asked to serve on these two committees.

The board then discussed where they would apply the 870 votes they are allowed in the election of five board members to the Hale County Appraisal District. The board elected to put all 870 votes on Billie Harrison of Abernathy, who is presently on the Appraisal Board. It takes 835 votes to elect a person to the Appraisal Board and the Abernathy School Board gave Harrison all of their votes to insure his position on the board.

The school enrollment report revealed that enrollment is down 15 students from last year at this time. 1,012 students were enrolled at Abernathy school last year at this time, compared to only 997 this year.

Earl Carter reported that tax collections are coming along well, as \$1,791,580 of the \$2,110,752 assessed taxes had been collected as of the last

Allen Honored On 80th Birthday

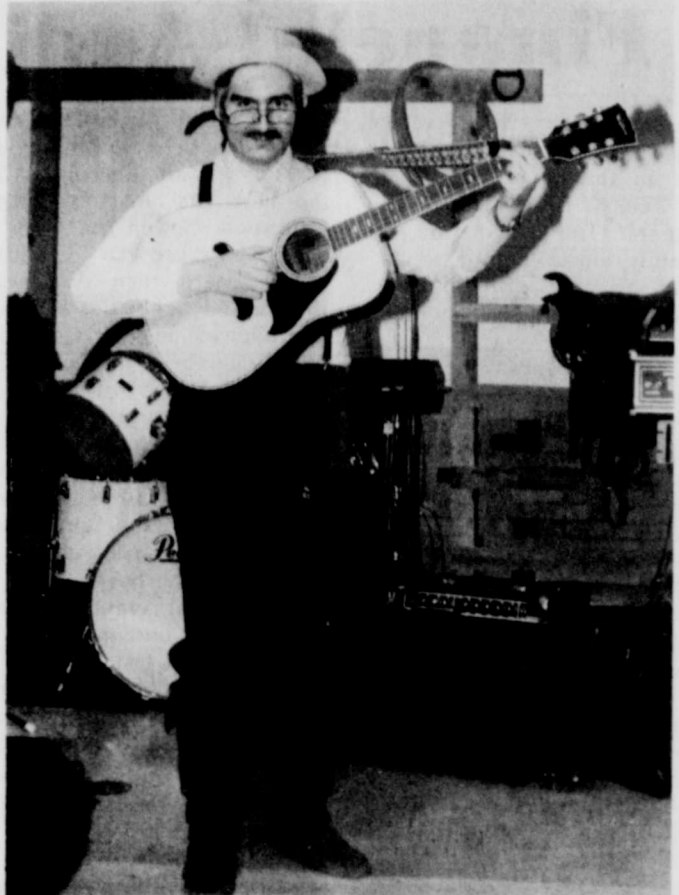
Howard Allen was honored with a surprise birthday party on his 80th birthday, November 12 by his children and grandchildren.

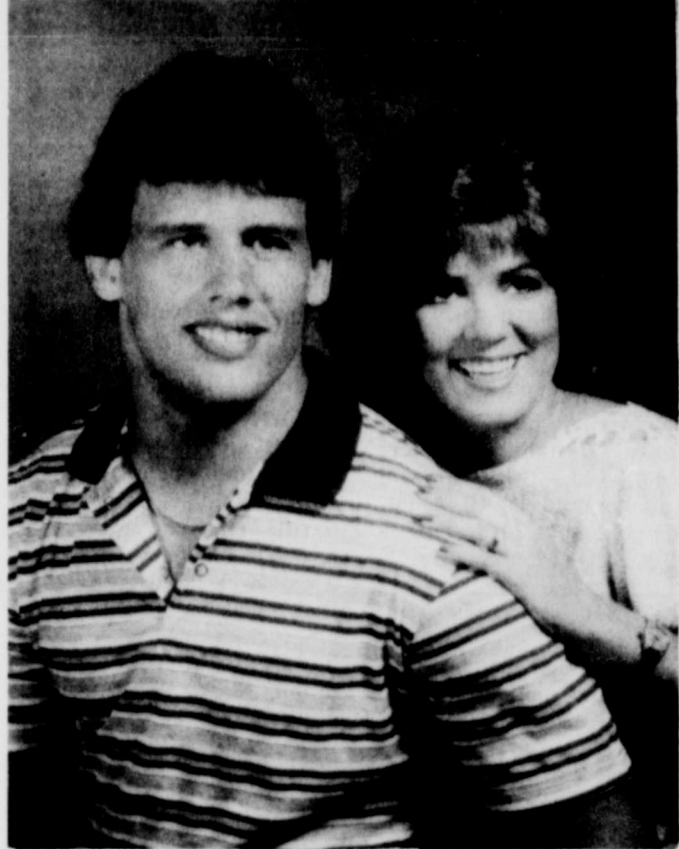

PESTICIDE BILL TABLED: House Subcommittee on Department Operations, Research, and Foreign Operations has agreed to take no further action this year on bill that would drastically change Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act. Environmental Protection Agency will continue to evaluate regulatory authority under present FIFRA legislation. National Cotton Council earlier had expressed strong opposition to HR-3818 and asked simple extension of current law.

This week's action came after EPA Administrator William Ruckelshaus told subcommittee members he personally did not want them to mark up and proceed with the bill. Acknowledging problems and controversies in pesticide regulation, he expressed the view that many of them can be solved administratively. Ruckelshaus said the present law is basically sound and gives him authority to act on several fronts without waiting for changes in legislation. He added, "I cannot express strongly enough my belief that risks must be balanced against benefits, and that statutes such as FIFRA--whose heart is risk/benefits balancing--fundamentally the most sound practice."

USDA Assistant Secretary Bill McMillan testified that agricultural community's major concern is that FIFRA reform bill's restricted and far-reaching nature could seriously harm agricultural productivity without measurable improving environmental protection.

EXPORT SALES INCREASE: Cotton export sales increased by a net of 100,300 running bales during the week ended Oct. 27. Canada led buyers with purchases of 36,500 bales. Other major buyers were Japan, South Korea, and Brazil. The week's sales brought total commitments to 3,940,400, about 900,000 more than at this time last year.


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From The Postmaster's Desk

USPS BOARD ANNOUNCES RATE INCREASE FILING

At its meeting November 1 in Washington, D.C. the USPS Board of Governors announced that it has authorized the Postal Service to file a request for a general rate increase with the Postal Rate Commission. While the filing requests an increase in the cost of a First-Class stamp from 20 to 23 cents, Board Chairman Robert L. Hardesty emphasized the fact that the request for a rate increase will not mean that Americans immediately have to pay 23 cents to mail a First-Class letter.

Hardesty repeated a statement he made this past summer that no rate increase will take effect until October 1, 1984, at the earliest. The Board's action merely authorizes postal management to submit a rate proposal to the Postal Rate Commission, which has 10 months to make a recommended decision. Mailers and other interested parties will participate in the Commission's proceeding and make their views known. The Governors will then carefully review the Commission's recommended decision based on the entire record of its proceeding.

Hardesty also noted that the requested increase is well below increases in the cost of living since the last rate filing, which was three and a half years ago. A summary of the proposed rate changes appears below.

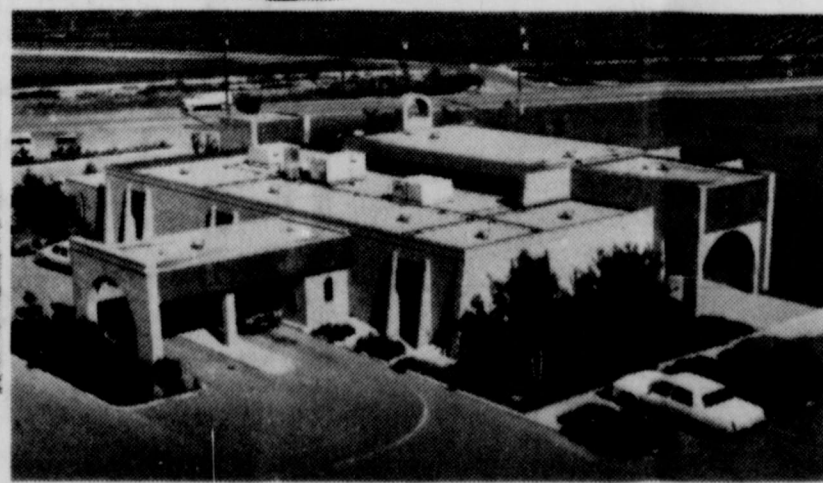

Lubbock Area Site Confirmed As Location Of New SPS Plant

Southwestern Public Service Company announced last week that its board of directors has approved future construction of a new coal-fired electrical generating plant northeast of Lubbock, near Idalou.

Berl M. Springer, SPS board chairman and chief executive officer, said the

board action authorizes preliminary engineering design and planning, along with other preparations necessary in advance of establishing a construction schedule. Springer estimated it will be at least two years before the start of construction.

The plant will be needed to serve SPS customers

throughout the South Plains during the decade of the 1990s. Details on the size and cost of the facility have not been finalized.

In 1982, SPS obtained an option to purchase 2,880 acres at the site near Idalou, in anticipation of future power plant construction. The Company purchased the land in September 1983.

The new facility will be SPS' sixth coal-fired generating unit. The Company made a decision in the early 1970s to begin decreasing the utility's dependence on natural gas—and increasing its use of coal-as boiler fuel.

Although more than 50 percent of the electricity generated by SPS for its customers is now produced

at coal-fired plants, the Company still must rely substantially on natural gas to fuel the older plants.

Springer noted that "while there may be short-term fluctuations in natural gas prices, the long-run price trend is upward. For this reason, coal is a cheaper alternative to gas, and coal supplies are available for the expected 40-year life of the generating unit."

"Also," Springer pointed out, "coal can be burned—and is being burned—with little or no environmental damage. We are confident that we are not harming the environment, especially because we use low-sulfur Western coal."

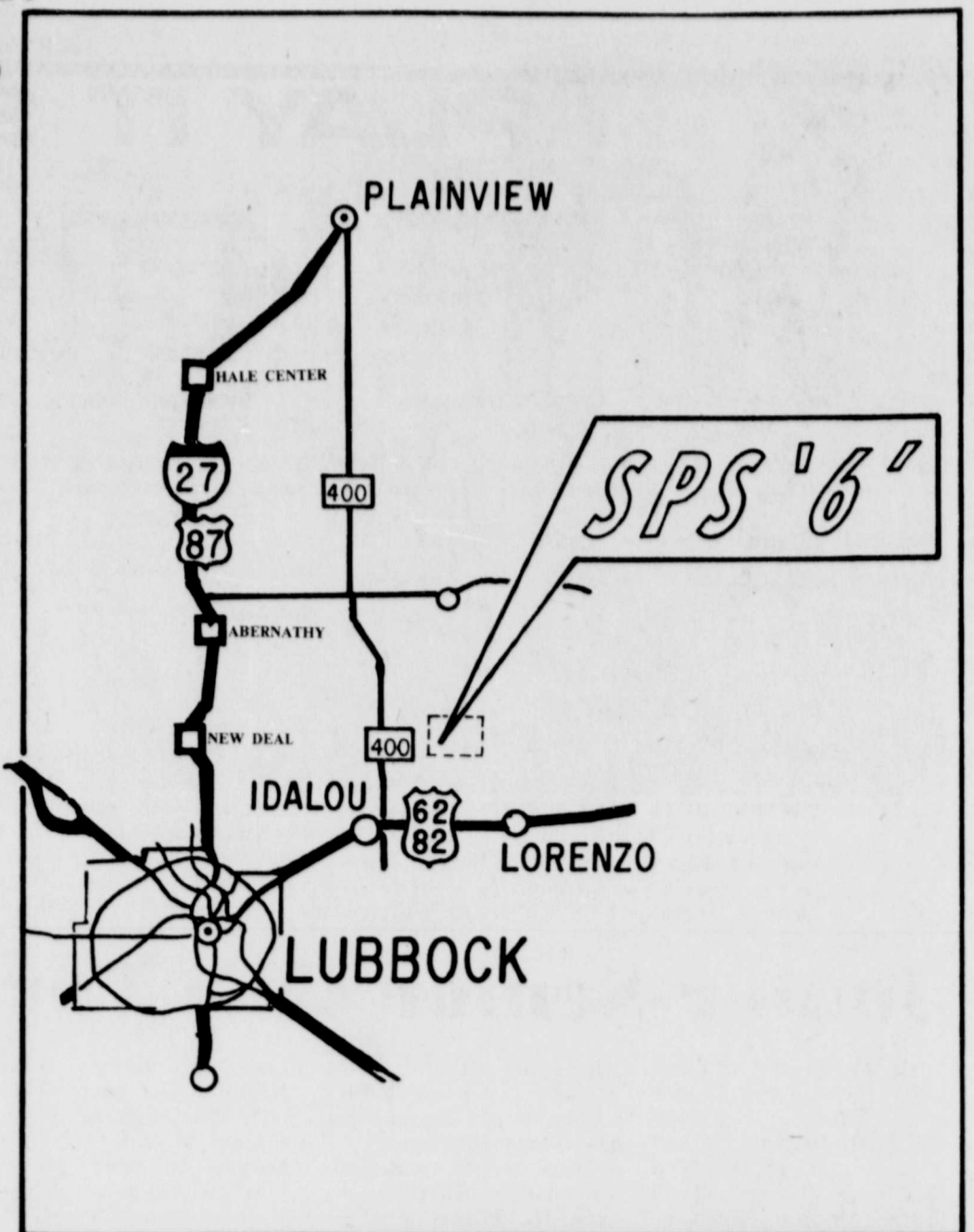
Harrington Station, near Amarillo, was SPS' initial coal-fired generating plant. It has three units, with a total capability of producing 1,114,000 kilowatts. Tolk Station, near Muleshoe, has

one unit completed with a second unit scheduled to go into service in mid-1985. Tolk's two units will have the capability to produce 1,111,000 kilowatts.

Springer said the Lubbock area plant eventually will have approximately the same generating capability as the Company's other coal-fired stations.

"The SPS board decision," Springer said, "represents another step forward in ensuring an economical and adequate supply of electricity for Lubbock and the South Plains as well as the other areas we serve."

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of more than one million in a 70,000-square-mile area of the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

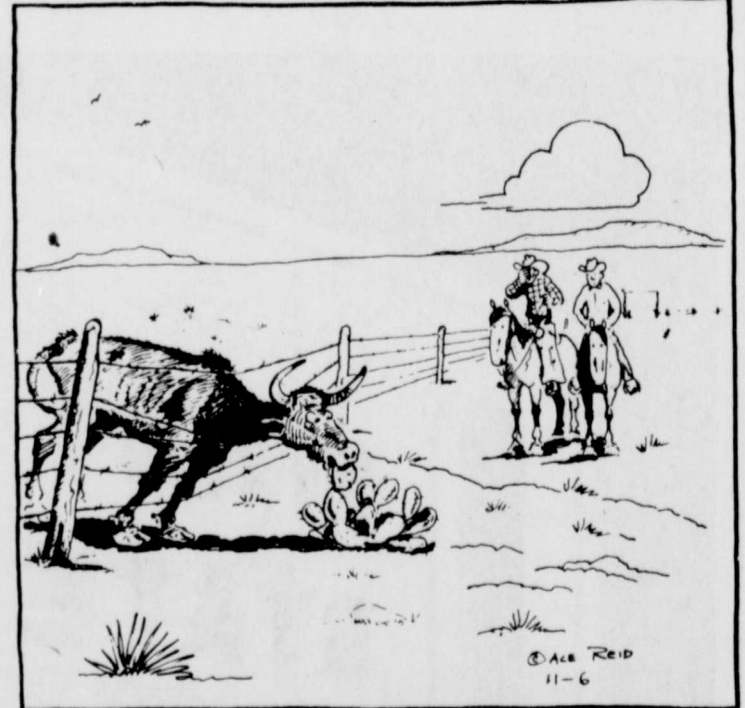

BBB Says Watch Out For Trade-Tech Magazine Sales

Lubbock, November 4, 1983 - The Better Business Bureau of the South Plains has received calls from all over the South Plains area regarding a company called TRADE-TECH out of San Diego, CA going door to door selling magazine subscriptions. As far as this office knows, none of the representatives of this company have permits to peddle in Lubbock.

According to the BBB/San Diego, this company is too new in their area to issue a report, however; they also have them listed as Star Gazers out of Las Vegas, Nevada. A check with the BBB/Las Vegas reveals that Star Gazers is owned by Lonnie Devine and the company has the same address and principals as a company called Magnet

and a company called Star Press International a/k/a National Press & Associates. Bureau files on National Press & Associates shows that the company is out of Florida and that the Orange County Circuit Court issued a default final judgment against Lonnie Devine and David L. Combs, owners, charging them with non-delivery of books and magazines, failure to give refunds, and misrepresentation. They have also been ordered to relieve themselves of any interest in Star Press International and National Press & Associates must reimburse injured consumers, and forfeit all property. The final hearing was April 15, 1983 and any consumers who had complaints after that date should forward

them to the Federal Trade Commission's Atlanta regional office.

Representatives of TRADE-TECH are presently in the Lubbock area selling their magazine subscriptions and based on Bureau files, BBB/South Plains advises caution in dealing with this company. Company representatives are requesting checks to be made out to "CASH" so if you were to have a complaint, you would not have proof that you gave the check to the company. The representatives do not have a license to peddle in Lubbock and from the calls this office has received, they have not obtained licenses anywhere else on the South Plains either.

State Treasurer Wants To Return Money To Abernathy Owners Of Abandoned Accounts

Texas State Treasurer Ann Richards is looking for 180 Texas Panhandle residents who have a total of more than \$35,000 coming to them from abandoned accounts held in the State Treasury's Unclaimed Money Fund.

The names are among 20,000 on this year's list which were reported to her by banks, insurance companies and other businesses as the owners of at least \$50 each in accounts which have been unclaimed for the past seven years, Ms. Richards said.

In 35 Texas newspapers, she said, and it is also being sent to more than 600 public libraries and all of the county tax assessor-collector offices.

Under Texas law, the State Treasurer is responsible for holding accounts and other types of property which have been unclaimed or abandoned for seven years. Richards said she is putting a high priority on returning these funds to the rightful owner.

"There is no time limit on filing a claim," the Treasurer stressed. "If we have the money, we'll give it back once we verify ownership, as the law requires."

Reports are submitted to the Treasurer each year by banks, savings and loan associations, credit unions, corporations, utility companies, department stores and other businesses. Types of property included on the report include checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, money orders and cashiers checks, corporate dividends, mineral royalties,

credit balances on charge accounts, proceeds from insurance policies and gift certificates -- all of which have been unclaimed or abandoned for seven years.

"The purpose of the Unclaimed Money Program," Richards said, "is to reunite people with their lost or forgotten money. In the past 12 months, ending in August, we were successful in returning more than a million dollars, double the rate of last year and an all-time record for one year."

Richards said about \$9.4 million in abandoned accounts was collected this year. She pointed out that money collected that is never claimed by the owner goes to benefit all Texans by helping to pay for education, law enforcement and other state programs.

"The most important aspect," she said, "is that the more we collect, the more we'll be able to return."

FREE G.E.D. CLASSES AVAILABLE AT WAYLAND BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

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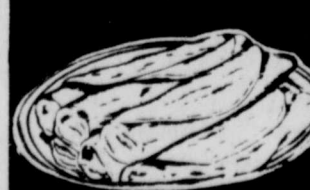
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
