# Brown resigns from North Runnels Hospital Board

Charlie Brown's resignation from the North Runnels Hospital board of directors was expected but no one wanted to accept it.

Brown, a nine-year veteran hospital trustee, tendered his resignation at Monday night's hospital board meeting. Brown is moving out of the North Runnels Hospital taxing district and is no longer eli-

gible to serve on the hospital board.

'This has been an interesting way to serve this community and it has had its ups and downs," said Brown. "I will continue to work in the area and still associate with a lot of my friends, but this is a move my wife and I have been planning for some time."

Brown is a native of Winters and has built a house near Abilene.

"We were told we had to take her to Abilene," said Davis. "They took


Davis said he knows the nurse who turned his relative away and is not looking to cause trouble, just see that it doesn't happen again.

## Early voting underway for **March Primary**

The democratic process of making big decisions for Runnels County has begun.

The County Clerk's Office is now accepting applications for early voting by mail for the March 2 Democratic and Republican Primary Election.

A voter has the option of voting in either the Democratic Primary or the Republican Primary. Voters are reminded to please bring their voter registration cards with them to the polls.

A qualified voter is eligible to vote by mail if the voter:

· Expects to be absent from the county of residency on election day and during the regular hours for early voting by personal appear-

Is disabled;

• Will be 65 years of age or older on election day

• is confined in jail under the following reasons: serving a misdemeanor sentence for a term that ends on or after election day; pending trial after being denied bail; without bail pending an appeal of a felony conviction; or pending trial or appeal on a bailable offense for which release on bail before election day is unlike-

The last day to receive an application to vote by mail is Feb. 23.

Any qualified voter will be eligible for early voting by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office beginning Feb. 16 and ending Feb. 26, Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m.

For further information or to request an application to vote early by mail, please contact the County Clerk's Office at 365-2720.

Sixteen people have filed have filed the paperwork seeking election to eight county offices up for grabs this spring in Runnels County.

Candidates were required to formally file Jan. 4 with their respective party chairs for a spot on primary election ballots in March.

Seven of those people filed for the post of Runnels County Judge. Three have filed for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2.

Offices of Commissioner Precinct 2. Commissioner Precinct 4, District Clerk, County Clerk, County Treasurer and Justice of the Peace Precinct 1 are uncontested with only one person formally filing at this time.

her essay has been selected for district competition. Melissa K. Calcote took third place and a \$25 U.S.


Savings Bond. The theme of this year's essay was "When is the right time to honor our military heroes?'

Due to an increased level of funding as a result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, USDA Rural Development in Texas has more than \$130 million in direct funding available to help families achieve the dream of home ownership.

"USDA Development is proud to assist rural Texans in meeting their housing needs, which is critical to the long term sustainability of our communities," said Paco Valentin, USDA Rural Development State Director.

Development's direct program provides low-interest,

no-down-payment loans to help eligible families living in rural communities and rural areas to purchase their own homes.

The Direct Rural Housing Program is geared toward low to very low-income fam-

No down payment is required for the program and closing costs may be included in the loan

Under this program an applicant may be eligible for payment assistance, which would subsidize the interest portion of the house payment down to as low as 1 percent, lowering the overall monthly payment amount.

In many cases, the total monthly house payment, including taxes and insurance, may actually be less than a family is paying for

"Reporting requirements and auditing practices do not allow us to include those taxes as revenue," said Anderson. "Your overall change in assets was a positive, but tax revenue is not part of operating rev-

Anderson told trustees 20 percent of the hospital's revenue was generated by the lab, 18 percent by home health, 12 percent by the clinic and 13 percent by the emergency room.

The audit also indicated 49 percent of the operating expense was for hospital salaries and 6.5 percent was for employee benefits.

Anderson said NRH had a cash reserve of 90 days, which was down from 110 days from the previous

The audit also revealed North Runnels Hospital averaged 1.1 patients per day during the reporting period

Military veterans who are totally disabled or cannot work because of service-related injuries will pay no property taxes on their homes under a new tax exemption approved by the Legislature in 2009.

"Texas has done the right thing by providing property tax relief for our military men and women who have

served their country and paid a heavy price," Texas Comptroller Susan Combs

House Bill 3613 provides an exemption of the total appraised value of the homesteads of Texas veterans who have received a 100 percent disability rating or are considered unemployable by the U.S. Department of Veterans

Disabled vets get property tax relief

The new law is effective for the 2009 tax year and swift action is necessary to update local property tax rolls and ensure eligible veterans receive the new tax break.

Eligible disabled veterans must apply for the tax exemption through their county appraisal district.


