WINTERS, Texas.- Turning the soil, planting the seeds, and harvesting their crops since 1995, the Bredemeyers harvested a different kind of crop last week, when they were awarded the Agri Life Family of The Year.

The Ag Day celebration held last week in Ballinger also featured honors for the Miles Coop Gin and two students who will benefit from scholarships

This year's Farm Family began with the marriage of Bill and Sharla on June 4, 1995 and the addition of a new partner, Ethan, on November 27, 1996. The Bredemeyer family has grown deep roots in Winters.

Bill started farming in the 4th grade when he put his first plow in the ground. About the same time, he started showing steers and lambs in the 4-H and FFA programs. When Bill was a freshman in high school, he was selected as the Star Lone Star Farmer in Texas. He also went on to get his American Farmers Degree. He got both his Bachelors of Science and Master's Degree from Tarleton State University along with an Ag Science teaching certification.

He taught Ag Science for five years in Ballinger and four years in Throckmorton where he was named Outstanding Teacher of the Year in 1993. At the end of the school year, Bill came home to farm full time. His father tried to discourage him, but Bill replied "All I ever wanted to do was farm. I want to farm with you Dad, not after you are gone!'

Sharla Rollins came to Winters from Westbrook to begin teaching at Winters ISD. Sharla has a teaching degree and court reporter certification from Baylor University. Bill and Sharla met at an FFA banquet and were married in 1994. Sharla currently works as a court reporter for three judges in Tom Green County.

Ethan is following in his dad's footsteps by showing steers in the 4-H program. He is a busy 7th grader involved in football, basketball, track and shooting sports. His name is always on the "A Honor Roll"

The Bredemeyer family is a strong supporter of youth and education in Runnels County. Bill is currently serving as Chairman of the Runnels County Youth Advisory Board, is a club manager for the Winters 4-H Club, serves as a certified instructor for the newly formed 4-H Shooting Sports Club and is a project leader for the new Leaders for Life project.

The long race vs. cancer

The riders are coming! The riders are coming! A bicycle ride twice as long as the Tour de France called Texas 4000 for Cancer, will be riding through the area.

The three first stages, starting in Cedar Park and ending in Dallas before taking the route to Alaska, will be looking forward to getting all the surrounding communities involved in this noble cause.

On June 5 the riders will start their long journey. The first stage, of 73 miles, is set from Cedar Park to Lampasas. The following day the tour will be heading from Lampasas to Stephenville, for a 67 mile-ride, and on June 7 the bikers will be pedaling to Dallas.

Riders braving 70 days of rain, sleet, wind, snow, and heat in support of cancer research will journey through the city as they make their way to Anchorage, Alaska. The 4,687-mile bicycle journey to Alaska that began June 5 is designed to share Hope, Knowledge and Charity with those fighting cancer. While here, the riders will visit with cancer patients to learn their stories and spread awareness with the community about cancer prevention.

"This ride is a metaphor for the struggle cancer patients face each day," said Sense Corp Texas 4000 for Cancer Executive Director, Jamille Ruebsahm. "This summer

the riders will battle hail, rain, wind and snow, yet at the end of the day they will get off their bikes and rest. Cancer patients do not have that luxury.'

In its seventh year, more than 40 student riders began their journey in Austin with a 70 mile community bike ride called ATLAS. From there, the riders head north, separating into two routes: Rockies and Coastal and continue onward in what is now considered the longest charity bicycle ride in the world. Throughout their journey, riders stop along the route to educate people about cancer prevention and early detection, visit with cancer patients and raise funds for cancer research. They also use this time to offer hope, encouragement and hugs to cancer patients of all ages. Additionally, each team member dedicates their daily ride to someone fighting cancer.

"It is absolutely astounding to see these young riders put their bodies and minds to the test and travel more than 4,500 miles each year to draw awareness to cancer," said Keat Wilkins, CEO Sense Corp, presenting sponsor of Texas 4000. "These young people demonstrate strong character and they are truly excellent role models in their desire to do their part and make a difference.'

The Sense Corp Texas 4000 started seven years ago when one man, Chris Condit, sought a way to share a message of hope, knowledge and charity to those with cancer. A cancer survivor himself, Condit decided to take an epic 4,500-mile journey from Austin, Texas to Anchorage, Alaska-on his bicycle. In the past seven years, over 250 riders have biked more than 1.2 million miles, over 350 days, averaging 80-100 miles per day. These riders have raised more than \$1.5 million for the fight against cancer, with the proceeds going to The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center. Upon completion of the ride, the riders are honored at the organization's annual fundraiser, Tribute Gala, held August 28, 2010 at the Hyatt Hotel in Austin, TX.

She is survived by her parents; one brother: Ryder Antilley of Winters; grandparents: Jeanene Laird of



Rock Hotel hosts the spirit of Winters, Texas

WINTERS. Texas.-Originally built over a century ago, saved from an untimely demolition, the Rock Hotel defies time, and a strained economy, to rise as a Winters iconic symbol. Built in 1909 to accommodate tourists and visitors, the Rock Hotel now displays several exhibits. The two-story building is filled with history; memories, pictures, and belongings of legendary people. One room honors the memory of a major league baseball Hall of Famer, Rogers Hornsby, who was born and raised in Winters.

Hornsby's career with the Saint Louis Cardinals, New York Giants and Boston Braves is remembered in the 1920's newspapers and other well preserved memorabilia displayed in the room.

Rogers was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1942. He holds records for highest batting average in the 20th Century, with a .424 batting average in 1924. He is the all-time career batting average leader

among right-handed hitters, with an outstanding .358 average.

The Rock Hotel offers a home for writings from the late Charlsie Poe, author of "Runnels is my County" and 'Angel to Papagos"

The exhibition of this writer, editor and historian features her peculiar black wedding dress.

"Charlsie was a wonderful lady, she just passed away a few years ago," remembers Joayce Carberry, a member of the Z. I. Hale Museum Foundation.

The Rock Hotel is open on weekends or with a special appointment.

The place was remodeled with original style ceilings and rugs, and nowdays has a dining room used for banquets and meetings.

The museum has a music room on the second floor, with an old organ donated by the Lutheran Church and uniforms of the city band dating back to 1905.

"The uniforms were \$14 in those days, and that was a lot of money back then," says Carberry.

Feral hogs, the dawn of a plague

BALLINGER. Texas.-Breeding and survival capabilities could be a blessing for any species, but those abilities are of great concern when crop damage, destruction of property, and endangering the lives of people have become a nightmare for local farmers.

mating up to three times a year, with litters ranging from 6 to 12 piglets. The young ones are able to survive even when left alone at three weeks of age.

"The proliferation of feral hogs is becoming a serious menace for local farmers," said Wayne Johnson, the Wildlife Damage Management Technician working in Runnels County for the Texas Wildlife Services Program. "The animals can and will attack people," the trapper said.

Also known as wild boars or Russian wild boars, the Thompson, Economist of feral hogs are aggressive mammals posing serious ecological, economic, aesthetic, medical and agricultural threats.

These feral members of the pig family can weigh up to 400 pounds, reach three feet tall, and six feet long. Boars have four continually growing tusks that can be extremely sharp and are often 3 to 5 inches long, but have sometimes been recorded at 9 inches in length.

"They get very wild out

there, you don't want to get trapped in the middle of a herd," said Johnson.

The trapper started with the control program in November of 2008, and since then has killed more than 600 animals. Nonetheless, eradication is far from over, due to the high reproduction indexes that feral hogs have.

'You can release a couple The feral hog is prolific, of feral hogs and in no time you will have over 20, the best we can do is take the numbers down to a controlled population.'

> Johnson flies in a helicopter all over the county, shooting down the hogs in a combined effort with authorities and local farmers to minimize damages. Farmers and even ranchers are familiar with the damages caused by herds of hogs. The wild swine have killed every kind of livestock from goats to sheep and even some young deer.

According to Bill the Texas Agri Life Extension Program, feral hogs have damaged 6,551 acres across Runnels County on 57 farms. The damage cost is estimated around \$71,000 mostly in fences and water facilities.

The losses for Coleman, Concho, Fisher, Lampasas, Mills, Runnels and Tom Green counties are up to \$484,000. These numbers do not'include auto collision damages.




