

Pictures include some old images of the original Runnels County Courthouse, when the building had a different roof and no side wings, as well as new photos of old buildings, the first houses built in the area that are still standing as historical mark-

The Winters Enterprise granted access to material of the book which includes a picture of the first five sheriffs of Runnels County; John M. Formwalt, John

W. Clampitt, R.P. "Bob" Kirk, Jim Flynt and John B. Perkins

Members of the historical commission gathered the aged material and took the recent pictures themselves.

New threat to **Lake Winters**

WINTERS, Texas.- The hunting issue at Winters Lake sparked the debate last Monday at the City Council meeting, with citizens looking to keep the shooting going and others asking to ban every firearm activity, but when it came down to transmission lines crossing the premises everyone agreed to fight for a common cause.

Discussion was open by Karen Pair, whose property is located northwest of the Winters Lake, and asked the City Council to reconsider amendments made in 2009 to the City Code of Ordinances, when water fowl and wing hunting where allowed with shotguns.

Prior to that amendment, the 1994 Code of Ordinances specifically prohibited firearms, explosive devices and every kind of hunting related activities at the lake.

"I have made some research and found no city that has public lands open to hunting... Are we supporting a duck hunters welfare program?" she

During the summers of 2008 and 2009, Winters saw a rise in property crimes with a rash of theft and burglaries and even some home invasions durthe night. Although we were able to catch and

prosecute over twenty suspects in those cases, we do not want a repeat of the last two years.

As we begin to conclude the school year and enter the months of summer, I encourage the community to keep in mind that summer vacations for families sometimes equal summer opportunities for

It is important to remember that when your home or property is empty, it creates an opportune time for thieves and dishonest people to take advantage of the folks in the community. Here are some tips and

ideas that may help keep your property secure: Lock things up around the yard and house. Many people leave their homes and property unsecured. Try not to leave valuables in plain sight around your yard or home.

Close the curtains and blinds, set things back out of sight, and secure air conditioner units to the window frame with screws.


Do not advertise the fact you and your family will be gone. In our modern era, the news is often spread by posting a families' whereabouts or vacation plans on Twitter, Face Book, My-Space, business and personal web sites, or other social networking

You can ask the post office to hold your mail until you return. Mail piling up in an unlocked box indicates to burglars that you are not home and puts you at risk for identity theft from stolen

You can also suspend your newspaper subscription if it is delivered to your home so papers will not pile up while you are gone.

If you are going to be gone for an extended time, park a car in the driveway and have a family friend move it around from time to time.

Set your lights, TV or radio on a timer, preferably one that switches on and off at varying times. Unplug unnecessary appliances. Shut off the water and gas to your washing machine, hot-water



saying you are out of town or stating Chief Nathan Johnson your return date. If you must leave an out-of-office reply on your email, do not say you are on

> vacation or when you will return, just say that you will reply as soon as possible. Ask a trusted neighbor to report suspicious activity around your house to the police and remove any free

> newspapers or advertisements that pile up on your porch or in your yard. You can also have a trusted friend "house sit" for you

while you are gone. Install outside lighting that

can illuminate dark areas when detected while accessing your property. If possible, install an alarm

that will make loud sounds and automatically call the police.

If funds allow, install a video camera or wildlife motion camera to capture photo evidence of any attempted crime on your property.

This type of evidence greatly increases the chances of law enforcement appre hending the thieves or van-

Homeowners insurance is always a good option if you can afford it, but remember, there is still usually a deductible that has to come out of your pocket, and no amount of money can replace certain personal possessions or family heirlooms.

One final note, citizens can contact City Hall and request a "HOUSE / SECU-RITY CHECK" to be done by the police department for up to two weeks at a time.

Citizens who wish to do this can go by City Hall and fill out the request form, which will then be forwarded to the police department.

The Winters Department is committed to doing everything we can to insure the safety of our citizens, but it takes the help of the community to keep the peace and suppress crime.

His mother Maw-Maw told us the story of how pop and his older brother





Fishin' with Dave

Fishing Report Dave Caudle

The waters at the big lake are finally beginning to warm and the bass are in the shallows making more bass. We have been taking some very nice bass on every trip with several over 10 pounds and very good numbers of smaller very aggressive bass. The cat fishing is also on the move with the channel cats moving into shallow water where corks and cheese bait is beginning to take some good eating catfish. The crappie spawn is nearly over however some nice panfish are still being hooked in the big trees above the Concho River bridge.

This past week I talked to a guy from Nebraska who told me of the snows they had the past winter. He also indicated this global warming thing did not apply this past winter as one time they had over 40inches of snow on the ground and winter lasted an extra two months. Just like here everything is about a month behind the past few years which is extending the spawn and making one the best spring seasons in recent history. So now is the time to get out on the lake and believe that every cast could garner that

At the fishing camp I have the opportunity to interview

all kinds of fishermen and women. They all have notions about fishing and how to be successful in their quest. One thing I have noticed is that most folks give fish much more credit than they deserve. Such as the idea that a fish can remember that yesterday or last year they saw a blue fleck power worm and know that blue fleck. worms do not exist as a food source and therefore will not bite that color worm. So the fisherman must get the newest color that the fish have never seen and therefore gain an advantage and get the

fish to bite that new worm.

In the past month I got the opportunity to fish with Chris Lindenberg who owns Gene Larew salt impregnated plastic lures and saw first hand his way of thinking. While I fished the trusty little black worm he tried every color of the rainbow. We both caught a bunch of fish but I had a much smaller pile of used worms all of which happened to be black. It proved my theory that you have to get the bait in front of the fish and let them decide whether they want to bite or not. Normally fish will take what is presented whether they are hungry or just in the protection mode. Sometimes they are in neither but if you hit them in the head long enough they will bite your lure. So persistence and confidence in your fishing is more important than color.

I learned years ago that nearly anything will work as a lure when in Mexico I watched guys walk the shoreline picking up used fishing line, tying it together and wrapping it on a can. Once a hook was found and attached to a drink opener it was cast by hand and retrieved by winding the line on the can. These guys caught fish just the same as us with all the latest and greatest equipment and newest colors. I remember a time at Ivie when we were on the fish and everything we threw was greeted with either a bass, crappie or white bass. After fishing in the same secret hole for over four hours with a fish on nearly every cast I decided to find something they would not bite. When I got down to putting a piece of duct tape on the hook and a fish still bit I decided that day was one of those where we could do no

Its all marketing in the fishing world, put the same old lure in a new package and the fisherman will bite. We all have our secret lures, places and techniques which don't make a great deal of difference to the fish who probably give us too much credit. I am just sorry that they put pop tops on the cans, where will

we ever find a good lure? See you on the lake.
