



Registration will be tonight (October 26) at 7:30 p. m. in Weinert High School.



Research has shown that moisture causes the biggest problems in stacked cotton. While optimum seed cotton moisture for harvesting is 8%. to preserve quality, you should also avoid storage conditions which would cause the moisture content of the cotton to rise above 12%. This can be moisture in the form of dew, green trash material, rain or snow. When placing cotton into a rick, be sure that any moisture on the cotton has dried off.

A good way to check to see if the cotton is dry enough to store is to squeeze a handfull. If the cotton sticks together in a ball it is too wet. If it springs, back freely, it is usually dry enough. WASHINGTON, D. C .- Once again something good has happeaced in Washington-at least for the time being. The Senate has abandoned efforts to pass a Coasumer Protection Bill before the Congress either adjourns or recesses at the week's

In October of last year the U. S. House of Representatitves passed a measure creating an Office of Consumer Affairs within the Executive Office of the President. The stated general purpose of the proposal was to coordinate Federal consumer protection activities.

The Senate Bill goes much further. It would create a new super-agency to preside over

types of proceedings and activintes. In other words, it would be another all-powerful bureaucratic operation over about every other department, commistion, bureau and agency. The power given to the three men appointed to administer the autherity would appear to be

greater than that now given to the Environmental Protection Agency, which is proving to have almost unlimited control over our industrial capacity and which is doubtless going to cost consumers extra money.

It seems we have forgotten the doctrine voiced by Patrick Henry in the Virginia Convention of 1788 when he advised power ought always to be distributed sparingly on the assumption that bad men will use it badly, for it is likely they will."

In this proposed legislation the agency has the potential of being a government on top of another government.

Everyone recognizes that there are problems in our complicated economy and particularly in the marketing end but he problem has been seized ipon with somewhat the attiude that Washington must tell all consumers what is good for them and how it is going to take care of them. In the day of the village blacksmith standing under a chestnut tree, the consumer had an easier time. If the shoe didn't fit, he could lead the horse back. Responsibility was direct and the customer recourse was immediate.

Obvjously nothing like this exists today-TV sets made in Japan; a shoe made in Italy. Responsibility becomes blurred when defects show up.
