The Jake Joyce Awards were presented to Sybil Bridgeman and Braden Mikeska for their dedication to school and community service.

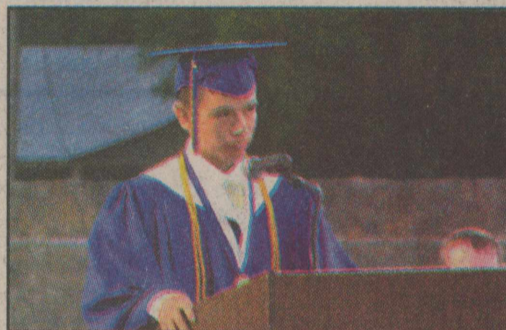

Spanning three centuries of catholic presence

BALLINGER, Texas.- St. Mary, Star of the Sea Catholic church located in Ballinger, Texas celebrates its 125th anniversary.

Catholic Missionaries, who traveled by horseback from Brownwood after a long train ride from Dallas/Ft. Worth, began celebrating masses in catholic homes in 1885 and called the commu-

nity St. Mary.

Ten years later, in 1895 the first wooden structure called St. Mary Church was constructed across from Brunson's feed store on the Paint Rock highway.

A short time later, land was purchased at 6th and Crosson and a new Church was constructed of locally quarried sandstone. In June of 1910, the new Saint Mary, Star of the Sea Catholic Church was dedicated. Now

100 years later the parish will host a special celebration to mark the pioneer spirit of the early catholic missionaries and parishioners to mark 125 years of Catholic presence in Runnels County.

A special mass will be celebrated at 10 am on Sunday, June 6th by Bishop Michael Pfeifer, OMI, to mark the 125th and 100th anniversary of the parish and the Church. All are cordially invited to attend this special outdoor mass.

The office day will be held at the City Hall Council Chambers, 310 South Main Street. Information will be provided about USDA Rural Development Housing, Community and Business and Cooperative loan and grant programs.

USDA Rural Development works to ensure rural citizens can participate fully in the global economy through technical assistance and programs that help rural Americans build strong economies to improve their quality of life. Rural Development loans and grants assist rural communities meet their basic needs by building water and wastewater systems, financing decent, affordable housing, supporting electric power and rural businesses, including cooperatives and supporting community development with information and technical assistance including broadband initiatives.

USDA Rural Development Housing Programs offer loans and grants to families with very low to moderate income levels in towns and cities meeting certain population requirements. Loans are primarily

used to help income eligible individuals or households purchase homes in rural areas. Funds can be used to build, repair and renovate a home, or to purchase and prepare sites with water and sewage facilities. For very low income families who own homes in need of repair, the Home Repair Loan and Grant Program offers funding for renovations.

USDA Rural Development Community Programs enhance the quality of life for rural Texans by providing funds to governmental entities, nonprofit organizations and Indian Tribes for essential community facilities and services. Funds may be used for a variety of community projects. Previous funds have been used to enlarge, improve or construct schools, libraries, farmers markets, medical clinics, assisted living centers, public buildings, community centers or fund new and improved water and wastewater facilities. Funds are also available to purchase public safety equipment such as ambulances, firefighting equipment and other required emergency service gear.

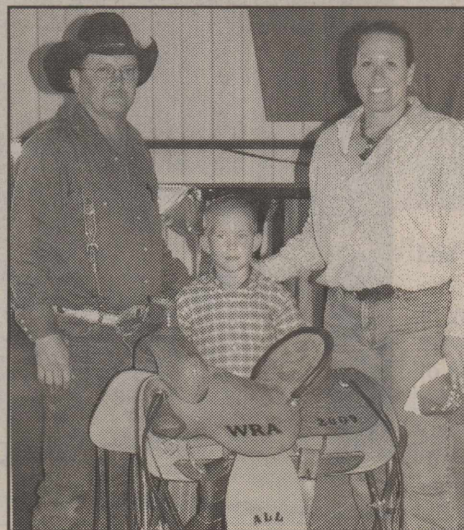
Following the meal, President Steve Pritchard and wife Penny Pritchard presented the end of year awards for the 2009 - 2010 Playday Season.

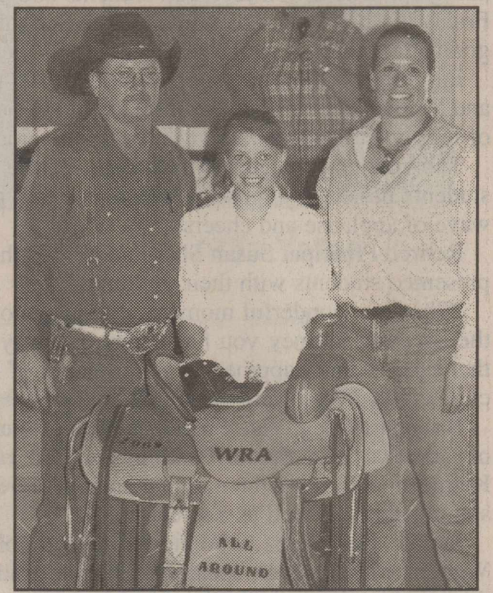

Fishin' with Dave

The waters at Ivie are beginning to heat up with some of these calm, 90-degree days and warm nights. Water temperatures in the 80's signal that the bass spawn is about over with maybe a few late ones in the deeper parts of the main lake. I have actually caught spawning fish in June in water over 25 feet deep. But at the end of the bass thing the catfish take over for a few weeks and can be caught in shallow water.

Some good areas for cats can be located north of the North Island in the shallow coves, those with brush being a better choice. I've also seen Terry Winchester, the channel cat lake record holder, fishing in these areas, and he's better than sea gulls at finding fish, particularly catfish. In order to fish these areas, it's good to scatter some soured grain or wheat (good crop this year) around your location and give it about 30 minutes or so to

draw in some cats. No fish, move to another location. Sometimes a short move is all it takes to find the mother load.

Speaking of mother loads, I'm not too sure the Queen Mother of Great Britain is real proud of some of the royal family about some recent unregal behavior. Leave that wild animal alone, experts advise

AUSTIN, Texas - With spring come young, wild animals venturing from their nests and hiding places under the watchful eyes of their parents. Young animals often stray and appear to be abandoned; that's when humans need to resist the urge to help, wildlife experts say.

Some species, including birds, deer and snakes, are very active this time of year and are being seen more frequently.

This is the time of year that young birds are out of their nests but cannot fly. If the bird's eyes are open, it has a coat of feathers and is hop-

ping around, it is probably fine, according to staff at Texas Parks and Wildlife's wildlife information center. Grounded fledglings will usually be up and flying within a few days.

"Many people discover apparently lost or abandoned wildlife young and take them in, thinking they are doing the right thing, and this sometimes does more harm than good," said Mark Klym of the Wildlife Diversity branch at TPWD. "People should leave young animals alone unless they are obviously injured or orphaned. It is best to observe a wild creature from a distance for a while in order to make that determination."

Staying too close to the

baby may keep mamma from returning, Klym said.

The fawning season begins in early to mid-May, although the newborns may not be visible to the casual observer for several weeks because of excellent camouflage of their mottled coats and their mother's care in hiding them from predators.

Deer will typically leave their fawn(s) for hours at a time, returning only to nurse them. Fawns are often discovered lying quietly in tall grass or brushy areas. Well-meaning people sometimes pick up these fawns, thinking that they have been abandoned by their mothers and need help. This is rarely the case.

case.

A fawn should only be picked up if it is covered in fire ants or is otherwise seriously injured. These fawns need assistance and should be taken to a wildlife rehabilitator immediately.

If it is determined that a wild animal is sick or injured contact your local Game Warden or the TPWD wildlife information line, (512) 389-4505, during business hours for a referral to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator.

After-hours callers can get the names of rehabilitators from TPWD's dispatch line at (512) 389-4848 or by accessing the department's web site.

During the spring, the department receives more than 100 calls a week about baby wildlife.
