

City Council maintains tax rate

INTERS, Texas.-After a series of budget involving all departments of the city operation, the Winters City Council agreed last week to maintain the tax rate of .688669 per 100 dollars, despite the adjusted tax base loss of over 5 million dollars.

The special meeting was held on Thursday, August 12, at the city council chambers, in order to adopt a tax calendar for the new fiscal year, evaluate and approve the new tax rate. Cuts of about \$70,600 were approved.

The city council started with the budget evaluation, a severance package for one of the Police Department officers that had prior approval. The Police Department has a plan to redistribute work- Department officer, once she cost. Budget cuts for the more cost-effectiveness.



The expense reduction includes payments for uniforms and computer services. These amounts were reduced approximately \$15,000. Other budget reductions

year in a row, the Winters Independent School District received a perfect score in the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas.

The accountability rating was Superior Achievement, with a perfect score of 80. Winters became the only independent school district regionally to get this achievement for three years in a row.

The rating, made public by the Texas Education Agency last week, includes indicators such as the total fund balance, general fund, capital appreciation bonds and percentage in the change in students for the last five years.

The accountability rating considers the 2008-2009 district status financial detail, and includes not only finan-

cial information but also academic performance and accountability ratings given WINTERS, Texas.- For third by the TEA. David Hutton, Superintendent at the Winters ISD, recognized the labor of all the administrative staff to achieve this rating.

"We have a wonderful staff that has allowed us to achieve this recognition for three years in a row, I have to acknowledge the work of Glenda McKneely, our District's Business Manager, who has kept all the records and made this possible," said Hutton.

Winters achieved the top of five accountability ratings in a scale that starts with Superior Achievement.

The purpose of the FIRST rating system is to ensure that school districts will be held accountable for the quality of their financial management practices and achieve improved performance.

FORCE REDUCTION WILL **IMPACT ANIMAL CONTROL**

As you may know, the City of Winters lost an estimated \$5.5 million dollars in taxable value this past year. Those changes in our local economy have forced the City Council to make difficult decisions regarding the budget for the city, including the Police Department. In response to the realities of a deteriorating economy, the council is taking important steps to realign the budget with projected tax income.

Some cities, such as Marfa and Eden, have reduced or eliminated their local Police Departments in response to the economic situation. Due to these factors, our agency will be streamlining our work force and the services provided to the community. Effective immediately, WPD no longer has a full-time animal control officer. For the remainder of this month (August 2010) Billy Hollis (805) will be taking minor calls for animal control and taking care of the shelter on a part-time basis. On-duty police officers will respond to animal complaint calls that fall into one of the following categories:

1. An immediate danger to persons or property

2. A definable and immediate disturbance of the peace

3. A disruption of government services (School District, fire or EMS unit response, etc...)

4. A disruption of a house of worship (church services

5. A disruption in a funeral service or burial service

6. An animal believed to be rabid or an immediate health and safety issue

7. An animal who has been injured and there is a need for it to be immediately euthanaized

The Police Department will no longer be routinely placing and maintaining traps around the city to capture feral or wild animals. The department will no longer proved a patrol specifically for loose animals within the city limits. Citizens who have a need for a trap may obtain one from a local source such as Milton's Hardware or other area retailers. Should an elderly citizen be unable to procure and deploy such a device, I will make a decision on a case-bycase basis regarding the deployment of city owned traps, or the maintenance of a privately owned trap. Officers may be dispatched to euthanize an animal (including animals trapped in civilian owned traps) if the civilian does not have another functional means of humanly euthanizing the animal. In most cases, the citizen will still be responsible for the disposal of the carcass.

Citizens who need to dispose of dead animals may do so by contacting Jack Davis Sr. at 754-4646 to drop off at the designated animal dumpster located at the city Convenience Centerpellate erent it even tinob taut only an

Because we must still address the issue of rabies within our city, on-duty police officers will assist citizens within the city limits where stray, feral, or wild animal have been spotted who are believed to be injured or have a communicable disease (such as rabies).

Should anyone wish to volunteer to assist with the animal control issues and the animal shelter, I would be grateful for the help.

Lots of people would love to have your job and your income. But you keep wanting more from tax payers who just don't have it. There is a saying, "you can't get blood from a turnip"



Fishing report By Dave Caudle

The fishing at Ivie and surrounding lakes continues to be a hit and miss quest. It seems that early in the morning the top water action is most reliable, but as the sun comes up the fish tend to go into the shade like most of us should. Some of the good crappie fishermen (those who can fish the heavy brush) are taking fair numbers. These fish can be found along either river channel in trees at least 20 feet deep. The bait of choice is a weed guarded jig of white or bright colors.

Blue catfish are also being hooked on jug lines normally baited with fresh cut carp and fished in water about 25 feet deep. White bass continue to surface and run baitfish along weedlines in the main lake. When a school surfaces throw anything into the feeding frenzy and it will get hit. Then return the spoon or slab to the bottom to hopefully intersect a moving school and then we get several on the line at one time.

A couple of weeks ago I suggested a lighted message board be placed in the rear window of your car to transfer your thoughts and ideas to drivers sharing the same road. I thought it would be nice to make someone's day with a nice comment or maybe in some cases tell them what you think about their driving habits. I mentioned pulling over on the shoulder so someone could pass when it could be safely done. This spurred a written comment from a lady who shall remain unnamed. 




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






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MEMORIAL GOLF TOURNAMENT
