

### Heart Campaign Needs Volunteers

Carolyn and Buck Everett, chairmen of the Haskell County Heart Fund campaign, today issued an appeal to county residents for volunteers to help distribute information on how to "Beat the Big One-Heart Attack" and to collect contributions for increased research. education and community programs to reduce the nation's leading cause of death.

The campaign chairmen pointed out that one out of every eight Americans has some form of heart or blood vessel disease. The nationwide epidmic takes more than one million lives a year-one every 30 seconds. The toll is greater than for all other causes of death combined.

The public education drive is the high point of the nationwide Heart Fund Campaign beld throughout the month of February. Volunteers will call on friends and neighbors to tell them how to reduce the risk of heart attack and stroke, how to recognize the warning signs. and what action to take in an emergency.

"Each volunteer will be ask ed to give just a few hours to bring this vital message directly to the public in an all-out effort to reduce deaths from heart attack and stroke," the caimpaign chairmen said.

This week an opportunity faces the people of Haskell unlike anything that has ever been available here before. The location of a Herman Marcus. Inc., garment plant in Haskell means more than probably anyone can comprehend.

A beginning labor force of 60 people drawing an bourty wage of \$1.60 for a 40 hour week would mean an annual payroll of \$199,680 00. Herman Marcus employees are paid on a 'per piece basis' and the Haskell Industrial Foundation has agreed to subsidize this amount with the amount required to reach minimum wage \$25,000.00 has been allocated for this purpose the first year of operation and \$5,000.00 the second year. This money is not a donation to Herman Marcus. During the first year of operation he (Herman Marcus) expects an additional loss of about \$70,000.00.

A training program will be gin in the near future for prospective employees at the plant The training school will be operated by the Haskell Independent School District and the Texas Industrial Commission. The Haskell Industrial Foundation will finance the school.

erage hourly wage of \$3.00. years.

This amount paid to 60 employees in the Haskell plant would mean an annual payroll of \$374 400.00 A large portion of this money would be spent with Haskell merchants and in turn pay their employees. Current plans call for the eventual employment of about 200 people.

Just weeks prior to the approval of the Haskell plant, the Board of Directors approved the location of a plant in Monahans. Haskell and Monahans were selected from over 300 towns that had been considered for the sites and were selected from a final group of 12 towns.

Garments produced at the plant will not be sold at the factory and will not interfere with local garment selling merchants. An investment of \$60,-000 for a guaranteed return of almost \$200,000.00 at the end of one year is something that members of the Haskell Industrial Foundation have only dreamed about for the past two decades. The additional aspect of training local people to do job which will improve their standard of living is an opportunity that simply cannot be
