

Wreck on Main St. sends two children to hospital

WINTERS - A two-vehicle accident sent two children to the hospital with minor injuries, and caused a road closure last Thursday, March 17, on Main St. and Broadway St. for about two hours. The accident happened at about 9:30 a.m.

A white Ford F150, crew cab, driven by Justin Lee Deike, of Winters, was headed southbound on Main St. hauling a single-bail hay trailer. Headed northbound also on Main St. was a white Chevrolet pick up, extended cab, driven by Joe Hernandez, of Winters.

Deike was headed to West-T-Go and tried to turn to his left, on Broadway St. Deike failed to yield right of way to the incoming traffic and his truck was hit almost head-on by the Chevrolet pick up.

After the collision the Ford pick

up ended up facing north. The impact sent the Chevrolet pick up truck, driven by Hernandez into a nearby utility pole, on the sidewalk of the City Hall.

First responders helped both drivers and two passengers that were on the Chevrolet truck. Troy Hernandez, 10-years-old, and Joey Hernandez, 9 years-of-age, were taken to North Runnels Hospital with minor injuries and for further evaluation.

Winters Fire Department helped to take drivers and passengers out of the vehicles. Officer Paula Geyer, with the Winters Police Department, is investigating the case. Winters Police Department was aided by Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Jeremy Sherrod and Runnels County Sheriff Bill Baird.

The four lanes on Main St. were open for circulation at 11:15 a.m.

Winters resident grandson featured in fundraiser

WINTERS - Chisum Allen, the grandson of Marie Allen, of Winters, was featured as one of the "Miracle Kids" at the KIXY Cares for Kids radiothon on February 24-26, in San Angelo. The event raised over \$154,098 in donations and pledges.

Chisum's story stood out as father, Rusty Allen, recalled June 13, 2010. The Allen family's world turned upside down when a traumatic event left their son, Chisum, in danger. Just before leaving to watch his sister compete in the National High School Rodeo finals, Chisum attempted a jump from his father's skid steer loader to the hay accumulator. He lost his footing, fell in between and was run over by the skid steer loader. Shannon's Trauma Center dispatched Airmed1 to the scene for help and Chisum was eventually hospitalized for six days with blood in his

lungs, a spleen injury and a fractured pelvis, clavicle and multiple ribs. Thanks to the exceptional care he received at Shannon Medical Center, Chisum is back up on the horse and of life and is raring to become the next best cowboy.

The radiothon was held at the Sunset Mall with DJs Jay Michaels, David Carr and Miracle Mom Delaine Fuchs highlighted stories of children in the Concho Valley who have been treated at Shannon Medical Center. The 2011 Miracle kids were introduced and we revisited former Miracle Families.

"We have been so blessed to listen to these families share their incredible stories," said Sharla Adam, Director of CMN. "The miracle stories Jay, David and Delaine shared were full of inspiration and hope. Because of the response that we had this weekend, we will be able to continue to touch the lives of the children treated at Shannon Medical Center."

Wildfire conditions prevail in Texas

COLLEGE STATION - Texas Forest Service officials stayed on alert last week due to weather conditions that could lead to dangerous wildfires in several regions, including north and west of a dry line from Wichita Falls down to Midland and Van Horn, and the Guadalupe Mountains.

In this area of West and Northwest Texas, temperatures reached the 90-degree range, with relative humidity of 10 percent or less, and winds 15 to 20 miles per hour gusting up to 30 mph.

In the past days, Texas Forest Service responded to

67 fires burning 14,726 acres. So far this year, the agency has responded to 364 fires burning 246,089 acres. More than 1,750 structures have been saved, and 170 structures have been lost.

Of the 254 counties in Texas, 169 currently are reporting burn bans.

Residents should avoid outdoor activities that could generate a spark or open flames. Even if your area has had recent rain relief, it could still be in danger of wildfire. Clear combustible materials away from your home and don't do any outdoor burning until the threat of fire decreases and burn bans are lifted.

UVALDE - The 2011 Farm and Range Forum will be held April 1-2 in Uvalde, with this year's theme being "Conserving Our Rural Heritage."

According to event organizers, the forum will be "of interest to landowners, urban and rural conservationists, and anyone interested in the history and dynamics of the region as it faces economic and social challenges."

The forum begins Friday at noon with participants leaving by carpool or caravan from the Uvalde Adult Activity Center, 250 E. Main Street, for a field trip to Harris Ranch, a large working ranch outside Uvalde. At the ranch, experts will give small-group demonstrations and explanations of recommended range management practices, riparian values and protection, and healthy rangeland plant diversity, as well as opportunities for income diversification. Activities will be followed by a steak dinner at the ranch and "campfire conversation" among the participants.

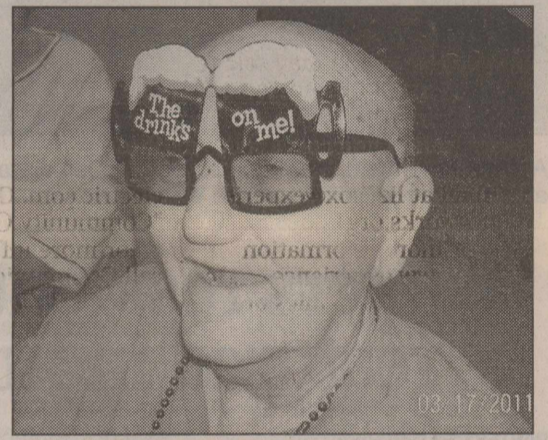

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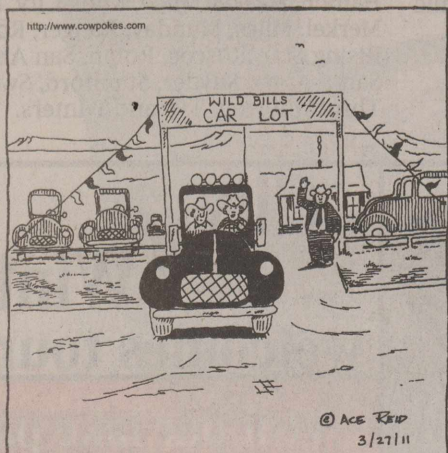
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One man dies in wreck in Nolan Co

ABILENE - One person was killed and one injured in three vehicle crash involving an 18 wheeler, a wrecker and a pick up truck occurring Thursday, March 18, at 2:55 p.m. The multiple crash was located on IH-20 near mile marker 238,

in Nolan County. Ronald Mannddler Jett, 57 years-of-age from Lubbock, Texas, was pronounced dead at the scene by Judge Sharon Gardner at 3:40 p.m. The body was taken to McCoy's Funeral Home in Sweetwater, Texas. Jett was not wearing a seat belt.

Mikle Lee Sadler, 62 years-of age, of Loraine, Texas, was injured at the scene and taken to University Medical Center, in Lubbock, Texas.

The crash occurred when the 18 wheeler, driven by Tem Tanh, from Georgia, was merging onto IH-20 from U.S. 84. Tanh lost control of his rig and it rolled onto its side.

A Freightliner wrecker

driven by Jett, struck the overturning 18 wheeler, and a Ford pick up truck driven by Sadler took evasive action to avoid the developing crash and overturned.

Sadler was taken to the hospital in incapacitating condition with a head injury, Sadler was wearing a seat belt.

The weather was clear and the roadway was dry. Trooper Gilbert Valdez is investigating this crash.

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Texas A&M University hero's biography to be unveiled

COLLEGE STATION – "Rudder: From Leader to Legend," the first comprehensive biography of one of World War II's foremost heroes who later put Texas A&M University on its path to prominence — Gen. James Earl Rudder — will be formally unveiled during campus ceremonies on Thursday, March 24.

The 5 p.m. ceremonies, expected to be attended by the book's author, Thomas M. Hatfield, and a host of dignitaries, will be held in front of a larger-than-life statue of the late Gen. Rudder. The statue, in turn, is adjacent to the landmark 11-story office building and theater-exhibit hall complex named in his honor.

Gen. Rudder's legend began when, as a lieutenant colonel, he led the Army's Second Ranger Battalion up the cliffs of Pointe du Hoc on France's Normandy Beach on D-Day during World War II in a fierce battle with German defenders.

"Tracking Rudder from Texas to Britain, across France, and into Germany was high adventure," said Hatfield. "To uncover the truth, I walked the ground in every place that was significant in his

entire life in Europe and this country, and I read virtually every related document I could find."

Rudder, a native Texan and 1932 Texas A&M graduate, went on to serve as head of the Texas Land Office, and then became president of his alma mater, and of The Texas A&M University System, from 1959 until his death in 1970 at age 59.

He is credited with laying the groundwork that transformed Texas A&M from a small all-male predominantly military college to the comprehensive teaching, research and service university that it is today — with almost 50,000 students, a 2,800-member faculty and an annual research budget exceeding \$630 million.

The roll-out of "Rudder: From Leader to Legend" will be among the most extensive ever for the book's publisher, Texas A&M University Press, a scholarly publishing house that has more than 1,250 titles to its credit, noted Charles Backus, the Edward R. Campbell '39 Press Director. In the process of publishing that array of books, Texas A&M Press has become one of the leading public university presses in the

nation since its establishment in 1974.

"Tom Hatfield brings the perfect combination of experiences, skills and sensibilities to the writing of this book," said Backus. He noted that Hatfield — now an internationally-recognized military historian whose work has focused especially on D-Day and the winning of World War II — spent several formative summers in College Station, worked while a student at the Texas Land Office while Rudder was commissioner and later served in an Army Reserve unit commanded by Rudder.

Some observers may find irony in the fact that the 528-page book about the man who personifies Texas A&M to most Texans, and especially to Aggies, is written by the director of the Military History Institute at the University of Texas at Austin, the institution widely considered Texas A&M's foremost rival. Gen. Rudder's career, however, shows that he worked effectively with people from all over the state and nation to accomplish great things, Backus pointed out, and Hatfield devoted nearly a decade to researching and writing the book.

BALLINGER – Commissioners Court approved in a regular meeting held last Tuesday, March 22, to relocate food vendors to the Courthouse lawn for the 36th Annual Ethnic Festival, to be held in Ballinger on April 30 through May 1.

The request, made by Ballinger Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Tammie Virden looks forward to provide food vendors with a better location, closer to the arts and crafts booths, in order to improve their sales.

According to chamber's figures three trailers will be located on the Courthouse lawn. Commissioners discussed about the new location, on regards of possible damages to the lawn and trees, and finally voted three to one to approve the proposal.

Commissioner Bobby Moore, the one who voted against the new measure, said he didn't oppose the relocation but he would rather consult with Rick Minzemayer, AgriLife Extension entomologist for Runnels and Tom Green counties.

Among other agenda items approved by the Commissioners Court was the opening of bids for emulsified asphalt and topping rock for county roads. Holly Asphalt was awarded the winning bid for emulsified asphalt and none of the bids received for topping rock was considered at this time.

Commissioners Court considered results of outside audit report and head the racial profiling report presented by Runnels County Sheriff Bill Baird.

Commissioners received the request for a space for weekly meetings of the Healthy County Weight Watchers at Work Program. Use of the exercise room was approved at the meeting.

The meeting passed the payment of all current accounts and any accounts that have been pre-approved between court dates by members duly appointed by the Runnels County Commissioners Court.

The court didn't take any action on budget amendments/line item adjustments to the 2010/2011 Fiscal Year budget, and an item in the agenda to consider trading a water truck in Precinct 3.

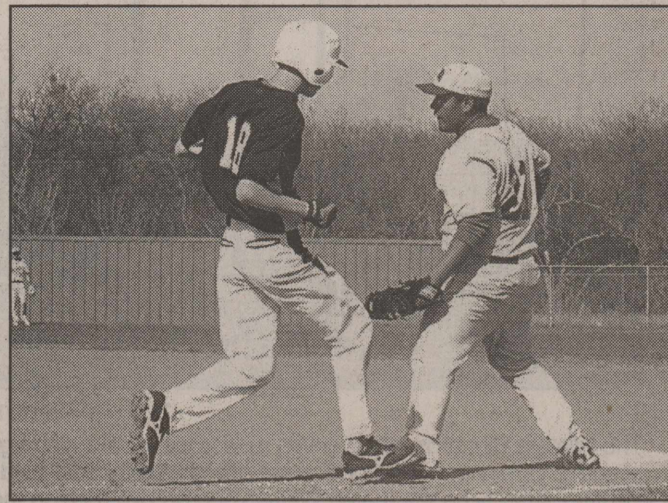
Spencer Ryan stole two bases, and each of Alzardo Rodriguez and Skylar Schniers stole one.

Strait Daniel and Thoma batted doubles.

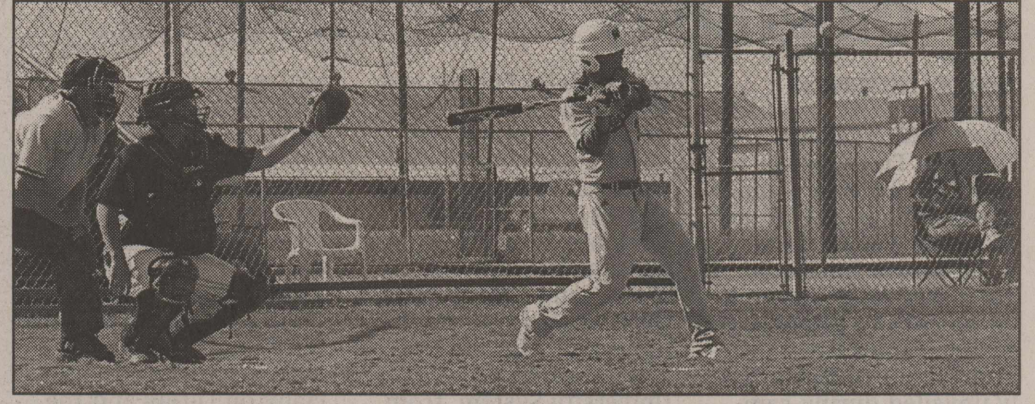

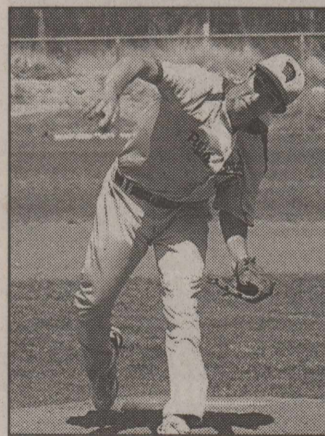

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Athens fishery open for rainbow trout

ATHENS - Visitors to the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center (TFFC) are invited to harvest rainbow trout at no charge from now through the end of the season in late April.

Regular admission charges will still apply, but no additional fee will be charged for harvesting rainbow trout. Up to five rainbow trout per person may be harvested per day.

Harvesting channel catfish will still require payment of a \$10 fee for the opportunity to harvest up to five fish.

All fishing tackle and bait are provided, and no fishing license is required. Anglers who bring their own equipment must mash down the barb on all hooks, and only single hooks are allowed. No treble hooks may be used.

Anyone intending to harvest fish should bring a small cooler and ice. No ice is available on site.

TFFC is located at 5550 F.M. 2495, Athens, Texas. Athens is 75 miles south-east of Dallas. For more information or directions, call (903) 676-2277 or visit www.tpwd.state.tx.us/tffc.

Our canopy was the sky...

If cruise ships were circuses, there'd be no tents large enough for their hundreds of intriguing rings, many of them up and running at all hours of the day. The "big top" for vacations on the high seas is the sky.

This analogy came to mind as we sailed toward the Caribbean Sea from Florida's Port Everglades on Holland America's Zuiderdam for a 10-day cruise to the Panama Canal. As Fort Lauderdale faded from view, we perused booklets of "see/play/eat/do" options during the 3,200-mile adventure. Even with serious "picking/choosing," we knew that we could partake of a mere smattering of this splendid vessel's offerings.

Soon, stars sparkled above us, blinking reminders to "tune out" the workaday world and to "tune in" leisure under the biggest of big tops....

Much may be taken for granted by 2,000 fellow vacationers, most of whom have cruised on multiple occasions. Dining, featuring food prepared by master chefs who turn out some 110,000 meals on the trip, is memorable. Also anticipated on Holland America vessels are lavish floral arrangements at every turn, as well as antiques and art dating back to the 18th century.

Classes covering numerous interests are offered, plus ports-of-call excursions, varied entertainment and "people-watching" extraordinaire.

There's always the unexpected. On this cruise, ages varied from eight months to 95 years. The latter, perhaps the eldest, was Dr. C. Everett Koop, US Surgeon General appointee of Presidents Ronald Reagan and George H. W. Bush. Finding cruises to be "helpful to his health," he was easily identified by his signature full beard. Dr. Koop graciously signed autographs and conversed with whomever wished to chat....

Cruise entertainment was as varied and well-received as any in memory. In addition to comedy, singing, dancing and magic acts was a show-stopping musical group called Island Magic. Three

members of the quartet "play" chrome-plated oil drums, with the fourth accompanying on a traditional drum set.

You read it right. The 55-gallon barrels originally contained oil. Bands with up to 100 members are common in the Trinidad homeland, where longtime drum "makers" now teach the conversion art in college. For starters, the barrels are turned upside-down, with bottoms "concave" to produce 30-40 musical notes when struck by small cushioned sticks.

Julian Gibbs, founder and leader of Island Magic, says that such bands often include 10 members, but he knows of no other with as few as four. Steel drum music has been his passion for more than 25 years. His group is now in its 19th year on cruise ships, and one fellow member, Dereck Ayum, has "drummed" out the melody for 17 years....

The musicians, none of whom read music, have "paid their dues." Until recent years, Island Magic performed pool side, a common assignment for such groups. Gradually, their popularity led to featured entertainment venues. For the past several years, Island Magic has enjoyed headliner status, the last three for Holland America Lines.

My wife and I agree that the quartet provided the most memorable entertainment we've experienced in a decade of cruising. The drummers produce marvelous orchestral sounds on numbers ranging from Broadway to Beethoven...and beyond.

It is easy to understand why the quartet ranks #1 in fleet entertainment. The Vista Lounge fills to near its 850-plus capacity for both shows on "Island Magic" night. Standing ovations are common, as they are for a voluntary "encore show" on the final day at sea. It was standing room only then, too, with intermittent "standing O's," the longest for the Christian group's gospel medley. It includes "To God Be the Glory," "Amazing Grace" and "When the Saints Go Marching In." All members of the group are refreshingly humble, freely mingling with guests throughout the cruise....

Gilmer fish is a new lake record

ATHENS - Gilmer Reservoir sent a new lake record largemouth bass to the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center (TFFC) March 17, and the next day Caddo Lake sent the existing lake record largemouth to Athens for the second year in a row.

The Caddo fish is especially noteworthy since it was the biggest fish caught in Texas last season, and it moved into the lead again this year. At 16.07 pounds it tops a fish from Lake Austin that weighed 16.03 pounds. It takes over the number 20 spot on the Top 50 list of biggest bass ever caught in Texas and also ranks number 16 due to its previous catch, when it weighed 16.17 pounds.

Two fish caught this season now are on the Top 50 list, the Caddo fish and the Lake Austin fish, which dropped to number 23.

Catches of 16-pound or bigger fish are extremely rare. Only 25 have been reported in Texas. Two of those came during the current season and two last season. Prior to last season,

no 16-pound or bigger fish had been reported in Texas since the 2001-2002 season. This is the sixth season that two or more 16-pound-plus fish have been caught. Three were caught in each of the 1990-91 and 1991-92 seasons; one of those was the current state record 18.18-pounder caught from Lake Fork in 1992.

Thomas Milam of Pittsburg kicked off the action March 17 about 2:20 p.m. when he caught a 14.0-pounder from Gilmer Reservoir on a pumpkin-seed craw worm in four feet of water. The fish was 25 inches long and 21.75 inches in girth. It is new lake record, eclipsing the former record of 11.41 pounds caught in 2009.

Since 1996 Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) has stocked about 450,000 Florida largemouth bass into Gilmer Reservoir. It is likely that Milam's fish was stocked into the lake in 2000 or 2001.

March 18 Sean Swank of De Berry, Texas, caught Toyota ShareLunker 522 from Caddo Lake. When the fish was scanned for a PIT tag (Passive Integrated Transponder) at TFFC, it was found to be the same fish caught from Caddo last year by Keith Burns and entered into the ShareLunker program as No. 487. At 16.17 pounds, it became the new lake record.
