Underwood Park underway

WINTERS - The City of Winters is conditioning two blocks on the west side of town, donated by former Winters resident Randall Underwood, in order to get everything ready for the new Marva Jean Underwood

Alan Hollander, Winters City Manager, said that Underwood donation included a swing set and playground, which will be installed on site.

"We are very excited about the possibilities, the lots are being conditioned, they already have a water shed, and electricians are looking at electric lines on the ground, the potential here is

enormous," said Hollander. Among other projects the city is considering installing benches, building a gazebo, and probably fencing the park; public input will be sought for these improvements.

The park is two blocks in length, and goes on from Frisco St., from West Dale to Majestic.

In November of 2010 the City of Winters received the donation from Underwood under the condition of the

Man charged with child

WINTERS - A 28-year-old man was arrested last Tuesday morning, and charged for the assault of a child in a case that is being investigated by the Winters Police Department, Child Advocacy Center in Abilene, and Child Protective Services.

Harold Melius, a man that moved from Ohio and has been living in Winters with friends was taken to Runnels County Jail, and charged in relation to an incident occurring last weekend with a 14-year-old

Melius was also a suspect in some of the burglaries occurring last year, and was out on parole after being found guilty of the charges.

The warrant was issued last Tuesday morning. The suspect was arrested without any incident in a residence on Jones Street, in the east side of town.

The Winters Police Department considered that the suspect could be involved in at least one more case of child abuse. Melius was arrested in connection with this case and on a warrant for violation

A forensic interview was performed to the alleged victim, but the results have not yet been released.

Longest serving sheriff in Runnels County

WINTERS - The longest serving Sheriff in Runnels County and one of the state's longest serving Sheriffs celebrated last week 28 years of continuos service. A ceremony was held at the Runnels County Courthouse to celebrate Bill Baird's 28th anniversary as County

Baird has been Sheriff in Runnels County since April 19, 1983. Last week he celebrated in the same hall were he was sworn-in almost three decades ago by former Runnels County Judge Michael Murchison.

"I will never forget the day that I was appointed right there, I was appointed because former Sheriff had personal problems in his family and he wasn't able to continue," Baird explained.

Since his first term he has been

elected seven times, and he plans to continue serving Runnels County and its people for at least one more

And even when things have not been easy, the service has brought plenty of satisfaction to his career.

Baird first took the position because he needed a job, and stayed there because of his service vocation enjoying the work.

In this 28 years things have really changed in the county, back in the 1980s the County Jail had a daily average of three prisoners. The new jail, built in 1999, has a daily average over 50 inmates. The Sheriff's Office staff also has grown, passing from five to 25 employees.

Many employees have supported Baird's work as head of the Sheriff's Department. He acknowledges the help and is thankful for the support "we have people like Dana Gore (Jail Administrator) who has been there

from day one," said Baird. Through the good times and the bad the Sheriff has kept the office running and served the people, "we did everything that we could, nobody can solve everything but we take care of the cases that we can, we solved a lot of crimes.

A career in law enforcement is always filled with tough moments, but there are also some very enjoy-

Baird recalls tough cases, such as a wreck where eight people died in the same incident, or an attack in Wingate, where a girl survived an attack that left several people dead.

"It is hard when you see people and families devastated by crime, but something that keeps us going is when we are able to solve the crimes, in the Wingate case we were able to put the man away for life."

RABIES - PART II

City of Winters Code of Ordinances requires all domestic animals within the city to be vaccinated and registered

As we continue into the peak of rabies season, I will be reviewing more information about the rabies issue in an effort to educate our public and help prevent an incident of rabies in Winters.

I encourage each pet owner to vaccinate their animals annually, not only because it is the law, but also because rabies thrives around abundant wildlife and unvaccinated domestic animals.

What time of year is rabies most common?

Most cases in Texas occur in the spring. This could be due to the fact there are more opportunities for transmissions during the spring mating season. However, rabies does occur through the entire year in Texas in both wild and domestic

animals. What animals are susceptible to

rabies?

All warm-blooded animals, including humans, are susceptible to rabies. In Texas, skunks, bats, possums, armadillos, porcupines, coyotes, farrell cats, and foxes are the most infected types of animals. Contact with obviously sick animals should be avoided at all times. Domestic dogs, cats, and livestock usually acquire rabies from contact with infected wild animals. While the numbers of rabid domestic animals is few, they are more dangerous because of their close association with humans.

How is rabies spread? A common way is for a rabid animal to bite and infect one or more dogs or cats in a community. The disease develops in the domestic

signs. Third, paralysis terminating "furious" and "dumb" rabies. In the furious variety, "mad-dog" symptoms show up. The animal is irritable and will snap and bite at real or imaginary objects. It may run for miles and attack anything in its path. The animal can be extremely vicious and violent. Paralysis sets in shortly, usually affecting the hind legs first. Death follows four to seven days after the onset of these clinical signs. In "dumb" rabies, the prominent symptoms are drowsiness and paralysis of the lower jaw. The animal may appear to have something lodged in its throat, sometimes an owner may try to force open an animal's mouth to investigate and unwittingly expose themselves to rabies. Animals with "dumb" rabies may snap at movement. They are insensitive to pain, and usually become comatose and die three to ten days after the first symptoms appear.

The Winters Police Department wants to remind the public that the City of Winters Code of Ordinances requires all domestic animals within the city to be vaccinated and registered. Your local veterinarian can vaccinate your family pets and city hall can register the animals.

Special letter to the editor from Winter's ISD Superintendent

Dear Citizens of the Winters

Community, It is with great pride and enthusiasm that I write this letter to express my heartfelt appreciation for having the opportunity to serve as your new Superintendent. This past Monday, April 18, the Winters ISD Board of Trustees approved a 3-year term contract on my behalf to lead the school district. As your new Superintendent, I would like to start by

providing the community with some background information about myself, my family, and my aspirations for the district.

My name is Don Kuempel, Jr. (pronounced Kimple) and I have 24 years of experience in public education of which the past 19 years was at Hutto ISD: 12 years as an Agricultural Sciences Teacher, one year as a middle school principal, eight years as a middle school principal, and the last three years as a director of Career and Technical Education. I received both my bachelor's and master's degrees from Texas A&M University in College Station.



My wife Michelle and I have been married for 23 years in which the Lord has blessed us with two wonderful children (now young adults): Phillip, who is 22 years of age, holds a licensure in lawn irrigation design and

CUSTOMER NOTICE

On April 1, 2011 Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos Energy" or "the Company"), filed a Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") filing to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders. This filing is applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division, with the exception of the City of Dallas. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is August 15, 2011. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,196,253 residential, 98,792 commercial, and 731 industrial and transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the affected incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$13,151,685, or 1.25% percent, including gas costs, or 3.15% percent, excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code.

Based on the proposed rate design, the typical monthly bill for each customer class within the affected incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below:

**The calculation of bill impacts assumes monthly consumption of 6 Mcf for residential, 30 Mcf for commercial and 300 MMBtu for industrial and transportation customers.



Burn ban divides Commissioners Court

WNTERS - With two votes in favor and two opposed, Judge Barry Hilliard broke the tie to continue the disaster declaration in Runnels County for two weeks, prohibiting all open flame burning in the county.

Last Monday, April 25, County Commissioners held a regular meeting, among agenda items they discussed continuing the disaster declaration as proclaimed by Judge Hilliard on Tuesday, April 18.

Judge Hilliard broke the tie between Commissioners Ronald Presley and Ricky Strube voting to continue to restrict all outdoor burning, and Commissioners James Thurman Self and Robert Moore voting against.

The declaration was issued and continued due to the recent wildfires in the area and the extreme hazard conditions. This threat is caused by abundant fuel and extreme dry and windy conditions across the State of Texas and Runnels County

This declaration of a local state of disaster expired last Tuesday, April 26, but was extended by the Commissioners Court until next regular meeting.

Emergency regulations were established for all unincorporated areas of Runnels County, prohibiting all outdoor burning of any combustible material. A person violating this order may be prosecuted in accordance with the statues and procedures governing misdemeanors.


