# Lewis Bergman sworn-in Winters' Mayor

WINTERS - Lewis Bergman was elected as the new Winters' City Mayor, and was sworn-in at a ceremony held last Tuesday, May 17 at the City Hall. The newly elected officer won the mayoral race with a total of 187 votes against 118 by Rufus People, both were looking to fill the seat left vacant by former Mayor Dawson McGuffin. McGuffin didn't run

Election Day was held on Saturday, May 14. The City Election had three slots open but incumbent Aldermen Jim Lincycomb and Rene Woffenden filed for reelection and ran unopposed.

On Tuesday's meeting the City Council considered setting the time and place for the regular and special meetings. They also discussed the salary for the City Mayor and Commissioners of the Council. Rene Woffenden was appointed Mayor Pro-tem.

On Saturday, May 14, the Winters School District

also held a Board of Trustees election. In the Winters ISD election Kevin Busher was reelected for Place 6, casting 242 votes against challenger Barron Guy (227). Doug Wheat and Carla Hooper ran unopposed for places 5 and 6 respectively at the School Board.

In other elections held in Runnels County, Ballinger elected challenger Sam Mallory as the new City Mayor. Mallory defeated incumbent Joe Selby by 103 votes against 94.

In the Ballinger ISD election Single Member District 6 incumbent Dale Halfmann was reelected with 23 votes. Halfmann defeated challengers Jodi Busenlehner (19 votes) and Steve Kelly (7).

Single Member District 1 Manuel Galvan filed for re-election and ran unopposed.

In Miles, the Miles ISD School Board held an election for three places at large, candidates with most votes elected are incumbent Charles McGuire (77 votes), Todd Schwertner (66) and incumbent M. Cary Houston (61).

# Child killed in car crash near Coleman

COLEMAN - One person was killed and six were injured in a two-vehicle crash in Coleman County on Friday, May 13, at 2:35 p.m. The wreck occurred on US Highway 283 at the intersection with county Road 256.

Jarrett Paul Mantanona, 8-years-of-age, from Abilene, Texas, was pronounced dead at the scene at 3:25 p.m. by Judge Joe Watson. The body was taken to Stevens Funeral Home in Coleman, Texas.

James Morgan Gilgaer, 18, from San Saba, was driving a 2006 Dodge pick up eastbound on county Road 256. According to Texas Department of Public Safety Gilgaer failed to yield right of way at the stop intersection at US Highway 283

Matthew Paul Mantanona, 29, from Abilene, Texas, was driving a 2003 Chevrolet Cavalier southbound on US 283. The Chevrolet Cavalier struck the 2006 Dodge pick up in the left front quarter panel as the pick up drove into the

Jarret Paul Mantanona was riding in the 2003 Cavalier and was killed in the collision. All other occupants were taken to Coleman County Medical Center where they were treated for injuries and released.

Injured riding the pick up were James Morgan Gilgaer, 18; Rebekah June Wright, 19, both of San Saba, Texas; and Micah Taylor Hibler, 18, of Coleman, Texas.

Injured riding the Cavalier were Matthew Paul Mantanona, 29; Michelle Ann Mantanona, 29, and Johnathan Patrick Mantanona, 3, all of Abilene, Texas. Alcohol impairment is a suspected cause of this crash.



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#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Leap of Faith

On the Sunday evening prior to my official hiring by the school board as the new superintendent for Winters ISD, my wife Michelle and I attended the high school's encore One Act performance of "The Miracle Worker"an outstanding performance by the cast and crew! The play's main theme centers on the evolving and often challenging relationship between Helen Keller and her teacher, Anne

Most of us are familiar with the legendary story and biography of Helen Keller, who as a child was

born deaf blind and overcomes incredible odds, learning how to read, write and communicate under the guidance of Ms. Sullivan.

When Helen's parents discover that a young, idealistic and vision-challenged teacher has accepted the arduous responsibility of teaching their child, they are naturally skeptical since Ms. Sullivan had just recently graduated from college and had no previous teaching experience- any reasonable parent would have reservations! But, fortunately for Helen, both her parents agreed — with some conditions — to give Ms. Sullivan a chance to mentor and edify the exceptional, sometimes unruly, and cognitively gifted Helen.

Boy did that turn out to be a great decision, for in the coming months

through sheer determination and stubbornness, Ms. Sullivan works many miracles with Helen, making remarkable gains academically and emotional. After weeks and months of intensive individualized instruction, Helen becomes transformed into a brilliant young woman who channels her innate gifts and talents to eventually become a renowned world figurehead, accomplished author and spokesperson for handicapped and physically challenged people.

I feel somewhat connected to Anne Sullivan in that the Winters ISD Board of Trustees took a chance (and leap of faith) on an administrator with no previous superintendency experience to take the helm of their wonderful district. By no means would I ever compare myself to Ms. Sullivan or even insinuate I am anything like her, but we are alike in that we had some people who believed in us enough to give us an opportunity to prove we had the attributes and skills to do the job.

I want to express my heartfelt thanks to each of the board members for hiring and affording me the opportunity to lead the district; I am truly blessed and am very excited about the new opportunities that lay ahead for our students, staff and community.



# 'Godfather of Big Bass' to Fishing Hall of Fame

ATHENS - David L. Campbell, a 45-year employee of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Inland Fisheries Division, will be inducted into the Texas Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame at a banquet June 4 in Athens.

Campbell is currently the manager of the Toyota ShareLunker program, an angler recognition and selective breeding program designed to increase the size and frequency of trophy (13-pound or bigger) largemouth bass catches in Texas

The ShareLunker program is TPWD's most highly visible

program, gaining more media coverage annually than all other TPWD programs combined. Campbell picked up the first fish entered into the program in 1986 (from Lake Fork) and most of the more than 500 fish entered since. He has contributed a great deal to the knowledge of how best to care for big fish and has communicated this information to the public through countless interviews with newspapers, magazines, radio and television. Coming as it did at the same time catch-and-release of big bass became the norm, the impact of proper fish handling on the con-

servation of trophy bass can hardly be overestimated. Campbell started working for TPWD in 1965 as an assis-

tant at the Lewisville State Fish Hatchery and worked his way up to hatchery manager at the Tyler Fish Hatchery and later the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center. He has

ing black bass, channel catfish, blue catfish, crappie, striped bass, hybrid striped bass, northern pike, walleye, peacock bass and several sunfish and forage species. Under the direction of former TPWD Fisheries Director Bob Kemp, a former inductee into the Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame, Campbell went to Florida in 1973 to collect Florida largemouth bass for experimental breeding and growth evaluation in Texas. Trials in private waters showed that Florida bass did well in Texas. TPWD began

raised and stocked millions of fish in Texas waters includ-

breeding and stocking pure Florida bass into public waters. By the early 1980s those efforts began to pay off. The 13.5-pound state record that had existed since 1943 was broken four times in six years.

The stocking of Florida largemouth bass into Texas public reservoirs elevated trophy fishing in Texas and earned Campbell the nickname "Godfather of Big Bass. In November 1986, Mark Stevenson caught ShareLunker

Number 1, a 17.67-pound bass out of Lake Fork that shattered all previous records, garnered nationwide media coverage and changed fishing in Texas forever. Stevenson named the fish Ethel, and she became a legend among

Campbell spent every night for a month trying to get Ethel to eat. The importance of the success of that effort is enormous. In part because that fish lived, a series of events took place that had a national impact on bass fishing and a huge impact on the Texas economy.

Ethel proved to be a fish that changed the world in many significant ways. After Campbell nursed her back to health, she was put on display at what was then the only Bass Pro Shops store in the world, in Springfield, Missouri, where she pulled millions of visitors into the store. There are now more than 60 present and planned Bass Pro Shops. Founder Johnny Morris credited Ethel with much of the success of the business, saying that she was the best thing that ever happened to Bass Pro in terms of getting people into the store.

In recognition of the contribution Ethel made to his business, Morris donated \$650,000 for the construction of the Richard M. Hart and Johnny Morris Conservation Center at the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center, where the Hall of Fame banquet will be held.

Prevent tooth decay kits contain: toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, healthy teeth sticker, two minute timer (optimal brushing time), "Tips for Healthy Teeth at Any Age" educational flyer for parents in both English and Spanish, and a summary of MCFS services and grant opportunities.

According to Oral Health In America: A Report of the Surgeon General, tooth decay is the single most common chronic childhood disease — five times more common than asthma and seven times more common than hay fever. Poor children are affected by this epidemic more frequently than other children, with nearly 12 times more restricted-activity days due to dental issues than chil-

dren from higher-income families. A recent study from The Texas Kids Count Project showed more than 1.5 million Texas children living in poverty — another indicator of the great need for this type of program.

Teachers have judged both classroom performance and classroom behavior to be significantly poorer among children in need of dental care. Pain and suffering due to untreated dental disease can also lead to problems in eating and speaking.




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## Elder abuse prevention campaign

#### **Forensic Hypnosis**

Hypnosis has been around in one form or another for a very long time, but the first recorded use of techniques resembling Forensic Hypnosis was in 1845. A woman was put into a trance to try to identify a thief who stole money from a store. She gave the police a description of the thief and the direction he headed after the theft. When the police found the thief, he was so surprised that he confessed. Two of the most famous cases involving the use of Forensic Hypnosis occurred in the USA. In 1976, an entire school bus of children and their driver were kidnapped in Chowchilla, California. The victims managed to escape, but remembered very few details relating to their captors. In an attempt to gain more information the bus driver was hypnotized, during which time he was able to recall all but one of the digits of the number plate of the vehicle used in the kidnapping. As a result, of this information and other leads, the kidnappers were arrested as they tried to escape to Canada. In the San Francisco Bay area, in 1977, two girls, aged 7 and 12, were kidnapped and raped. Initially, neither could remember any significant details about the ordeal. Under hypnosis, however, the older child was able to remember rust spot patterns on the perpetrator's car along with items in the car. In addition, she recalled that they had stopped at a gas station and that a "red, white and blue" credit card had been used to pay. When the kidnapper was caught, the details of the girl's hypnotically refreshed memories were found to be accurate.

Texas is one of the few states that require practitioners to have a license and be specifically certified to conduct Forensic Hypnosis sessions.

What is Hypnosis generally?

Hypnosis is an artificially induced state of relaxation that sometimes resembles a sleep-like trance but is physiologically distinct from it. The hypnotic state is induced by a person whose suggestions are readily accepted by the subject and is often characterized by heightened suggestibility and strong mental awareness. Hypnosis is a state of mind that we use as a vehicle to communicate with the subconscious mind. In this state, the subconscious is more open and receptive to suggestions.

What is Forensic Hypnosis? Forensic Hypnosis means to investigate

**How does Hypnosis** work?

The hypnotist offers the subject a chance to respond to an idea and helps the subject concentrate their subconscious attention on a single object. By combining the power of suggestion with the power of imagination in the hypnotic state, a powerful environment is created that can be used

to obtain phenomenal results.

Who can be Hypnotized? All hypnosis is actually "self-hypnosis" therefore no one can be hypnotized who

does not want to be. 5 percent of subjects are un-hypnotizable, 45 percent can achieve a light state of hypnosis, 35 percent can achieve a medium state, 15 percent will achieve a deep state of hypnosis called "somnambulism" Myths and misconceptions of Hypnosis

Hypnosis is not mind control, a person being hypnotized does not lose control or conscious awareness, Hypnosis is not sleep, the subject can hear everything around them; a person being hypnotized is not unconscious or "zoned out", a weakminded person is not more suitable to hypnosis, in fact, it is the opposite, the more intelligent a person is the easier they can be hypnotized; a person cannot be stuck in hypnosis, Hypnosis is not mystic or dangerous, the hypnotist is not going to ask embarrassing questions or reveal any "dark secrets".

**Modern uses of Hypnosis** 

Stage or entertainment hypnosis, medical and dentistry applications, Psychotherapy or clinical hypnosis

Criminology or Forensic applications, education and personal development, relaxation and stress relief, Forensic Hypnosis is only one of the many tools used in modern policing.

#### CUSTOMER NOTICE

On April 1, 2011 Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos Energy" or "the Company"), filed a Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") filing to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders. This filing is applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division, with the exception of the City of Dallas. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is August 15, 2011. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,196,253 residential, 98,792 commercial, and 731 industrial and transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the affected incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$13,151,685, or 1.25% percent, including gas costs, or 3.15% percent, excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code.

Based on the proposed rate design, the typical monthly bill for each customer class within the affected incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below:
