Runnels County Historical Buildings The First Presbyterian Church

STAFF REPORT BALLINGER - The history of the church is the story of some pioneer trail blazers who followed the railroad into the area. It began on a particular night, July 26, 1886 when seven persons who were Presbyterians in their former locations met in the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Burt to organize, soon after the railroad town of Ballinger was founded. They closed their meeting with a prayer and went to their homes thankful at the prospects of having a church home. Mr. Burt conveyed the building site to the Trustees of the Church in June 1887 and shortly thereafter the building began on a frame building. The congregation grew and after four or five years, a larger building became necessary. The old frame building was torn down and was replaced by one of native stone. It was completed in 1891, but was not dedicated until the 29th

of October, 1892. The building included a tower and

steeple, also a bell. As the church grew, the single auditorium with its beautifully crafted ceiling became too small. In 1922 a long annex was built on the north side of the old stone building, and in 1927, another addition was made to the rear with a basement and a kitchen. The last major addition to the building was the construction of a fellowship hall in 1952. This also included the parlor, nursery and two rest rooms.

In 1984, that portion of the building was refurbished with central heating and cooling, paneling on the walls, drop ceiling, and later refurbishing the kitchen.

Gifts from members of the congregation during this time included a new entrance and foyer, an art glass window and a parking

The building as it now stands is the result of several generations building upon

the inheritance of the beautiful native stone sanctuary completed in 1891 and as the basic unit to which there have been numerous addi-

The tower and steeple were restored and were identical to the original. This church stands on a mainthrough street across Ballinger, Texas, and State Highway 158.

The gleaming copper in the sunshine reminded local people and travelers of the Texas Sesquicentennial and the 100th Birthday Celebration of both the church and the City of Ballinger.

The congregation and church has continuously been occupied and used by the succeeding congregations since its erection. It is the only church structure built in Ballinger prior to the year of 1900 of which this is true. The Recorded Texas Historical Landmark Medallion was dedicated May 16, 1963. The Texas

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USDA authorizes emergency grazing

WINTERS - In response to drought conditions, USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) authorized emergency grazing use of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres for an additional 11 Texas counties effective immediately. This authorization brings the total to 62 counties approved to graze CRP acres.

Emergency grazing of land enrolled in CRP has been authorized by the Texas FSA State Committee for Bailey, Coleman, Concho, Dallam, Gaines, Gray, Hidalgo, Randall, Runnels, Starr and Terry Counties. Emergency grazing for the above counties has been authorized through August 31, 2011

The following 51 counties were previously approved for emergency grazing of CRP acres by the national office: Armstrong, Borden, Briscoe, Brown, Carson, Castro, Cochran, Coke, Collingsworth, Cottle, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Donley, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Garza, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hardeman, Hartley, Haskell, Hemphill, Hockley, Howard, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lamb, Lipscomb, Lynn, Martin, Mitchell, Motley, Nolan, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Roberts, Scurry, Sherman, Stonewall, Swisher, Tom Green, Wheeler, Wilbarger and Yoakum Counties. Emergency grazing for the above counties has been authorized through September 30, 2011.

According to Byron Bauerlein, Runnels County

Executive Director grazing end dates differ because the current 11-county approval was granted under a different authority than that of the previously authorized 51 counties.

All current CRP emergency use authorizations permit grazing only. No haying of CRP acres is allowed at this time. Additionally, there will be a 25 percent CRP payment reduction for CRP acres used for grazing under these emergency provisions.

To take advantage of the emergency grazing provisions, authorized producers can use the CRP acreage for their own livestock or may grant another livestock producer the use of the CRP acreage. The eligible CRP acreage is limited to the acreage located within the

Eligible producers who are interested in grazing CRP under the emergency authorization and current CRP participants who choose to provide land for grazing to an eligible livestock producer, must first request approval to graze eligible acreage; obtain a modified conservation plan from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to include grazing requirements, leave at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous CRP field ungrazed for wildlife, or graze not more than 75 percent of the stocking rate as determined by NRCS.

Celebrating American Independence

Freedom Road from Colony to Country

July 4, 1776 (A Four Part History)

Great Britain began the colonization of America in 1607 with the establishment of Jamestown, Virginia. The main goal for Great Britain was to begin a partnership between British merchants and the British government in order to increase political power and private wealth. Merchants, protected by

the British government, established trade barriers, regulations, and governmental subsidies on domestic industries in order to have control over imports and exports. The emphasis was to enrich the mother country - England!

Following the 'Seven Years War'(which had nothing to do with the American colonies) the British Empire was deeply

in debt. Parliament decided to levy new taxes on the British colonies in America, and in 1767, passed the Townshend Acts to help raise revenue. The taxes were levied on items such as paper, paint, lead, etc. that were NOT produced in North America, and COULD ONLY be bought from Great Britain.

A part of the new taxes went to pay the salaries for governors and judges appointed by the British -INDEPENDENT of Colonial rule (something like 'czars in the government.) The main goal was to force compliance with British trade regulations.

The British had a superb Royal Navy and used that force to threaten other empires and insure the kets for British industry.

resistance, when some Americans, in an attempt to circumvent the restrictions imposed by British rule, took to smuggling in order to trade with the French, Spanish, and Dutch, and as they say, the British 'were not amused.'

American colonists protested, by citing the British Constitution, whereby British subjects could not be taxed without the consent of their representatives in Parliament. The American colonists viewed this as a violation of the doctrine of 'taxation without presentation.

Further colonial resistance prompted the occupation of Boston by British troops in 1768, which eventually led to the Boston Massacre of 1770. The British repealed the 'newest' taxes, EXCEPT for the tax on tea.

In 1773, Samuel Adams organized a protest in Boston Harbor. The American colonists, disguised as Indians, boarded British ships and dumped all the tea overboard. This Boston "Tea Party" was a spark waiting to be ignited into the firestorm that became the American Revolution.

COLEMAN - Coleman County Electric Cooperative will return \$300,000 in capital credits this month. Since 2008, the coop has retired in excess of one million dollars back to its member/owners. "This is the business model of an electric cooperative" says General Manager Roland Witt.

"We are a non-profit, member owned cooperative. When margins are realized that exceed operating needs and our debt obligations are met, then the Board of Directors can vote to retire capital credits. Unlike other business models that work for Wall Street, a cooperative is locally owned and is concerned about Main Street," said Witt.

Coleman County Electric Cooperative has been in existence since 1937 and provides electric service to about 8500 meters in parts of eight counties. CCEC has 3770

miles of line with 32 employees.



Approximately 385 Park University undergraduates dents received master's degrees. In addition, more than 70 students earned associate degrees.



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





San Angelo to host team roping championship

STEPHENVILLE - A sport that awards millions annually will find its way to the San Angelo when the West Texas Championships team roping, sanctioned by the United States Team Roping Championships (USTRC), comes to the First Community Credit Union Spur Arena June 9-12.

"San Angelo is the host of some of the best western events in the nation and we're glad to be counted among them," said USTRC President Kirk Bray. "This event will allow area ropers to qualify for the National Finals of Team Roping, as well as the Regional Finals to take place in Waco in August. Others interested in the sport can also come by and see what makes team roping one of the richest sports in the horse industry.'

An estimated prize package of \$200,000 will be awarded. Ropers from 14 states competed in the event in 2010, which paid nearly \$200,000 in cash to more than 1,600 teams, along with Martin Saddles and Gist Silversmiths trophy buckles.

Team ropers of all levels are expected to attend, with USTRC providing a part-

ner finding service for those in need of a partner. Events begin at 12 p.m. with the Open Thursday June 19 and follow at 9 a.m. daily throughout the weekend. The clock is stopped when the steer is secured between both ropers and their horses are facing each other.

State Soil and Water Conservation **Board elects Vice-Chairman**

TEMPLE - Marty H. Graham of Rocksprings, Texas was elected Vice-Chairman of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB) on May 26, by peer members of the board. He succeeds Barry Mahler of Iowa Park, Texas who served in that capacity for the last two years.

Graham represents TSSWCB State District 2, which consists of 51 counties in the western to trans-Pecos region of Texas. District 2 encompasses 43 Soil and Water Conservation Districts

The TSSWCB's chief responsibility is to coordinate the programs of Texas 216 SWCDs. These responsibilities includes the prevention of soil erosion, control of floods, maintenance and rehabilitation

of flood control structures, maintaining the navigability of waterways, preservation of wildlife, protection of public lands, and providing assistance to landowners with the development and implementation of soil, water and related natural resource conservation programs. In addition, the TSSWCB administers an agricultural and silvicultural non-point source pollution program to protect water quality as well as a water enhancement program to manage brush species that consume substantial quantities of water.

The TSSWCB board of directors consists of five elected members and two Governor appointees. The five TSSWCB members are elected in a convention type election by SWCD directors in the State District in which the TSSWCB mem-

ber represents.
