Auto Registration Deadline Nears

With only seven days left until the deadline for vehicle registration, approximately onethird of the passenger cars in Haskell County have not been registered according to an estimate by Jimmy Owens, County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Total passenger car registration to date is 1,794. Truck registration totals 881 of which 636 are commercial and 245 are farm trucks. Trailer registration totals 167 and farm trailer registration totals 176. Owens expects some 2,500 cotton trailers to be registered this fall.

Most farmers adapt equipment on hand for minimum tillage farming. Flex planters, coulters, and packer wheels are usually mounted on double or triple tool bar hook-ups for planting in surface mulches.

Soil Conservation Service technicians, working through the local California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts, can help farmers plan minimum tillage farming systems.

SCS has a booklet available which explains minimum tillage in detail. To get a free copy, contact the SCS field office, located at 102 North Ave. E in Haskell or write Soil Conservation Service, Box 751, Haskell, Texas 79521.



Local sorghum growers have been honored by Northrup, King & Co. for outstanding achievement during 1972. Two growers in this area have been named to membership in the per boy. 1972 NK Carload Sorghum Club,

Lee Roy Schaake harvested over two hopper cars of hybrid sorghum from 1972 plantings of NK222G. He seeded 117 acres to this NK Hybrid in June at 4 pounds per acre in 40 inch rows. Average yield for his good crop was 3,600 pounds of grain per acre. This is the second year Schaake has planted NK222G and being well pleased with both crops, he intends on planting it again next year.

Wayne Wells seeded 98.3 acres to NK222G in the spring of 1972 and in December harvested 245,360 pounds. Wells planted NK222G following a cotton crop at 3 pounds per acre in 40 inch rows. He harvested an average of 2,490 pounds of grain per acre.

Formed by Northrup, King as a means of bringing recognition to sorghum growers all over the nation, the club provides a clearing house for ideas on production techniques and offers assistance in dealing with all types of crop problems.
