Winters man shot and killed fleeing from Police

WINTERS- Jesse Daniel Torres, a 33-year-old Winters resident died last Saturday, August 20, after stealing two vehicles at gunpoint and fleeing from Winters Police Department officials, Department of Public Safety Troopers and Sweetwater law enforcement.

On Saturday evening the Winters Police Department was trying to serve a warrant on Torres on Church Street. Torres fled from the scene and took a vehicle at gunpoint on Melwood St.

According to witnesses Torres tried to take a hostage. Elsa Alvarado was at her house on Melwood Street when Torres stole a van and forced her to get into the vehicle. Alvarado escaped from the van when Torres was getting in.

The stolen vehicle belongs to Ruth Tate, who was visiting with Alvarado at that time.

The suspect took Highway 153 and fled toward Wingate, where he stole another vehicle. The van he was driving apparently overheated and stopped.

Torres stole the second vehicle, a Ford F 350 pickup truck in Wingate, at the Belew Ranch, in Wingate.

Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers joined the

chase toward Sweetwater. A Texas Higway Patrol Trooper observed the stolen pickup traveling north on Texas Highway 70, about 10 miles south of Sweetwater, Texas. The Trooper tried to stop the vehicle but the driver began to evade the officer. Stop sticks were set up near the city limits of Sweetwater, but Torres avoided the sticks and attempted to runover the assisting Trooper.

In Sweetwater the stolen pickup rear ended a vehicle and struck two utility poles before becoming disabled in a parking lot at the 1000 block of Lamar Street.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety law enforcement units approached the driver as he exited the pickup.

"The driver put his hand under his shirt and advanced toward the officers in a threatening manner, Troopers ordered the driver to the ground and to stop his aggression multiple times," said DPS spokesman Sparky Dean in a press release.

"Law enforcement officer moved to a position of cover as the suspect entered one of the Highway Patrol units, where weapons are located."

One of the Troopers and a Sweetwater Police Department officer shot the suspect. Judge Sharon Gardner pronounced the suspect dead at the scene. According to witnesses and the victims Torres had a strong smell to gasoline earlier that day.

BALLINGER- A man driving a motorcycle was struck by a pick-up truck and taken to the hospital with head injuries last Thursday, August 18, after an accident occurring at the intersection of Old Winters Highway and Broadway, in Ballinger.

Quentin Jones, of Ballinger, was riding a motorcycle at approximately 10 p.m. Jones, along with a second motorcyclist was headed southbound, coming from Old Winters Highway. The two motorcycles were stopping at the Broadway intersection when Jones' vehicle was struck from behind by a white, four-door Ford pick-up truck. Jones fell down to the pavement and sustained a head injury.

Jones was taken to Ballinger Memorial Hospital and was released later on that same night. The truck driver didn't stop and as of press time remains unidentified. Ballinger Police Department assisted the injured man and is investigating this accident.

Gerald Parks and Scott Kurtz were at Parks' saddle shop, located on Conunty Road 293, and looking out the window they saw black smoke coming from a house nearby.

Both men found their way into the property located at 1902 County Road 2111, and kicked the door down looking for possible victims of the fire and smoke.

The rescuers went through every room hearing noises, and finally got in the garage where they found the three terrified dogs

Nobody was found in the house or at the property at that time. Ballinger

Fire Department and Buddy's Plant Plus' tanker trucks spent several hours before they finally put the fire down. Apparently somebody

had been burning trash in the property.

The fire started (above) in an area nearby the house, and engulfed parts of the roof. The puppies were found harmless.

Addie B. Spraberry

Addie B. Spraberry, 100, 9 months, passed away July 4, 2011 in Abilene. Services were held on Thursday, July 7, 2011, at the First Baptist Church in Anson with Rev. C. V. Blake officiating. Burial was held in Mount Hope Cemetery in the Spraberry family plot, directed by Adams-Graham Funeral Home of Anson.

Addie B. Thomas was born October 4, 1910 at the home of her parents, southeast of Anson, Jones

County, Texas. Addie was the first child born to Nora Lee Murphy and Henry Newton Thomas. Mr. Thomas was killed by lightning in 1913, leaving two little girls and an unborn son. His wifewas soon admitted to a hospital in San Antonio; later her children moved her to a nursing home in Abilene where she died in 1977. The three young children lived with their grandfather Thomas Murphy, with Addie assuming much responsibility in the family.

Addie was a member of the Bethel Baptist Church at Funston, and had been baptized in a nearby stock tank in 1920. She had never missed Bethel Cemetery Workday each first Saturday in May through May, 2010. She later became a member of First Baptist Church, Abilene, Texas, where she sang with the Majestic Sounds, the senior adult choir.

Addie B. Thomas and Riley Richard Spraberry were married on January 11, 1930 and farmed in the Harmony and Antelope Communities for many years. In 1949, they moved to the Noodle Community. Farming was not profitable those years, and Addie and some of the neighbor women drove into Abilene to sew at Lankfords. She made \$15 a day for several years. Riley suffered a heart attack and passed away while checking his cotton field on June13, 1967. After Riley's death, Addie moved to Abilene and enrolled in the Taylor School of Nursing in the fall of 1970. Addie was a very caring and compassionate lady and served as a caregiver for several prominent Abilene families until she was 80.

Addie said at her 100th birthday party, that she had lived her life doing for others. Whenever there was a need in family or friends, she was there, caring, loving and nurturing. She moved to Covenant Place, Abilene in 2001. She considered this home, and had many friends there, becoming very close with the girls there. She then moved to Wisteria Place Nursing Center in June, 2011. Preceding in death was a special grandson, Tony Alan Montgomery in 2000. Also preceding her in death were her brother Henry Thomas in 1967, her sister Molly Nix in1990, a son-in-law Raymond W. Schwartz in 1992 and agreat granddaughter, Lola Smith in 2005.



"Dove hunting over a water source should be excellent," said Corey Mason, TPWD dove program leader. "Additionally, dove may be concentrated on food sources, so if you can find a stand of sunflower, goat weed, etc., hunting should be productive. Native food sources are going to be more important this year because agricultural crops aren't as good as years past."

Biologists say the drought will have some impacts on dove populations, with the greatest being on juveniles. However, they do not expect significant impacts to what hunters will see this fall. Texas boasts fall dove populations in excess of 40 million birds and its 300,000 dove hunters harvest about 6 million birds annually or roughly 30 percent of all doves taken in the United States.

Texas dove season in the North and Central Dove Zones will run from Thursday, September 1 through Sunday, October 23 and reopen Friday, December 23 through Sunday, January 8.

Compact imparts success

WINTERS- Cheery smiles and spirit-ed laughter clamored throughout the cafeteria this past Thursday evening signaling the start of another school year and the waning days of almost every child's favorite season, summer. As young and older students anxiously gathered in the cafeteria for a hot dog supper, Superintendent Don Kuempel welcomed the crowd by proclaiming his thoughts on why this will be the best school year ever. He went on to recognize the princi-pals and trustees present and spoke briefly on the importance of parent involvement; particularly, the importance of forming a partnership (compact) with parents to help their child or children be successful in school. Intuitively, experience and research strongly indicate a significant gain in student learning and achievement occurs when parents are actively involved- even better, engaged- in their child's education.

"We do not live in a fairy-tale culture when it comes to the traditional nuclear family, consisting traditionally of two children, a stay-at-home mom, and a working dad...and the shaggy dog. The reality is most of our students either come from single-parent homes or live in homes where both parents work in which they have to constantly juggle the voluminous demands of work and parenting," said Kuempel.

For most working parents, time becomes a major influence in determining the amount (and quality) of time spent with their child to help them with their school work and school projects. Regardless of the home situation and environment, every parent plays a critical role in the education of their child.

"I genuinely believe parents do want what is best for their child. I have never once met a parent in my

Area cotton field tours to be held in September

SAN ANGELO – The Texas AgriLife Extension Service will conduct two cotton field events in September, but there will be a change caused by the ongoing drought, organizers said.

The annual Tom Green County Cotton Field Tour is slated for 9 a.m. Sept. 15 on the John and Doug Wilde farm. However, lack of a cotton crop has caused the Runnels County tour to be scaled back to a turnrow meeting set for 8 a.m. Sept. 16 on the Paul Minzenmayer Farm.

The Wilde farm is just north of the intersection of Loop 306 and Farm-to-Market Road 765, east of San Angelo. The Minzenmayer farm is on the south side of U.S. Highway 67 near Halfmann's Garage, southwest of Ballinger.

Rick Minzenmayer, AgriLife Extension entomologist for Runnels and Tom Green counties, said the Tom Green County tour will include an irrigated cotton variety test, a harvest-aid trial and a look at an ongoing cotton root rot study. The tour will end with a Texas Department of Agriculture presentation on laws and regulations, a Boll Weevil Eradication Program update and a complimentary meal at the St. Ambrose Catholic Church in Wall.

Three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units -- two general and one laws and regulations -will be available for those attending the entire tour.

The Runnels County turnrow meeting will consist of talks on cotton varieties along with wheat varieties to be considered for planting during the upcoming fall smallgrain season. Minzenmayer said.

Two general continuing education units will be available. Complimentary burritos and drinks will be provided.

The annual Earth-Kind Landscape Design School classes are scheduled from 6:30-9 p.m. Sept. 19, 20, 26 and 27 at the Tom Green 4-H Center, 3168 N. U.S. Highway 67. The school also includes a 30-minute individual consultation to assist participants with design or plant material questions.

"This year's course theme is 'Drought Survival and Recovery,' and our aim will be to help homeowners get their landscapes back on track with hardy plant materials that are truly miserly when it comes to water use," said Allison Watkins, AgriLife Extension horticulturist in Tom Green County and the school's coordinator.

"A good landscape can be functional and attractive, but unfortunately, many landscapes have suffered damage



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

Tiny ants can be big bother

WINTERS ENTERPRISE STAFF REPORT

Pharaohs and rovers sighted in homes throughout South Central Texas! No, it's not a tabloid headline. These two diminutive ant species can be a big bother for many, said Texas AgriLife Extension Service

experts. These ants typically become more active in the summer," said Wizzie Brown, integrated pest management specialist for AgriLife Extension in Travis County. "Though pharaoh ants and rover ants are different species, both types of ant are very small and move single-file in a row, so it's easy to be confused. Brown said that rover ants are darker — a dark brown or almost black color as opposed to the pharaoh ant's orange or rust color. Also, rovers are outdoor ants that come indoors searching for food and

water — an activity that has become more prevalent with the region's prolonged drought.

"Pharaoh ants are also known as sugar ants due to their preference for sugary or sweet foods, and are also called pissants," she

'said. While rover ants come indoors from the outside, pharaoh ants are already in the home, and only need a little encouragement to come out, Brown said. "The pharaoh ant is really about the only ant you can call a strictly urban ant in that it usually lives indoors, making its home behind walls or under appliances or carpet," said Molly Keck, integrated pest management specialist in Bexar County. "They're often found going into or coming out of the cover plates of electrical outlets. The outlets make it easier for them to access interior walls and they can use the wires as their super-highway to your kitchen or bathroom.' Rover ants typically make their home in the leaf litter on roofs or in gutters or under rocks, stones or concrete, she added. "While rover ants will eat sweet foods when they get really hungry, they seem to be most attracted to foods containing protein, such as dog food or meat," she said. Like other ants, rover ants that invade homes will often nest in damp interior walls around plumbing or near leaky window sills.

Keck said the diminutive size of both species makes them relatively unobtrusive – unless moving en masse in a long trail across a household surface — and that neither species has much of a bite.

Still, most people consider the ants a pest and are interested in ways to control them, Brown noted.

'Ant baits are the best method of control for both types," Brown said. Typically there are only liquid baits or bait stations labeled for indoor use to control pharaoh ants, so you shouldn't go putting a pile of ant bait in your kitchen or bathroom," Keck warned. Keck said she prefers to use a solid bait to control pharaoh ants and a gel or liquid bait to control rover ants. "For better pest control, you should seal any cracks or openings around windows and doors as well as other possible points of entry. Outdoors, remove the remnants of any uneaten dog food, and trim the grass touching your house and the branches touching your roof. Indoors, remove food sources - bread, cakes, chips, etc. - from kitchen surfaces and clean those surfaces thoroughly before using the bait. **Removing alternative** food sources makes the ant bait more appealing to the ants. "But if the ants don't seem to be eating the bait, you may want to try a dif-
