COUNTY LIFTS BURN BAN

Shower brings a little relief

BALLINGER- Due to the recent rains in Runnels County and the surrounding area, County Judge Barry Hilliard lifted the burn ban last Monday, October 10, effective immediately. After several months under the burn ban some farmers and ranchers took advantage of the new measure immediately, for agricultural and cleaning purposes.

Due to the intense drought Runnels County had been under burn ban almost constantly since November of 2010. Last Sunday, October 9, 2011 the evening rains ranged from 2.5 to 4 inches in and around Runnels County.

The rains provided a break to one of the worst droughts in recorded history, which has filled the fields with plenty of dry grass, trees and all kinds of highly flammable material.

Other than last weekend's the most recent rains in the area date back to Saturday August 13, when a continuous and steady shower brought water during about four hours. On Sunday, August 14, a quick shower lasting about 30 minutes also poured in the thirsty land. According to the National Weather Service office in San Angelo, the Ballinger station registered a total of 2.02 inches during that weekend.

In 2010 the Ballinger station recorded 21.86 inches from January until December. The last considerable amount of rain in the area was recorded during the month of September 2010, with 3.47 inches.

This year Ballinger and the region have registered some showers and thunderstorms but none of them has contributed to raise the precipitation ratings.

In 2011 just three measurable storms have brought a considerable amount of rain to the area. On Wednesday, May 11, a morning storm dropped about 2 inches of rain.

RCHC hosts dedication for Lutheran Cemetery

WINTERS- The Historic Texas Cemetery Dedication Ceremony for the Lutheran Cemetery, Winters, Texas was held Sunday afternoon, October 9, 2011 at the St. John's Lutheran Church Education Building.

The ceremony began with the Master of Ceremonies, Ruth Cooper opening and the Rev. Alsen Wenzel, Pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church offering the Invocation. Allen Andrae, Church Chairman brought the welcome. Naomi Gerhart lead the singing of Amazing Grace and My Country 'Tis Of Thee. Frances Bredemeyer presented a brief history.

Frederick (Fritz) Bredemeyer and his wife came to Runnels County from Williamson County in the fall of 1899 with 10 children, ranging in age from one year to 24 years of age. The wife and children traveled in three covered wagons and a buggy while Fritz rode on the train with the livestock. Three more children were born to them after they settled on 640 acres a few miles west of Winters. They were charter members of St. John's Lutheran Church, that was established in November of 1904. In 1916, the Bredemeyers donated two acres of land for a Lutheran Cemetery (reserving one-fourth of it for Bredemeyer descendants).

The rock fence and trees were added under the direction of the Rev. C. N. Roth, the church pastor at that time. Ruth Cooper presented the Certificate of Designation and the person keeping records. The Rev. Alsen Wenzel closed with a brief devotional and the Benediction. There were approximately 30-35 attending the event.

Don't be blind-sided: Turn around

Imagine driving seeing a lonely pedestrian walking down the street or a slovenly dressed person standing on a street corner and the person sitting next to you stares at you and in a benevolent tone says, "Turn around." How would you react? Well, if you are like most Americans (as well as myself) we press the gas pedal even harder to quickly further ourselves to escape the image... and responsibility. These two seemingly simple words "turn around" sometimes cast a feeling of guilt, but typically only for a short period of time as we have learned to divert our attention to other important matters like what to cook for dinner or I wonder who the Cowboys are playing this Sunday.

By now, most Americans have seen the popular family movie The Blind Side. In the movie, a transient African American teenager of Goliath proportion (6'6" 350 lbs.) is seen wandering aimlessly down a rough urban neighborhood during school hours by a couple driving down the street. After the wife spots the ambling youth, she adamantly demands her husband to "turn around". Well, he like most of us ignores her plea and continues to drive until he ultimately caves in to her demand and he turns the vehicle around.

As the rest of the plot unfolds, the couple- the Touhys go on to adopt the gregariously charming young man, Michael Oher, and he goes on to become a local football phenomenon, enamoring the heart of the Toehy family and whole the community. This past weekend, six members of the Winters ISD Board of Trustees attended the Texas Association of School Board (TASB) Conference in Austin and were privileged to hear conference keynote speakers Leigh Ann and Sean Touhy give a behind the scenes tale of the making of The Blind Side. The Touhys gave a very compelling account of Michael's reclusive and hard upbringing and his rise to football fame stardom in which he plays professionally for the Baltimore Ravens. But the main point of the Touhy's speech is not so much about this exceptionally bright and talented young man, it is about getting out of our comfort zone and selflessly offering ourselves to make a difference in someone else's life. We as a loving, caring Christian community have an opportunity each day to "turn around" and help others in their time of need.

Now, I am not saying we have to literally adopt a stray teenager; rather, what I am saying is we need to think of those less fortunate in our community and reach out to them by giving our time and resources. Turn around: We have several Michael Oher's living in Winters. You can make a difference, one child at a time. WISD improves communication

WINTERS- In our effort to improve communication, October 10, 2011, Winters ISD will implement a telephone broadcast system that will enable campus and district administrators to notify all households and individuals by phone within minutes of an emergency or unplanned event. The service may also be used from time-to-time to communicate general announcements or reminders. This service is provided by SchoolReach, a company specializing in effective communications.

When used, the service will call phone numbers in our selected contact lists and will deliver a recorded message from a campus or district administrator. The service will deliver the message to both live answer and answering machines. Unanswered calls (phones ringing over 40 sec.) and busy calls will be automatically retried twice in a 15-minute intervals after the initial call.

Please note the following: 1) This requires no registration by the recipient, the contact list is pulled from our current enrollment information. Please make sure all contact numbers are up to date at your child's school. 2) All information and contact numbers are strictly secure and confidential and are only used for the purposes described above.

Here is some specific information you should know:

Caller ID: The Call ID will display 325-754-5574, which is the main number for Winters ISD.

Live Answers: There is a short pause at the beginning of the message, usually a few seconds. Answer your phone as you normally would; "hello" and hold for the message to begin. Multiple "hellos" will delay the message. Inform all family members who answer your phone of this process.

Answering Machines: The system will detect that your machine has answered and will play the recording to your machine. The system will ring for up to 40 seconds before it determines the call is an unanswered. Make sure that your machine answers before the fourth rings or you may miss the message.

Message Repeat: At the end of the message you will be prompted to 'press any key' to hear the message again. This is very helpful when someone other than the intended recipient initially answers, allowing the recipient to then 'repeat' the message in its entirety.

If you ever feel you may have missed the Winters ISD SchoolReach voice message or just want to check to be sure, you can dial our Message Retrieval Line. From the phone(s) you want to check for messages to, dial toll-free: 855-955-8500 and follow the prompts to hear any/all messages sent through SchoolReach over the last 30 days.

Feral hog dilemma to be addressed at SWCD meeting

TEMPLE- The feral hog dilemma in Texas seems to be a curse that won't go away, but rather seems to be intensifying. Dr. Billy Higginbotham, Extension Specialist, Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center at

Overton, will speak to SWCD directors attending the 71st Annual Meeting of Soil and Water Conservation Districts about the current feral hog problem in the state. The annual meeting which draws some 600 conservation district officials from over the state will

be held October 24-26 in San Antonio at the Hyatt Regency Hill Country Resort.

Dr. Higginbotham will talk about current research supporting control efforts with respect to the feral hog dilemma in Texas in an afternoon workshop on Tuesday,

October 25. He will also talk about the reasons behind the current feral hog population levels in the state as well as the legal control methods and best management practices associated with each method. The characteristics of damage caused by the hogs will also be

addressed.

According to a recent study by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, Texas A&M University Institute for Renewable Natural Resources, about 134 million acres, or 79 percent of the state's total of 170 million acres is feral hog habitat.

TAHC accepting comments on proposals

AUSTIN- The Texas Animal Health Commission is currently accepting public comments on rule proposals that were authorized during the September 20 Commission meeting.

The Commission proposed amendments to Chapter 33, entitled "Fees, Lab Fees." The proposed amendments are for the purpose of assessing fees related to testing performed by the State-Federal Laboratory System in Texas, which is operated by the commission. It will be a new section identified as 33.4 and entitled "Laboratory Fees." This rule may be commented on until 5 p.m. on Monday, November 7, 2011, thirty days after the rule has been filed with the Texas Register.

The commission also proposed amendments to Chapter 33, entitled "Fees, Herd Certification." The proposed amendments are for the purpose of assessing and collecting fees for services related to the commission creating, maintaining, and/or validating disease free certification or status programs. Examples of such programs include brucellosis free herd programs for cattle and swine, and chronic wasting disease monitoring programs for cervids. It will be a new section identified as 33.5 and entitled "Herd Disease Free Status Fees." The proposed fee will be \$100 for each certificate or status approved or renewed and issued by the Commission. This rule may also be commented on until 5 p.m. on Monday, November 7, 2011, 30 days after the rule has been filed with the Texas Register.

Lastly, the Commission also proposed amendments to Chapter 53, entitled, "Market Identification." The proposed amendments are for the Section 53.4 entitled "Market Identification" to require that livestock market personnel apply permanent identification to specific species and classes of adult cattle or record existing identification on the cattle as well as ensure that the information is recorded in a manner prescribed by the Commission.

Blizzards rebound and they make it big

WINTERS- The Winters Blizzards would rebound from last week's loss with an outstanding first quarter in route to a 46-21 District win over the Eldorado Eagles at Blizzard Stadium. It was as if the Blizzards had felt they had something to prove Friday night and set out to prove it. Finally given the opportunity to get on the field the Blizzard defense rose to the occasion with three and outs and fumble recoveries to give the offense the ball in good shape while the offense put 20 points on the board in the first quarter.

To get the coming out party started the Blizzards would kickoff setting the Eagles up at their own 24. It would not take long to show that the Blue and White meant business. It was a quick three and out facing fourth and eight. The punt was touched down at the Eagle 43. The Blizzard offense did not take long to reach pay dirt. Cristian Sandoval did the honors with a 10 yard run for the points with less than 4 minutes gone in the quarter. Lucas Kraatz' extra point was good for the 7-0 lead with 8:32 left in the first.

The next Eagle possession would get started at their own 15 and would not last long as AC Mata pounced on the loose ball at 10 yard line. It also would not take long with such a short field for Sandoval to reach the end zone again with a three yard run. The extra point was missed and the Blizzards held a 13-0 lead with only 3 minutes gone in the contest.

The ensuing kickoff set the Eagles up at their own

21. Enter the Blizzard defense and another three and out results. Facing fourth and eight the punt set the home team up near midfield and here we go again. Riley Ripley would find Andy Garcia for 17 and Hayden Nitsch got 23 on two carries. Sandoval finished the drive with a 4-yard run and Kraatz' was good on the extra point for a 20-0 lead with 4:32 still left in the first quarter.

The visitors would set up at their own 26 after the kickoff. This drive would be cut short as Cannon Bryan found the loose

ball giving the Blizzards the ball at the Eagle 41. This drive would not have the success of the others as penalties in key situations created hardships and after three first downs the Blizzards turned the ball over on downs at the Eagle 14. The drive also brought the first quarter to an end with the Blizzards up 20-0.

After another three and out the visitors would face fourth and 12 and be forced to punt giving the Blizzards the ball at the Eagle 38. It would only take three plays to cover

the distance. Chris Gerhard picked up 12 on first down and Ripley would finish it off with a 23 yard run after a short gain by Fermin Cruz and with 7:57 left in the half the Blizzards led 26-0 after a blocked extra point.

Eldorado answered after setting up at the Blizzard 45 with a 30 yard TD pass and extra point that only took 40 seconds cutting the lead to 26-7 for the Blizzards.

The Blizzards would answer with a 9-play drive that would end with Nitsch doing the honors

from 11 yards out to give the home team a 33-6 lead with only 3:39 left in the half. Lucas Kraatz' extra point was good for a 33-7 lead. Sandoval would carry six times for 47 yards to highlight the drive.

Riley Ripley would end the next Eagle possession with interception turning the ball over to the offense at the Eagle 28. The ensuing drive would use to 10 plays to run out the clock and end the half with the Blizzards up 33-7.

With halftime adjustments made and teams back on the field the

Blizzards would receive and set up at their own 35. In short order the Blizzards would pad their lead as Nitsch scampered 43 yards for the TD. The extra point was blocked and the Blizzards held a 39-7 lead with 10:53 left in the third quarter. Again the visitors would turn the ball over after setting up near mid field. This time it was Nitsch on the spot with the interception. The possession would end with the Blizzards facing fourth and 14 and the punt would set the visitors up at their own 44. The Blizzards defense closed the door this time and left the visitors facing fourth and 10 and a decision to go for it. The Eagles would turn the ball over on downs and give the Blizzards the ball at the Eagle 44. With little success the drive would end with a punt setting the visitors at their own five. The first play from scrimmage would create some excitement as AC Mata created a fumble and Roger Wright scooped it up and waltzed into the end zone for the final Blizzard score of the night. Lucas Kraatz' extra point was good and the Blizzards led 46-7.

The fourth quarter proved to be an opportunity for the Blizzard reserves to get some playing time. The Eagles would push two scores across as the contest came to an end and the result would be a 46-21 Blizzard victory that really was not as close as it appeared as the Blizzards would rush for 379 yards and threw for another 65 producing 25 first downs while giving up only 7 first downs. Hayden Nitsch carried the ball 10 times for 147 and Cristian Sandoval carried 13 for 122.
