LLANO- My great granddad was a water well digger and my granddad used to tell me stories about how cold it could get in February but he did not say anything about the feeling of ending football season in the middle of November. The Blizzard faithful had to face the cold hard facts on Saturday night in Marble Falls as the Comanches of Shiner ended one of the Blizzard's best football seasons in a long time 42-14 in a game that certainly ranks as one of the windiest and coldest in a long while.

Shiner won the toss and chose to defer to the second half giving the option to the Blizzards to get things going. Winters elected to receive. The kickoff and return set the Blizzards up at their own 16. With little success Big Blue faced fourth and 14 and punted

to end their first possession. Shiner opened up the game with a fumble on their second play which Cristian Sandoval pounced on and gave the Blizzards great field position at the Shiner 32. Riley Ripley would pick up 17 on first down and Sandoval would come through on third and 19 with 23 yards and a critical first down. Ripley would then find Strait Daniel for the final 19 yards of the drive on third and 12 for the touchdown. The extra point was missed but the Blizzards held the lead at 6-0 with 6:23 left in the first quarter.

After setting up at their own 33 the Comanches would find the end zone quickly with a 65 yard touchdown pass and run with 4:30 left in the first quarter. The extra point was good for a 7-6 Shiner lead. The Blizzards would find little to cheer about on the next drive and be forced to punt facing fourth and 6. Three plays later Shiner would strike up the band again with a 39 yard run to increase their lead to 14-6 with the extra point with 1:28 left in the first stanza.

The kickoff set the Blizzards up at their own 20 yard line and they were able to string together a couple of first downs only to be forced to punt just before the end of the quarter. The punt set the Comanches up at

their own 45 and they moved ball with ease only to put it on the ground again where Andy Garcia would pick it up in stride and ramble 82 yards to pay dirt to get the

on the board again.
Ripley would find Garcia wide open in the end zone for the 2 point conversion to tie the score at 14 with

second quarter.

With things getting tight the Blizzards kicked off to the Comanches and set them up at their own 35. With the Blizzards missing a key part of their defense, Hayden Nitsch

their defense, Hayden Nitsch with a broken ankle, Shiner began to consistently capitalize with the toss sweep for good yardage.

This possession they put together an eight play 65 yard drive

to score with 8:00 still left in the half for a 20-14 lead.
Neither team could put together a complete drive for the remainder of the half. Kolton Alexander provided the Blizzard faithful with happiness as he fell on a Comanche fumble to set

the Blizzards up at the Shiner 45 with 3:42 left in the half. The Blizzards could not capitalize on this turnover and were forced to punt near the end of the half. With seconds left Shiner elected to kill the ball and take their 20-14 lead into the locker room for half time.

The second half proved to be all Shiner as the Comanches would score three more times to bring the score to the final margin of 42-14 but not without a fight a fight that would show the class that the Blizzards had handled themselves with all year long. It is easy to show good character when you win but not so easy when things do not go your way. All year long this Blizzard team had shown class whether winning or not and things were not to change on a cold and windy Saturday night in Marble Falls. I am still proud to be a Blizzard fan. I would like to thank the players, coaching staff for a great year and the privilege of being on the sidelines with you. I have no idea how to watch a football game from the stands.

Thanksgiving brings rain as gift for winter pastures

COLLEGE STATION- Rain came to large parts of Texas, an early Thanksgiving feast for already planted winter pastures, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service personnel.

Though welcome, the rain came too late for droughthammered summer pastures, many of which are in sad shape, according to AgriLife Extension county agent

For example, before the rain, Pasquale Swaner, AgriLife Extension agent for Falls County, near Waco, reported that while "driving throughout the county, pastures are the worse than anyone can imagine. A large portion are just grazed to dirt.'

However, the rain will certainly help winter pastures, and eventually it will be good for warm-season pastures too, said Dr. Vanessa Corriher, AgriLife Extension forage specialist in East Texas.

"For pastures that have been grazed down, it's going to take them a long time to recover," Corriber said. "Most of those forages, our warm-season perennials, are going into dormancy as we get cooler temperatures. We're not going to see any recovery until we get

But for many of those producers who planted winter pastures earlier, the rains came just in time, she said.

"Whether it's a cool-season annual ryegrass, or some small grains or any cool-season legume, the moisture will help those forages to potentially provide some grazing," she said.

Though it's highly recommended to fertilize winter pastures, the timing is a bit off, Corriber said. Her standard recommendation is to wait until around the middle of November, but after the first freeze to ensure all warm-season pastures have entered dormancy. East Texas hasn't had any frosts yet.







Assessing pine and shade tree damage from drought

WINTERS ENTERPRISE

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Texas remains mired in one of the worst droughts in state history and it's creating disastrous effects on trees and forests across the state.

After one of the driest years on record, many shade trees went into dormancy as early as August, dropping their leaves and branches in a desperate act of selfpreservation. Pine trees with normally thick, green crowns ended up cloaked in red, dead needles while foliage on cedar trees turned completely brown.

The sight has created a dramatic effect on the Texas landscape and left many landowners wondering whether or not their tree is dead — or if it might recov-

er and produce new leaves next spring.
Assessing trees damaged or killed by drought can be tricky, according to Dr. Ronald Billings, Texas Forest Service Forest Health Manager. He suggests grouping the trees into three different categories — definitely dead, likely to live and questionable — to help with the task. Definitely Dead

It is easier to make this call for pines, Ashe junipers (cedars) and other needlebearing, conifer trees. The determination can be more difficult for hardwoods, which are more commonly thought of as shade trees. In most cases, a red pine is a dead pine, Billings said, explaining that the same can be said for cedars with red

needles. Once all or most of the foliage of a pine or cedar tree turns red or brown,

the tree is incapable of recovering. Pine trees in this stage probably are already infested with tree-killing bark beetles and will eventually harbor woodboring insects, termites and other critters. Such trees should be cut down and removed, particularly if they are likely to fall on homes, buildings or power lines.

Shade trees - like water oaks, for example — that have lost all their foliage and are beginning to drop limbs or lose large patches of bark are most likely already dead and should be removed. Hypoxylon canker, a fungus that appears as gray or brown patches on the trunk of the tree, is another sign of a dead shade tree.

Likely to Live

This category includes shade trees with at least some green or yellow leaves still attached to the limbs. In fact, even those that have dropped all their leaves may still be alive. Some native shade trees, such as post oaks and live oaks, are more drought resistant than others like water oaks or elms.

You can use a scratch test to determine if the tree is dead or just dormant. If you scrape the bark off a small branch or limb and find green, moist tissue underneath, the tree is still hanging on, waiting for the next rain. That means you may need to wait until spring to see if the tree makes a recovery.

Concho water snake no longer endangered species

On October 27, 2011 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced the delisting of the Concho Water

Snake from the Endangered Species list effective November 28, 2011.

To mark the occasion, Rep. Conaway hosted a "Thank You" ceremony for the countless number of individuals who dedicated their time and energy over the last 20 years to make this accomplishment possible.

The Concho water snake is delisted from the endangered species protection after 25 years. The Concho water

snake, a reptile endemic to Central Texas, was listed as threatened in 1986 after a 1984 population study estimated its numbers were between 330 and 600.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife agreed to delist the Concho water snake after reviewing information that shows threats to the snake have been reduced or eliminated. Furthermore, all criteria in the snake's recovery plan have been met.


