Rain greens up winter crops WINTERS ENTERPRISE STAFF REPORT

COLLEGE STATION - Many areas received rain, but the general consensus from weekly reports by Texas AgriLife Extension Service county agents was that more is needed to keep wheat and winter pas-

tures going. The U.S. Drought Monitor backs up these ob-servations. As of Jan. 3, the monitor still showed nearly 70 percent of the state as being under severe to extreme drought. However, this is an improvement over the situation at the beginning of October when 97 percent of the state was under severe to extreme drought.

The areas that have seen the most relief are the Panhandle and the central and northeast parts of the state, but even these areas remain mostly under moderate drought conditions.

Still, producers who have seen a lessening of the drought are grateful for the moisture and are capitalizing on it, according to AgriLife Extension agents. "The winter wheat

crop has had a good shot in the arm with the recent moisture events, but it is a long time to spring," said Rick Auckerman, AgriLife Extension agent for Deaf Smith County in the western Panhandle. "There is much discussion on what to plant for this spring: reduced corn acres and making up the acreage with cotton or possibly grain sorghum with the extended forecast being short on rainfall. Pastures for the stocker cattle are in very short supply, leaving cattlemen to supplement with hay or silage if possible." "Winter wheat is trying to hold on, but more moisture is needed. Heavy supple-mental feeding is being done on remaining cattle herds," said Kevin Brendle, AgriLife Exten-sion agent for Dickens County, east of Lub-bock. "Lots of produc-ers sold most of their cattle in the summer." "Wow! What a difference a little rain makes," said Philip Shackelford, AgriLife Extension agent for Austin County, west of Houston. "Since the beginning of December, Austin County has collected over 6 inches of rain countywide and more is expected through the end of Jan. 9. Cool-season grasses have really responded to mild temperatures and good soil moisture, while winter legume fields are looking very good and most cattle producers have turned in on them to graze. The sell-off and total liquidation of many cattle herds has come to an abrupt halt as ranchers take a wait-and-see attitude before selling."

Edwards aquifer plan reconciles species with stakeholders

SAN ANTONIO- The Edwards Aquifer Recovery Implementation Program has overcome the final hurdle in resolving a long-standing struggle to balance the protection of endangered species with water use in the Edwards Aquifer, according to the program's coordinator.

"The Edwards Aquifer Authority Board of Directors recently approved a funding and management agreement to implement a habitat conservation plan for the Edwards Aquifer," said Robert Gulley, Texas A&M Institute of Renewable Natural Resources program coordinator for the Edwards Aquifer Restoration Implementation Plan. "The plan is focused on protecting threatened and endangered species whose only known habitats are the aquifer-fed Comal and San Marcos springs.

At its Dec. 13 meeting the Edwards Aquifer Authority board had approved the conservation plan, which was developed by the recovery implementation program stakeholder group over the past 4 and a half years.

"The plan will protect the Edwards Aquifer, a major groundwater system in Texas serving approximately 2 million people, and contribute to a stable water supply for the region while protecting the endangered species," Gulley said.

The Edwards Aquifer Recovery Implementation Program is a collaborative, consensus-based stakeholder process coordinated through the Institute of Renewable Natural Resources, which is headquartered in College Station.

The institute conducts interdisciplinary research and technology transfer, policy and economic analysis, and engagement with land managers and policy makers to improve natural resource management. Institute



water programs encourage secure and sustainable water resources for humans and wildlife through watershed restoration, land conservation and policy innovation.

According to the aquifer authority, the funding and management agreement details how their organization, with participation from the cities of New Braunfels, San Marcos and San Antonio through the San Antonio Water System, along with Texas State University in San Marcos, will pay for implementing the conservation plan.

The plan marks the first time that area stakeholders have reached a consensus resolution to the regional conflicts between species protection and Edwards Aquifer pumping that have existed for decades," Gulley said.

Gulley added that conflict related to aquifer water use has been ongoing for about 50 years and the plan's approval by the aquifer authority "marks the final chapter in that dispute.

'As a result, the region will now have certainty about its use of the aquifer, control of the aquifer and the aquifer will be managed at a regional level rather than by the federal government," he said. According to Gulley, under state law the Edwards Aquifer Authority must implement a program by Dec. 31, 2012.



THC marker program reaches historical landmark

WINTERS- The Texas Historical Commission is celebrating 50 years of placing official Texas Historical Markers in historically significant locations throughout the state. This makes the marker program itself eligible for historic recognition.

The first aluminum marker in the state was placed January 14, 1962 in Tyler at Camp Ford, a Confederate Prisoner of War Camp. The next marker was a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark Medallion placed in Gonzales March 4 of that same year. The landmark was the Eggleston House, a restored 1840s cabin.

The historical markers have been a part of the Texas landscape since the 1800s. The Texas Centennial Commission placed more than 1,100 markers and monuments in 1936. The markers/monuments were placed to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Texas Revolution and the establishment of the Republic of Texas. Since 1962 the marker program is a popular means of interpreting local and state history. The program also encourages heritage tourism.

The program commemorates the history and architecture of buildings, events that changed local and state history and individuals who have made a contribution to the state. The state commemorated a historical site in 1856 by marking graves at the San Jacinto battleground. The Legislature bought an existing Alamo monument in 1858. It was built in 1841 with stones from the battle site. The 10-foot high pyramid was designed by William Nangle and Joseph Cox of San Antonio. The pyramid was on a square pedestal to be portable. It traveled to Houston, New Orleans and Austin. The state acquired the monument and moved it to the Capitol. It was destroyed in the 1881 fire that razed that building.

Heroes of the Alamo was the first official state historical monument. It was dedicated on the south side of the newly built Texas State Capitol in 1891. The money came from state funding designated 10 years earlier. The pink granite monument, designed by James S. Clark of Louisville, Kentucky and Carl Smith of Denmark designed the bronze soldier holding a muzzleloader. Other monuments were placed on the Capitol grounds during the late 19th and 20th centuries. In 1894, the State of Texas dedicated a monument at the gravesite of Thomas J. Rusk in Nacogdoches. The gray granite, 26 foot obelisk, was designed by the Brenham

firm of Jaeggli and Martin. The inscription reads: "Erected by the State of Texas to the Memory of Thomas J. Rusk Who Fought for Her Liberty at San Jacinto-He Lived for Texas."

The Texas State Library and Historical Commission were created by the Legislature in 1909. The 1910s were active for commemorating history in Texas and is considered the beginning of a century of statewide markers and monuments. In 1910, the state commissioned three monuments by San Antonio Sculptor Pompeo Coppini. Hood's Brigade at the State Capitol in Austin, Come and Take It, or the Texas Heroes Monument, in Gonzales, and the grave of Sam Houston in Huntsville.

In 1911, the 32nd Legislature appropriated money to memorialize both the Father of Texas and the first woman to receive an official marker. Ten thousand dollars was set aside for Stephen F. Austin's grave at the Texas State Cemetery in Austin and 2,000 for the grave of Elizabeth Crockett, wife of Alamo defender David Crockett at Acton in Hood County dedicated June 1913.

From 1915-1918, the State of Texas and the Daughter's of the American Revolution placed 123 pink granite markers about every 5 miles along the King's Highway, also known as Camino Real or Old San Antonio Road, the trail was blazed in 1690 by Alonso de Leon. The surveyor V. N. Zively mapped the route through South, Central and East Texas. Most markers are still intact.

The late 1920s and early 1930s, historian and author Louis W. Kemp found grave sites of dozens of forgotten individuals of the Texas Revolution and Republic of Texas. Kemp coordinated reinterment of several of these patriots to the Texas State Cemetery and for them and others in their original graves, the state erected gray or pink granite monuments. Some names of the honored were Anderson, Calder, Caldwell, Ochiltree and Coleman. Lorenzo de Zavala, a Tejano and first Vice-President of the Republic of Texas and David Kaufman, who served in the Texas and U.S. Congress as the first Jewish Texas elected to statewide office. They were the first Hispanic and Jewish individuals receiving official state historical markers.

The Texas Centennial Commission in 1936, the Texas State Historical Survey Committee (later the THC) in 1953 and in the 1950s and 1960s the placing of pink granite monuments and grave markers across Texas add up to the more than 15,000 state historical markers. Also included in this number were those that commemorated the Centennial of the Civil War.

The official marker program began in 1962. The Texas Historical Survey Committee was created by the 53rd Legislature which became effective on September 4, 1953. Before the meeting of the new committee, Governor Allan Shivers had appointed the 18 Survey Committee members as prescribed by the law. The governor indicated the committee had been given a heavy burden, for they were to seek out any article that had evidence or connotation of manners, customs, thought and way of life of any period of Texas History," save that article and whenever possible make it avail-able to the viewing public". The Committee would be serving without pay and there would be no state funding. The governor also said the preservation of landmarks and historical sites

would be a proper matter for local areas. Also the members should direct and coordinate the efforts of the local groups.

The Runnels County Survey Committee group was organized in 1962, when Runnels County Judge W. H. Rampy appointed seven members to the Committee. The name was later changed to the Runnels County Historical Commission. Runnels County has 14 Recorded Texas Historical Landmarks, 41 Texas Historical Markers, two Centennial Markers and three cemeteries designated as Historic Texas Cemeteries. 
Two copies of this book were also donated to the Rock Hotel Museum, in Winters, and Winters Public Library. All three books are available to the public.

FSA reminds of disaster program deadlines

WINTERS- Runnels County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) County **Executive Director Byron Bauerlein reminds eligible** ranchers and livestock producers who had livestock losses or grazing losses during the 2011 crop year that the deadline for applying for benefits under the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) and the **Emergency Assistance for** Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) is Jan. 30, 2012. "It is imperative that producers meet the deadline for disaster assistance as there are no late file provisions for LFP and ELAP," said Bauerlein. "To ensure a smooth application process, producers should have all required supporting documentation with them at the time they apply for benefits," he said. Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP): LFP provides payments to eligible livestock producers who have suffered livestock grazing losses due to qualifying drought or fire that occurred before Oct. 1, 2011. Fire losses apply only to federally managed rangeland. Eligible livestock under LFP include beef cattle, alpacas, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep and swine. During the 2011 crop year, all Texas counties met the LFP trigger requirements for a three-month payment for native pasture, improved pasture and forage sorghum. Eligible ranchers and livestock producers have until Jan. 30, 2012, to apply for LFP benefits. Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP): ELAP provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish who have losses due to disease, adverse weather or other conditions, including losses due to blizzards and wildfires that occurred before Oct. 1, 2011. ELAP assistance is for losses not covered under other disaster assistance programs established by the 2008 Farm Bill. Producers who experienced livestock death losses must file a notice of loss 30 days after the loss is apparent, but no later than Dec. 29, 2011.




Rowena Chili Dinner a huge success

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
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

Mountain biking in state parks picking up steam

AUSTIN – Mountain bikers throughout the state – from novices to experts — are increasingly pedaling the numerous trails found at more than 40 Texas state parks. From beach and woodland road rides to

hair-curling downhill descents in mountain and Hill Country parks, state parks from El Paso to Mustang Island offer bikers of all skill levels a multitude of diverse mountain biking adventures.

"Many trails in Texas state parks provide great opportunities for all levels of mountain-bike riders to test and develop their biking skills, get a good workout, refresh their mind and spirits, spend family and friend time together and experience the great outdoors," says avid mountain biker Dan Sholly deputy director of Texas state parks. "Big Bend Ranch State Park, in particular, is developing into the mountainbiking Mecca of Texas.' State park biking trails range in length from an easy, two-mile, multiuse trail at Mexia's Fort Parker State Park Site to more than 200 miles of diverse trails snaking through desert mountains and canyons at 310,000-acre Big Bend Ranch State Park just outside of Presidio. Bring your own bike or rent one at the park's Visitors Center. Big Bend Ranch State Park, home to the International Biking Association's only Epic Ride in Texas, ranks among the nation's top mountain-biking destinations. The ultra-challenging Fresno-Sauceda Loop, which passes by a number of archeological and historical sites, offers a blend of single-track and 4X4 roads with a number of steep climbs and descents. The ride to "The Other Side of Nowhere" is just one of dozens of rides on singletrack, double-track and old, rugged 4X4 ranch roads in what remains a truly wild park with plenty of wide-open spaces. Two other West Texas parks - El Paso's Franklin Mountains and San Angelo state parks — offer more than 50 miles of mountain biking trails each with trails suited to riders with Level 1 (Beginner), Level 2 (Intermediate) and Level 3 (Experienced) skills. Mountain bikers new to the sport might consider hitting the flat, sometimes paved bike trails at state parks as Brazos Bend, Fairfield Lake and South Llano River State Park. Bikers may want to seek out one of the rails-to-trails tracks at Caprock Canyons and Lake Mineral Wells,

or scenic lakeside trails along the 10-mile Ray Roberts Lake Greenbelt Corridor, the 10-mile Fort Richardson Lost Creek Trailway, or the 13-mile Lake Somerville Trailway. The outstanding trail system at Cedar Hill State Park near Dallas draws legions of mountain bikers, too.



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
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Winters Enterprise **TPWD seeks** feedback on invasive species

WINTERS ENTERPRISE STAFF REPORT

AUSTIN- Texas Parks and Wildlife will be hosting two scoping meetings in North Texas this month to get public feedback on a pair of proposed new regulations aimed at preventing the spread of exotic aquatic species in the state.

TPWD Inland Fisheries Division staff will be briefing the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at its Jan. 25 meeting on two proposed regulations to combat zebra mussels along with silver and bighead carp. As it stands, these species are present in Texas in limited numbers or are confined to a few locations

The meetings have been set for 7 p.m. on Monday, January 16 in the auditorium at the **Denison Senior Center** (531 West Chestnut) and at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, January 17 in Jefferson at the Jefferson Visitor Center (305 E. Austin).

Zebra mussels are known to have caused alarming declines in populations of fish, birds and native mussel species and can damage boat hulls, plug water systems used in boat motors, air conditioners and heads. Millions of dollars are spent each year controlling, cleaning and monitoring zebra mussels in other states. The introduction of Asian carps, such as bighead and silver carp, have the potential to cause enormous damage to native species because these species feed on plankton required by larval fish and native mussels. They are a potential competitor with some native fishes such as gizzard and threadfin shad that also rely on plankton for food.

Although possession and transport of these species is already prohibited, TPWD biologists believe additional regulations are needed to prevent the accidental or incidental movement of these species.

The Veterans Benefits Administration has listed nine new infectious diseases that are presumed to be related to Gulf War, Iraq, and Afghanistan service. Included are brucellosis, campylobacter jejuni, coxiella burnetii (Q fever), malaria, mycobacterium tuberculosis, nontyphoid salmonella, shigella, visceral leishmaniasis, and West Nile Virus. If you served in these areas and have been diagnosed with any of these, or other illnesses, you need to file a claim for compensation in my office.
