Sheriff's Dept investigating theft in Ballinger Education Foundation

WINTERS- Former Ballinger Education Foundation treasurer and former Ballinger Independent School District Business Manager Jackie Beth Gibbs is facing theft charges in a case being investigated by the Runnels County Sheriff's Office.

The former treasurer for the non-profit organization has been filed on Judge Glenda Wood's

Court and arrested for third degree felony theft of more than \$20,000 but less than \$100,000. Gibbs was bonded on a \$15,000 bond.

The foundation, not affiliated with the Ballinger ISD, was founded in 2007 by a group of well know and respected members of the community. The mission of the Ballinger **Education Foundation is** to generate and distribute funds to Ballinger Independent School District students and staff.

Some of the most recent fundraisers and donations held by the foundation include scholarships donated to Ballinger High School Class of 2011 graduating Seniors, the sale of a recipe book compiled of recipes from Ballinger ISD exes, families and friends, and the sale of Bearcat Paw Print/Bearcat car window decals.

As of press time foun-

dation chairman Justin Busenlehner didn't return calls made to his home.

According to its website the foundation's mission is to encourage all students to work to their highest potential, recognize and reward Ballinger students and staff, and inspire parents and community to participate with the school district in enriching education.

Despite the Ballinger

Education Foundation is a separate non BISD-related organization, all its current and former members have an education/boards background. Jackie Beth Gibbs joined the foundation while she was the BISD Business Manager.

Gibbs is no longer working for BISD. On January 17, 2012, the district started advertising for a new Business Manager and the position is currently open.

Film features life of 4-H, FFA top contributor

COLLEGE STATION-4-H families are encouraged to support Deep in the Heart - a full-length feature film about the remarkable life of Richard "Dick" Wallrath, the top individual financial contributor to Texas 4-H and Texas FFA scholarship programs, said a Texas 4-H administrator.

Wallrath's overall contributions to 4-H and FFA, including scholarship contributions through his eaucational foundation, cur rently exceed \$16 million.

"We sincerely request that 4-H families see this film about Dick Wallrath's life for two reasons," said Dr. Chris Boleman, director of the 4-H and youth development program of the Texas AgriLife Extension Service. "First, we feel this story of overcoming personal challenges, discovering what's truly important in life and second chances will resonate with many families. Second, because of Mr. Wallrath's continued generosity, a portion of all

ticket sales will go to both Texas 4-H and Texas FFA.'

The money donated from ticket sales will go to further strengthen much-needed scholarship programs, Boleman said.

"Mr. Wallrath also has provided tremendous financial assistance to 4-H and FFA members through his participation in livestock show premium auctions, including buying show steers at junior auctions in major shows throughout Texas," he said. in addition, ne established the Richard Wallrath Educational Foundation, which to date has funded almost \$8 million in scholarships to students who've enrolled in Texas universities.' According to documen-

tation, during Wallrath's 13-year involvement with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, he has purchased 130 steers, including three reserve champion and three grand champions, one of which he bought for \$601,000 - a world record. He also has purchased six grand

champions at the Star of Texas show in Austin, and two grand champions, one reserve champion and 82 breed champions at the San Antonio Livestock Show and Rodeo. Wallrath's combined purchases at these shows totals more than \$5 million. In addition, he recently bought the grand champion steer at the 2012 Fort Worth Stock Show and Rodeo for \$230,000, the most ever paid for a champion steer. From 2006 to the pres-

ent, the kichard wallrath **Educational Foundation** has awarded a total of 780 \$10,000 scholarships to 4-H and FFA members, with more than 500 students who have received these scholarships currently attending Texas universities. Deep in the Heart

Brand re-registration ends Feb. 29

FORT WORTH- Brand re-registration period for ranchers and cattle raisers ends February 29, 2012. The State of Texas requires that brands be re-registered in the county or counties where the owner operates every 10 years reminded the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Larry Gray, executive director of law enforcement at TSCRA, says that branding is the number one way to prevent livestock theft. Livestock theft continues to be a common problem throughout the United States, especially with recent record high cattle prices.

TSCRA was established in 1877 to help prevent and solve agricultural crimes. Since then, the association's law enforcement division has expanded to include 30 special rangers stationed throughout Texas and Oklahoma who work alongside local law enforcement agencies to protect citizens against agricultural crimes, including livestock theft.

Although Texas does not have a statewide brand registry database, TSCRA has market inspectors stationed at 105 Texas livestock auctions that collect brands and other identifying marks.





CUSTOMER NOTICE INCORPORATED AREAS OF THE MID-TEX DIVISION

On January 31, 2012, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with each City served by the Mid-Tex Division (hereafter "Affected Cities") with the exception of the City of Dallas. The Company's Statement of Intent proposes to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers within the Affected Cities. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is March 6, 2012. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,194,420 residential, 100,461 commercial, and 705 industrial & transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$49,080,069 or 4.36%, including gas costs, or 11.94% excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition to the rate changes, other proposed tariff changes include revision of the Company's residential and commercial rate schedules (Rates R and C), as well as its Rider WNA and Rider GCR to change the current billing rate basis from Mcf to Ccf. The Company further proposes to revise the Rider GCR to: (1) remove the 2009 interest rate reference, (2) clarify that the calculation of (b) Pipeline Cost is inclusive of interest, and (3) update the Upstream Pipeline Charge Allocation (Factor D). Atmos also proposes to modify its Rider WNA to update the heat load and base load factors. The Company further seeks to implement a new Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") tariff, as well as a new conservation and energy efficiency tariff ("Rider CEE"). In addition, the Company seeks to recover all of its rate case expenses and all city rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the average monthly bill for each customer class within the Affected Cities will change by the amount and percent shown in the table below:


