



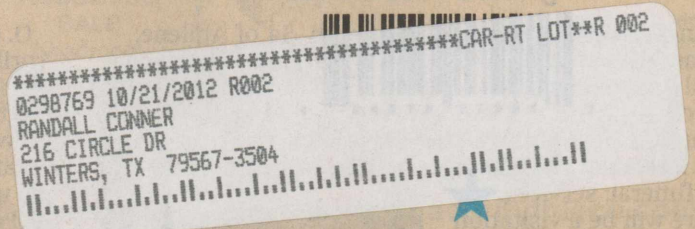
The Winters Blizzard baseball Varsity team added two wins to their 2012 spring season record last week and are now 4-2 (11-3) for the year.

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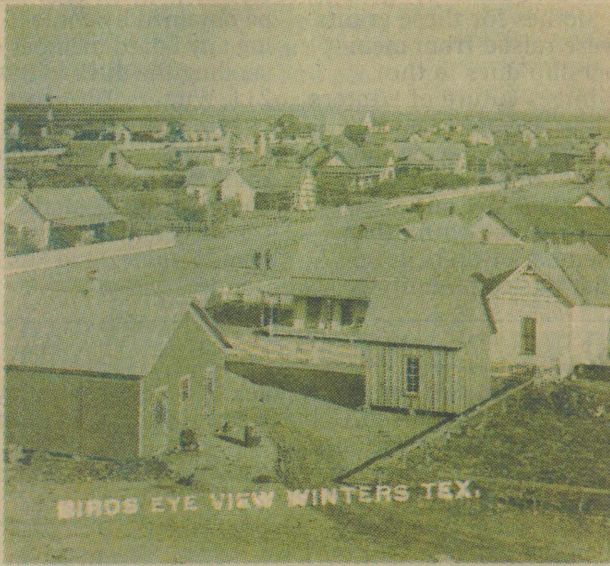

Ballinger man gets 40 years for child abuse

BALLINGER- Following a two-day trial, Salvador Reyes, Jr., of Ballinger, was sentenced by a Runnels County jury to 40 years in jail, for the repeated abuse of a 7-year-old child first occurring in 2004. At the time of the abuse Reyes was living with the mother of the victim.

On Tuesday, March 27, 2012, Reyes, 35 years of age, was found guilty of aggravated sexual assault of a child under 14 and sentenced to 40 years of confinement in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Institutional Division.

The case was investigated by the Ballinger Police Chief Mark McNulty and Runnels County Deputy Sheriff Steven Gray.

Following the trial a 9-man, 3-woman jury deliberated approximately three hours before returning with the 40-year sentence. According to the 119th District Attorney's office Reyes will serve at least 20 years before becoming eligible for parole.

Reyes was living with the victim's mother when the offense occurred. The victim was 7-years-old but did not disclose the abuse until August, 2011, after the defendant left her mother and moved to San Angelo. The victim was 11-years-old at the time.

Deputy Sheriff Steve Gray and Ballinger Police Chief Mark McNulty obtained a partial confession from Reyes. The video of the confession was played at 119th District Judge Ben Woodward's court for the jury to review.

The victim, her 22-year-old sister and their mother testified in support of the State. The State was represented by the 119th District Attorney and First Assistant Bryan Clayton. Reyes was represented by attorney Jimmy Stewart.

Enhanced service radar to improve weather warnings

SAN ANGELO- The National Weather Service is improving its Doppler radar serving West Central Texas by installing the latest dual polarization technology. This technology will give forecasters better information about heavy rainfall in flooding events, hail detection in thunderstorms, and even recognize whether precipitation is in the form of rain, snow or ice.

"This is the most significant upgrade to the nation's weather radar network since Doppler radar was first installed in the early 1990s and is a significant step toward us becoming weather ready," said Jack Hayes, director of the National Weather Service. "Dual polarization technology provides significantly more information and clearer pictures of current weather conditions, helping National Weather Service meteorologists provide more accurate and timely forecasts."

Currently, National Weather Service Doppler radars provide forecasters information on precipitation intensity and movement (direction and speed). Dual polarization technology adds new information about the size and shape of airborne objects, which will improve estimates of how much rain is falling, improving flash flood detection and warnings. During winter weather, dual polarization radar can tell the difference between rain,

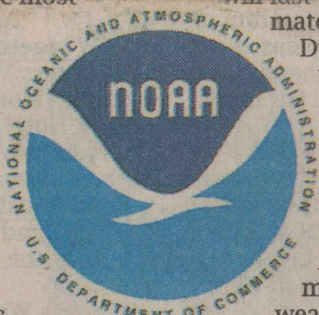
snow and ice, which gives forecasters a much better idea of what type of precipitation to expect at the ground.

"This radar upgrade will help us provide better forecasts and warnings of heavy rain, snow and hail for the residents of West Central Texas," said Steve Lyons, meteorologist-in-charge of the National Weather Service office in San Angelo.

Installation will begin on Monday, April 2, and will last approximately 12 days.

During the upgrade, adjacent National Weather Service, Air Force, and Federal Aviation Administration weather radars will provide coverage. Installation of dual polarization technology in all 122 National Weather Service radars is expected to be completed in 2013. Thirty-eight other operational WSR-88D systems, owned by the Air Force and FAA, will also be enhanced.

The National Weather Service is the primary source of weather data, forecasts and warnings for the United States and its territories. It operates the most advanced weather and flood warning and forecast system in the world, helping to protect lives and property and enhance the national economy. Working with partners, the National Weather Service is building a Weather-Ready Nation to support community resilience in the face of increasing vulnerability to extreme weather. Truck driver killed in rollover near Winters

WINTERS- A truck driver from Lubbock, Texas was killed on Thursday, March 29 in a semi-truck rollover crash occurring at about 7:30 a.m. on Highway 153, some 6 miles west of Winters, Texas.

The International semi-truck was hauling air conditioning parts and had labels of a company out of Lubbock, Texas. Judge Richard Hamilton pronounced Carl Wayne Sedberry, 27 years of age, of Lubbock, Texas, dead at the site of the crash.

The truck was headed southeast on Highway 153, some 6 miles out of Winters, almost at the intersection with Farm to Market Road 2111.

Sedberry lost control of the truck and left the road to the right, rolling over and ending in a nearby

wheat field.

Winters Volunteer Fire Department, Winters Police Department and Runnels County Sheriff's Office assisted Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers with traffic and the recovery of the body.

The body of Sedberry was taken to Winters Funeral Home. The road was foggy at the time of the crash.

This crash is under investigation by Texas Department of Public Safety Corporal Michael Gray, of Ballinger.

The tractor trailer was southbound when was struck on the side of the trailer by the F-250. Thomas Nix, 53, of Anson, was driving the tractor truck. The F-250 ran into the tires of the trailer truck.

Due to the accident the

intersection was closed for several minutes. Guelker was taken by North Runnels EMS by ambulance to North Runnels Hospital to be treated of non-life threatening injuries.

The crash caused severe damage to the F-250 and blew up a tire of the tractor truck.

The case is under investigation by the Winters Police Department.

WINTERS- The Winters Blizzard shut the door early on the TLCA Eagles last Friday, March 30, and improved their 2012 spring record to 3-2 (10-3). The Blizzard rallied three runs during the first inning to secure the game toward a 10-0 win.

The Blizzard added four runs in third and fourth, and finished the game early with the last three runs of the match during the sixth inning.

In the first inning Strait Daniel got on base with single, advanced to third with a double by Kolton Alexander and scored in the play. Chris Gerhart singled to short stop advancing Alexander to third, and Fabian Esquivel grounded out to short stop bringing the second of the game

home and leaving Gerhart in third. Gerhart would score in an error of the center fielder while fielding a ground ball hit by Ty Cortez.

Bottom of the third Gerhart opened with single stole second. Fabian Esquivel walked and Ty Cortez got on board in an error by the third baseman.

HISTORICAL MARKERS AND THEIR HISTORIES IN RUNNELS CO

The first doctor in Winters

WINTERS—Robert Cooke and Martha, his twin sister, were the last of 12 children born to William and Nancy Cooke of Emory, Texas. He was born June 19, 1857. Robert attended Baylor University when it was known as Waco College. His father died a year and a half later. He returned to Emory to care for his mother and unmarried sister.

While at home, Robert worked for his brother in Austin, Texas in a drug store for 50-cents a day. He was able to save enough money to attend a Medical College in Louisville, Kentucky. February 26, 1885 he received his diploma in Chemistry and Microscopy and an honorary diploma for private instruction in Obstetrics and Diseases of Women. February 25, 1886, he received his degree of Doctor of Medicine.

Dr. Cooke began his practice of medicine at Kentuckytown, near Emory, Texas. He was on a trip to Whitewright when he met Sallie Mitchell. Sallie came to the area in 1880 from Bowling Green, Kentucky with her parents. Robert and Sallie were married October 24, 1886. The H. C. Mitchells, Sallie's parents had moved to a farm at Bluff Creek, north of Winters in 1888. Sallie wanted to move closer to her parents for various reasons. She expressed great concern about them

living in this frontier area without a doctor.

Dr. Robert Cooke, M. D. became the first doctor of Winters, Texas when the town was organized.

He and his wife came to the area from Emory, Texas in mid-year of 1889. He lived on a farm one mile north of present-day Winters, Texas while assisting in building the first one-room school building.

After the building was completed, Dr. Cooke and his wife were among the citizens meeting to give the town a name. In January 1890, the citizens voted to name the town Winters for J. N. Winters, a land agent, who had given land for the school.

March 22, 1890, a group of 18 people met again in the school building to organize the first church of the community, the Bethel Baptist Church of Christ, later to become the present day First Baptist Church.

Dr. Cooke bought a

block of land which extended from the present First Baptist Church to where Higginbotham's Lumber Co. was located.

He built his home here and attached an office. A classmate of Robert Cooke, M. D. at Baylor was Jim Hogg, who later became a Texas Governor. Dr. Cooke served as State Health Officer in Gov. Hogg's administration and also

the following Governor's administration. Dr. Cooke practiced medicine in Winters until 1892 when he sold out to Dr. Rhubottom and moved to Colorado City, Texas. When his health failed, Dr. Cooke brought his family to the farm of his brother-in-law, Henry Mitchell, north of Winters in 1898. He was then ordained to preach August 27, 1899 at Moro. Dr. Cooke and family returned to Winters the following year and was one of three received as deacons. He also became the first Sunday School Superintendent. The fol-

lowing year, he served as pastor of the First Baptist Church in 1890. Church meetings were held in the school building until 1906 when the members were able to build their own building. He also preached at Content and Wingate.

Dr. Cooke wanted to be where he could be of the most service to people. After his health broke, he continued to doctor those who would come to his house. The hardships of frontier life were too much for a frail, gentle man who doctored animals, birds and children's pets with the same concern that he showed for people. Dr. and Mrs. Cooke had five children. He died May 13, 1936 and she died December 16, 1939. They are both buried in Northview Cemetery, the oldest cemetery in Winters.

The official Texas Historical Grave Marker was awarded to Runnels County by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee in August of 1967. The marker was placed at the gravesite of Dr. Cooke, M.D.

The dedication with ceremony was held in October of 1967. The Cooke's three living children attended the dedication.

Deadline approaching for CRP general sign-up

COLLEGE STATION—Farm Service Agency Texas Acting Executive Director James B. Douglass reminded landowners, farmers and ranchers in Texas that the opportunity to enroll in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up 43 ends on Friday, April 6. Producers who want to offer eligible land for CRP's competitive general sign-up may enroll at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) county office where their farm records are maintained.

"I strongly encourage all interested producers to contact the county office before the April 6 end of CRP sign-up deadline," said Douglass. "Any offer that is not submitted by this April 6 deadline will not be considered for acceptance during the 43rd sign-up for CRP."

CRP is a voluntary program that assists farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers to protect their environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolling eligible land in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers in exchange for rental payments, cost-share and technical assistance.

"So far, the 43rd sign-up for CRP has been very successful and we anticipate landowner interest in the program to continue throughout the sign-up period," said Douglass. "I can't stress enough the need to act now rather than wait until the deadline date so that our staff can provide the much-deserved individual attention to all producers interested in the CRP program."

As of February 2012, Texas has approximately 3,360,870 acres enrolled in CRP. On Sept. 30, 2012, approximately 826,863 CRP contract acres will expire in the state. Producers may choose to re-enroll their land or sign up for new acres that qualify for the program. Contracts range from 10-15 years. The competitive selection is based on factors such as land that erodes easily or where habitat for rare or game wildlife can be assured.

Cattle raisers, Senator support repeal to death tax

FORT WORTH—The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) and Texas U.S. Senator John Cornyn announced their strong support for recently introduced legislation that will provide for a permanent repeal of the federal estate tax, commonly referred to as the death tax.

Senator Cornyn is a co-sponsor of the Death Tax Repeal Permanency Act (S. 2242) which would stop the federal government from considering death as a taxable event. S. 2242, introduced by Senator John Thune (R-S.D.), is identical to legislation (H.R. 1259) introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by Kevin Brady (R-Texas).

"The death tax hurts family farmers and ranchers across Texas at the worst time possible, and in many cases Texans are forced to sell the family farm or ranch just to pay this tax," said Senator John Cornyn.

Not only would S. 2242 repeal the federal estate tax, but it would also repeal the generation skipping transfer (GST) tax, make permanent the maximum 35 percent gift tax rate and a \$5 million lifetime gift tax exemption, and maintain the stepped-up basis provisions important to ranching families.

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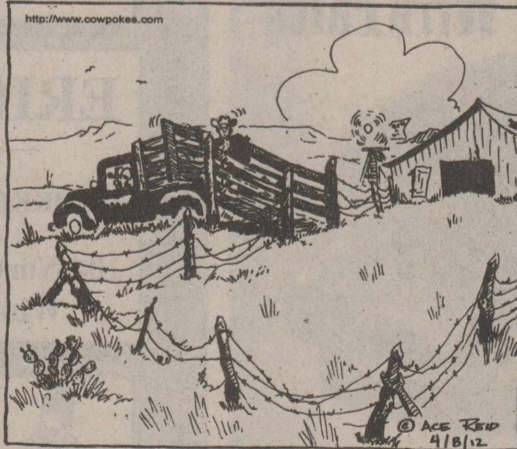

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WINTERS IN THE SPOTLIGHT

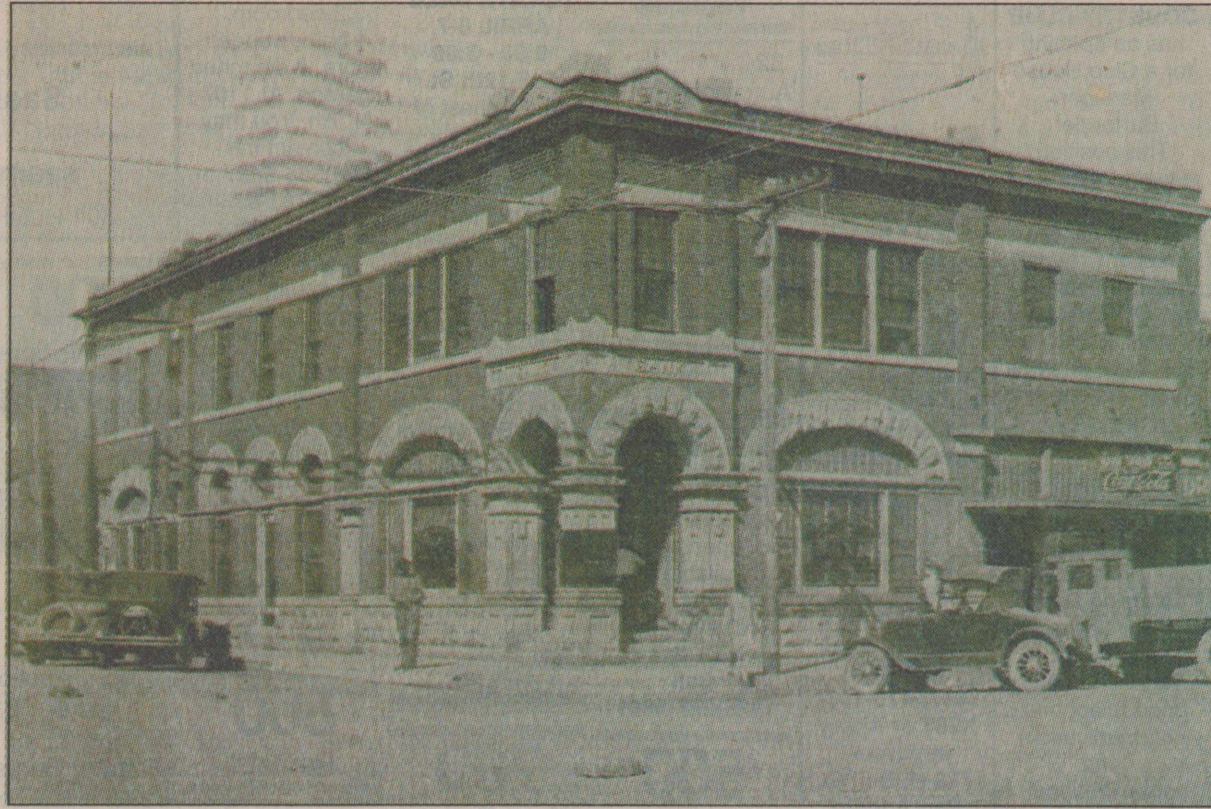
Foundation and early years

WINTERS— Winters was born out of the grassland prairies of Central West Texas. For hundreds of years, Indians — the Apaches and Comanches — roamed the vast lands hunting buffalo, antelope, and deer, as evidenced by the many arrowheads and artifacts which have been found in the area. The Spanish Conquistadors explored the vast area. After Texas won its independence from Mexico, settlers began to move westward, facing the threat of Indian attack. Fort Chadbourne was established a few miles northwest in 1852 to protect the settlers. Buffalo hunters followed the massive bison herds across the area to obtain the much desired hides. In the 1870's, cattle ranchers began to inhabit the region with large herds and big spreads — the Parramore, Wylie, Odom, Maverick, and Chadbourne Ranches.

In the late 1880's and 1890's, some of the ranches were broken out into fertile farms to produce cotton and feed. Communities grew up at Content, Truett, Runnels City, Wingate, and in Bluff Creek Valley, just a few miles southeast of here. In 1889, a group of citizens built a school building and they named it Winters in honor of the land agent who donated the land. Soon, a mercantile business and post office were established nearby. Over the next decade, many settlers moved to the area and a number of businesses developed.

Cotton became the major contributor to the local economy, and several gins, an oil mill, a

cotton compress, and cotton buyers developed around this industry. In 1909, the Abilene Southern Railroad arrived in Winters and opened markets to the world and brought consumer items sought by the area residents. In one of the following years, more cotton was shipped from Winters, Texas than any other shipping point in the United States.

Many stores and retail establishments opened along Main and Dale Streets to provide

goods and services to the growing population. On Saturdays, throngs of people walked the streets and shopped — kids went to the picture shows, mothers bought groceries, fathers conducted business. Eggs and butter were sold, farm supplies were purchased, occasionally a new dress or suit was bought, horses and mules were traded, and cotton was marketed. The streets were packed, every parking place filled, and the community was a buzz.

The little one-room school house which was located in the middle of Main Street in front of First Baptist Church became too small and in 1908, the Winters schools moved to the present location. First a two-story wooden structure was built, then a rock building that sat about where we are tonight to another rock building to the current brick high school building which was completed in 1928. These were followed by gymnasiums, other academic buildings, and athletic

facilities, until we sit tonight in this magnificent structure.

But it is not the buildings which make the Winters Schools — it is the teachers, the administrators, the school boards, and the students over the many years. It is the community that has had a vision and dream to promote top-quality education, to instill values, to strive for excellence, and to prepare students to make major contributions in our world.

And how WHS students have influenced the world. Winters High School has produced a multitude of graduates who have become medical doctors and lawyers and managers and engineers and they have literally reached around the world. WHS has produced a leading national figure in sports media relations, the head of a large state agency, the chief financial officer of a Fortune 500 company that is the largest home builder in the U.S., a Texas Secretary of State, a noted playwright, and two Vice-Presidents of major international energy companies. There are numerous engineers who graduated from WHS, including one at NASA who designed the original protective face shield for astronauts' helmets which is still used today. There are educators, Peace Corps volunteers, college professors, ministers, military leaders, computer engineers, business professionals, artists, medical professionals, business owners, bankers, inventors, and scientists. I don't think that companies like Halliburton and the major oil companies could have survived without WHS grads.

Remember to "Render!" Taxable property renditions are due April 16.

Does this apply to you?

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, such as the equipment or inventory owned by a business, it does.

What is a rendition?

A rendition is a report to your county appraisal district that lists all of the taxable property that you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year. This often applies to furniture, fixtures, equipment or inventory owned by a business.

What are the advantages of filing?

- You give your opinion of your property's value.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address.
- If your property's value depreciated, you can file a report of decreased value.

What is the deadline?

- The last day for filing 2012 renditions is April 16.
- An automatic extension is available if requested in writing by the April 16 deadline.
- The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after the deadline for an owner who shows good cause in writing.

REMEMBER!!

Filing is your responsibility. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, you may face a 10 to 50 percent penalty.
