## Six Flags Sets Opening Date

Arlington, Texas—Six Flags Over Texas today announced the earliest spring opening in its 11-year history. The big theme park will begin the 1972 season on March 25.

Six Flags General Manager R. W. Freeman said the early opening date was chosen to give families a chance to visit the Park during the Easter vacation period. He said the Park will be open daily from 10 a. m. until 10 p. m. from March 25 until April 2. After that Six Flags will be open on Saturdays and Sundays only until late May, when daily operation begins.

The entire facility is now getting its annual face-lifting. All of the rides are being overhauled and all rides and buildings are being repainted. Thousands of flowers have been planted during the winter months to provide a blaze of color for the opening week.

Since the Park opened in 1961, more than 18,000,000 persons have passed through the gates. Some 2,000,000 are expected this year.

## Small Grain Producers Invited To Symposium

Vernon (Special)—Producers of small grains in the Texas Rolling Plains will have chance this month to hear much on the subject.

Scheduled March 15 in Farmers National Bank at Seymour is the 1972 Small Grain Symposium.

Starting time both days is 1:30 p. m. The symposium is sponsored by the Texas Wheat Producers Board and the R-PEP Small Grains Task Force. (R-PEP, meaning the Rolling Plains Economic Program begun four years ago by local

citizens and the Texas A&M University College of Agriculture to increase farm cash income in the 29 counties of the area.)

Five specialists in small grains will recommend practices in selecting varieties, in fertilizing and grazing, in controlling insects and diseases, in storing and marketing and in evaluating various farm programs.

**JP Bledsoe Attends Lubbock Program**

## HISTORY OF FARMERS UNION

CHARTERED 1902—POINT, RAINS CO., TEXAS

(This is the ninth of 52 articles pertaining to goals and accomplishments since 1902, running every Thursday in the Haskell Free Press.)

29, 1936—After the Supreme Court had ruled parts of the 1933 AAA Act invalid, the Farmers Union and other groups sought and obtained quick Congressional passage of a bill providing for some of the basic features of the farm programs. On this day, the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act of 1936 was adopted. In addition to other provisions, this law established the ACP program.

20, 1936—Congress approves the Norris-Rayburn bill to create a permanent Rural Rehabilitation program. The bill incorporated the Farmers Union's suggestion that the program be operated through rural cooperative distribution systems.

3, 1937—The Farmers Union-supported Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act signed into law by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The legislation provided authority for the federal marketing agreement and orders now operating on milk and fruit and vegetable crops.

18, 1937—NFU President John Vesecky protested to President Roosevelt regarding the 3 1/2 per cent interest rates prevailing on Federal Farm Loans.

22, 1937—The Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act became law, carrying out some of the recommendations of the President's Committee on Farm Tenancy, of which the Farmers Union's M. W. Thatcher was a member. This Act authorized the federal government to buy land for sale to disadvantaged farm families. It also made available up to 100% of the value of the farm to be repayable over 40 years at 3% interest. Seven years later in defending the program against critics, NFU's James G. Patterson declared that borrowers under this law had a 98.9% repayment record.

4, 1937—The nation's first soil conservation district was formed, beginning the implementation of that phase of the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act of 1936. A statute obtained by Farmers Union and other farm groups after portions of the Act of 1933 were declared unconstitutional by the U. S. Supreme Court.

1, 1937—The Sugar Act was approved, continuing the Jones-Costigan Act of 1934. It established the first supply stabilization program on a heavily-imported commodity. The 1934 and 1937 acts resolved a lengthy dispute in which Farmers Union Secretary Wallace favored a stabilization program but some farm and industry groups favored reliance on tariff measures.
