


Arlington. Texas-Six Flags Over Texas today announced the earliest spring opening in its 11-year history. The big theme park will begin the 1972 season on March 25.

Six Flags General Manager R. W. Freeman said the early opening date was chosen to give families a chance to visit the Park during the Easter vacation period. He said the Park will be open daily from 10 a. m. until 10 p. m. from March 25 until April 2. After that Six Flags will be open on Saturdays and Sundays only until late May, when daily operation begins.

The entire facility is now getting its anual face-lifting. All of the rides are being overhauled and all rides and buildings are being repainted. Thousands of lowers have been planted during the winter months to provide a blaze of color for the opening week.

Since the Park opened in 1961, more than 18,000,000 persons have passed through the gates. Some 2,000,000 are expected this year.



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


