
SWCD to award scholarships in Runnels Co

Blizzards suffer Homecoming defeat

WINTERS- With traffic backed up, parking lots filling quickly and the bleachers spilling over the 2012 version of Homecoming would put the Blizzards up against the number two ranked 1A team in the state, the Stamford Bulldogs.

The Blizzards would receive to get this one started and with a new offensive look and launch a drive that would end with the home team facing fourth and nine in Bulldog territory. The drive strung together three

first downs keeping the ball on the ground. The new look seemed to catch the Stamford defensive unit by surprise with a full house backfield and two tight ends. The 12-play drive featured Dusty Hines and Ty Cortez combining for the three first downs and a couple of third down conversions that seemed out of reach. The forced punt would set the visitors up at their own 26 and three plays later the Bulldogs would score from 5 yards out after a 65 yard sprint on the second play from scrimmage. The extra point kick was good and the Bulldogs took a 7-0 lead that would never be challenged with 3:54 left in the first quarter.

The ensuing kickoff would set the Blizzards up at their own 20. On first down Jimmy John Ripley would find Lukas Kraatz for a gain of 35 moving the ball into Bulldog territory. The blue team

offense would face fourth and four after gains of four on first down and one on second and third by

Cortez. Ripley would find Hines for a gain of only three thereby turning the ball over on downs at the visitor's 35 yard line. This Stamford posses-

This Stamford possession would end with a one yard touchdown run on the first play of the second quarter giving the visitors a 13-0 lead after the missed extra point. The ensuing kickoff would put the ball at the Blizzard 30. This possession would

not produce the desired results as on fourth and two a bad snap would create a turnover on downs at the Blizzard 36. Shortly thereafter a 17 yard run would put six more on the board and combined with the two point conversion give the visitors a 21-0 lead with 9:38 left in the half.

The kickoff and return again placed the ball near the Blizzard 30 yard line and again the home team would face fourth and two. This time the punt gave the visitors the ball at

their own 41. Six plays and three first downs later the Bulldogs would find pay dirt with a 13 yard screen pass and run. The extra point was missed and the Bulldog lead was pushed to 27-0 with 5:36 left in the half.

Setting up at their own 26 the Blizzards would show some life offensively as on second down Ripley found Bryce Mikeska for 27 and a first down. From here the Blizzards would produce another first down with Ripley running for 12 on a fourth and sev-

en situation with a little over a minute left in the half only to have the drive snuffed out by a Stamford interception inside the five yard line. Three plays later the half would end and the Blizzards would hit the locker-room facing a 27-0 deficit.

The second half would prove to be more of the same. Stamford would receive and proceed to score on the first play from scrimmage on a 68 yard catch and run leading to a 34 -0 lead with the successful extra point kick with only 17 seconds gone in the second half. After another three and out the Blizzards would be forced to punt giving the ball to the visitors near the mid field stripe. The first play from scrimmage produced points for the visitors on a 48 yard pass, catch and run. The score left the Bulldogs with a 40-0 lead as the third quarter ended.

The fourth quarter would produce another Stamford score and leave the Blizzards with a bitter pill to swallow. A 46-0 2012 Homecoming defeat.

USDA announces funding to improve electric service in rural communities

TEMPLE- Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced funding to modernize and improve the efficiency of rural electric generation and transmission systems. The announcement was made on the Secretary's behalf by Under Secretary Dallas Tonsager.

"USDA and the Obama administration continue to make key investments in rural electric cooperatives that will modernize service and improve reliability for rural businesses and residential customers," Tonsager said. "Today's announcement also includes funding that will enable rural electric cooperatives and utilities to adopt smart grid technologies in their operation as part of the ongoing efforts to modernize rural America's electric grid."

Secretary Vilsack announced in August that USDA had met its goal to finance \$250 million in smart grid technologies in fiscal year 2012. The new announcement includes additional support of \$134 million in smart grid technologies.

Two cooperatives in Texas will benefit from funding

through this announcement. The \$1.95 billion in loan guarantees announced are provided by USDA Rural Development's Rural Utilities Service. The funding helps electric utilities upgrade, expand, maintain and replace rural America's electric infrastructure. The agency also funds energy conservation and renewable energy projects. Texas reaches record number of registered voters for Nov 6 General Election

AUSTIN- Texas Secretary of State Hope Andrade announced Texas reached a record number of registered voters on the Official List of Registered Voters. As of Monday, October 15, there are currently 13,594,264 voters on the list, the highest in state history. This number will likely increase once all the voter registration applications submitted by October 9, 2012 are processed. Tuesday, October 9 was the last day to register to vote in the November 6, 2012 General Election.

"I want to thank all Texans who registered to vote this year and all Texans who are already registered voters. The next step is getting to the polls during Early Voting or on Election Day," said Secretary Andrade.

A final number for registered voters will not be available until all ap-

plications are processed. Due to the high volume of voter registration applications submitted prior to the registration deadline, many local county election officials are still processing applications.

The previous record number of registered voters was 13,575,062 set for the November 2008 General Election.

The final Official List of Registered Voters will be set prior to the start of Early Voting on October 22, 2012.

As a reminder, Early Voting begins Monday, October 22, 2012 and runs through November 2, 2012. Voters can find links to polling places and times at www.VoteTexas. gov. During Early Voting, voters may cast a ballot at any polling place in their county of residence.

"With just a week to go before Early Voting begins, now is a perfect time for Texans to begin preparing

to cast their ballot," said Secretary Andrade. "Now's the time to verify your voter registration status, locate your registration certificate, make sure it's signed, verify where your county's polling places are, review what's on your ballot and make plans to go vote.'

Photo identification as required in Senate Bill 14 will not be required when voting in person during Early Voting or on Election Day. To cast a ballot during Early Voting or on Election Day, voters should present their voter registration card or in lieu of a voter registration card, at least one of the following:

· A driver's license or personal identification card issued to you by the Texas Department of Public Safety or a similar document issued to you by an agency of another state, even if the license or card has expired;

· A form of identification that contains your photograph and establishes your identity;

· A birth certificate or other document confirming birth that is admissible in a court of law and establishes your identity;

· Your United States citizenship papers;

· Your United States pass-

· Official mail addressed to you by a governmental entity; or

A copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows your name and address.

WINTERS- Rick Minzenmayer, Runnels County and Tom Green County Integrated Pest Management Extension Agent, was named the 2012 Outstanding Educator in Cotton by the Texas Cotton Producers, Inc.

Minzenmayer was presented a plaque on Thursday, October 4, 2012, at the Tom Green County Cotton Tour. He has worked for AgriLife Extension for 27 years researching cotton. He was awarded for the discovery of Top Guard as a means of control for Cotton Root Rot, and his continued efforts in the field of cotton research.

"This award caught me totally by surprise," Minzenmayer said. The award was presented for the first time last year, when it was awarded to Dr. Chris Sansone.

Minzenmayer works extensively in cotton, his work is unique because most researches in the state operate a single program, where they scout individual fields.

'We have about 17 applied research projects, specifically in cotton, working with Bayer Crop Science, Deltapine, Monsanto, various chemical companies evaluating herbicides, harvest aides, we are currently evaluating 78 different cotton lines," Minzenmayer said.

For the past 5 years Minzenmayer has been researching Cotton Root Rot, a fungal disease causing serious damage to the cotton industry in West

"We have been fighting for over a 100 years trying

to figure out how to manage it, Dr. Isakeit, a plant pathologist from College Station and I began working on this fungal pathogen six years ago," said Minzenmayer.

They began injecting fungicide in the subsurface irrigation, screening the fungicide in the greenhouse, to see if they would come out with a material that would provide control.

'We found a material that would control the pathogen and since then we are trying to determine what would be the best method of applying the product and at what rates.

We found a management tool, we are trying to figure out what is the best way to apply it," he added.

Their investigation shows that TopGuard prevents infection by providing a barrier protection for the plant. The product has

to be applied very close to the seed because the fungal pathogen destroys the plant close to crown, right at the base where the plant and the soil come together.

'As long as we can protect that area we can protect the plant," said Minzenmayer.

All the cotton acres planted from I-20 to South Texas, Arizona, parts of California are all affected with Cotton Root Rot, last year it was estimated that Cotton Root Rot in Texas alone causes an impact of \$85 million.

Weather Whys

Q: What are clouds made of?

A: A cloud is a visible mass of condensed water droplets or ice crystals, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "These droplets or crystals are suspended in the Earth's atmosphere," McRoberts explains "Water vapor forms tiny droplets of water or ice crystals, and when these are surrounded by billions of other droplets or crystals, they become visible as clouds. Clouds form when moist air rises and cools, causing water vapor to condense into liquid droplets. Clouds can also form near warm and cold fronts, near the slopes of mountains or when cool air blows over the surface of warm water.

Texas A&M Forest Service showcases firefighting team

WINTERS ENTERPRISE STAFF REPORT

KILLEEN- Texas A&M Forest Service hosted last week an open house to showcase the Heart of Texas Task Force, one of five wildland firefighting teams strategically stationed across the state.

The Heart of Texas team — more commonly referred to as the HOT Task Force — consists of four dozers, one engine and eight wildland firefighters. It was stationed in the Killeen-McGregor area last year to better support local fire departments.

The other four task forces are in Smithville, Fredericksburg, Merkel and Fort Stockton.

'We are here to protect Texans, but we are also here to help Texans help themselves," said Tom Boggus, agency director and state forester for Texas A&M Forest Service.

Texas A&M Forest Service established task forces in 2009 after receiving approval from the 81st Legislature. The move was designed to create nimble contingents of firefighting resources that would be strategically located for incident response.

The agency can shift the teams throughout the state, staging them where dangerous fire weather conditions are predicted. The ability to preposition resources in at-risk areas decreases response times, which leads to fewer homes destroyed and lives lost.

"Stationing resources in strategic places enables rapid response and saves lives and property," said Paul Hannemann, Incident Response department head and chief regional fire coordinator for Texas A&M Forest

Among the state and local dignitaries attending the open house was State Rep. Jimmie Don Aycock, whose district includes Killeen. He heralded the agency for its work both statewide and in his district.

"We've got to work on participating together, planning carefully and spending wisely," Aycock said. "TFS does a good job of that."

When not responding to wildfires, members of the HOT Task Force work on prevention and mitigation projects, establishing fire breaks around select structures, removing potentially-dangerous dead vegetation and presenting fire prevention programs to the public.

They also work with local fire departments, helping them get grant funding for needed equipment and training.

The Walthall cemetery: Surviving evidence of the first town in Runnels Co

WINTERS- The cemetery at Walthall, Texas is the last remaining evidence of the first town in Runnels County. The origin of the name was never firmly established. The cemetery is sometimes referred to as the "Guest Cemetery" and is located five miles southeast of Ballinger, Texas. It was located on land owned by the Guest Families at that time. The town developed from a stage stop (station) at the crossing of the Colorado River, connecting Camp Colorado in Coleman County and Fort Concho in Tom Green County. The settlement of

Wadlington Cottens' land. Their home was 200 yards south of Walthall School. The Colorado Baptist Church met there with the Rev. Thomas Wadlington Cotten as the pastor. The church was organized December 29, 1878, the first in Runnels County. January 12, 1880, a petition of 158 eligible voters was carried to the Coleman County Commissioners Court requesting Runnels County be organized. The petition was examined by the court and found sufficient in form. The court ordered that Runnels County be divided and laid off into

four precincts. February 1,

1880, a meeting to organize Runnels County was held in the home of the Rev. Thomas Wadlington Cotten. The election that was ordered resulted in the following officials being elected. The first commissioners elected were William Moses Guest, W.G. Preston, P.M. Pemberton and P.S. Turner, with W.W. Copeland as the first County Clerk, Sylvester Adams was elected the first County Judge. John McEwen Formwalt was elected the first Sheriff and Jacob Benjamin Cotten was elected the first Tax-Collector. The school had five to eight students in the beginning. By 1902, there were about 15 to 20 at the peak season. J.N. Winters, a young real estate man taught for a three-month period in the school. Mr. Winters had been honored by the new

The cemetery contains at least one unmarked grave. The oldest marked grave is that of infant Penny Cotten (1877-1878). Mrs. John W. Guest (1820-1878) was another early burial. The first burial was that of infant Penny Cotten, August 28, 1877-August 11, 1878. The cemetery has a total of 17 marked graves and at least one that is unmarked. The last grave is that of Samuel Houston Manual, December 11, 1858-November 25, 1934.

There were three men named Walthall that could have figured into the community's name. One was George W. Walthall born in 1853, a judge from Foard County. It was never proved he ever was in Walthall, but could have been because of the stage route. He was a Baptist and never publicly acknowledged that his wife had another religion. southwestern part of the county. His wife would go into town and teach embroidery and fine-stitching classes. She later became a Christian Science Practitioner (or doctor). When she could live by herself (she outlived her husband by several years), she entered a Christian Science Home and all of her property and her household possessions were sold at auction, as was required by that

Another theory for another namesake was that of General Edward Cary Walthall (1831-1898). He would have been well known to the earliest settlers in Runnels County. Records show the Guest Families came from Itawamba County, Mississippi and were possibly acquainted with the Walthall Family. Mr. Walthall had county seats in both North and South Mississippi named in his honor. When John W. Guest's Family arrived in Runnels County, Mr. Edward Cary Walthall's name was in all of the newspapers of the South because he had exhibited unusual heroism at the Battle of Corinth in 1862. Edward C. Walthall had been practicing law in Coffeeville, Yalobusha County when the Civil War broke out. He was 30 years of age. He served for two years as District Attorney for the 10th Judicial District. When the war came, he immediately organized the Yalobusha Rifles in Coffeeville in 1861 and soon became a Lieutenant of the 15th Mississippi Infantry. He was a hero in the Battle of Mill Spring, Kentucky in January 1862, although the Confederates lost that battle. In the

Battle of Corinth (called one of the bloodiest battles which the world had ever seen), Walthall commanded as Colonel of the 29th from Mississippi. April 1863, he was made a Brigadier General retroactive to the December of 1862. In 1864, he was a Major General. After the Civil War, he served as a United States Senator (1885-1898) until his death. While researching for the Walthall Cemetery marker, it was somewhat concluded that the Senator was probably the namesake because he may have known the Guest Family in Mississippi as far back as 1840. Correspondence was found that indicated the name was to "honor a very important man." The theories about the named all indicate the possibility that one of the "important men" may have come through on the stage line during that time. The third person named was James D. Walthall, a popular assistant attorney general, but he seems to have been from San Antonio and had no known connection with Runnels County.

An application for an Official Texas Historical Marker was approved June 15, 1976 for the Walthall Cemetery by the Texas Historical Commission. Invitations were sent to 83 families, including descendants of the early day residents of Walthall.

Sunday May 15, 1977 services were held at First Baptist Church on Eighth Street at 11 a.m. in Ballinger, Texas with the center section being reserved for those attending the celebration. Following the services, a celebration was held at the Ballinger Community Center with a barbecue meal. The cost was \$2.75 per person. At 2 p.m., the group left the Community Center to hold the dedication at the site of the Cemetery. Some descendants participated

in the program. A Declaration of Dedication from the Texas Historical Commission was signed and executed on the July 30, 1999 in Runnels County declaring the Walthall Cemetery, "having evidence of existence and historic use is listed as an Official Historic Texas Cemetery."
